Several agencies support the specific needs of women veterans, including The Center for Women Veterans, established by Congress in 1994, and the local Northeast Florida Women Veterans Association, Inc., which upholds a commitment to ensuring women veterans in our area have the tools needed to successfully transition back to civilian life; and

In alignment with Women's History Month, long recognized each March, the state of Florida initiated a Women Veterans Recognition Week, now in its sixth year, to be held during the third week of March; and
