WHEREAS: Since 1989, American workers, government officials, and community

leaders have observed April 28 as a day of remembrance for those who

have been injured or killed on the job; and

WHEREAS: Despite the Occupational Safety and Health Act signed into law by

President Richard Nixon in 1970, tens of thousands of American workers have been permanently disabled or killed each year by workplace injuries

or occupational diseases; and

WHEREAS: Within the last year, 32 people in our community were killed due to

workplace accidents; and

WHEREAS: Everyone deserves a workplace that contributes to their safety and well-

being. In a nationwide effort to prevent these tragedies, employers and government agencies work collaboratively to improve workplace safety

and encourage stronger health standards and enforcement; and

WHEREAS: Several local, state and federal entities, including the Jacksonville Alliance

for a Safe Workforce (composed of the American Society of Safety Engineers, Northeast Florida Safety Council, First Coast Manufacturers Association, and Occupational Safety and Health Administration), work to

actively pursue improvements in workplace safety; and

WHEREAS: On April 28, the Northeast Florida Safety Council will host the region's

fifth annual observance of Workers' Memorial Day. Citizens can also join in the month-long awareness campaign by signing the Pledge for Safety.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LENNY CURRY, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor of Jacksonville, Florida, do hereby proclaim April 28, 2020 as

WORKERS' MEMORIAL DAY

in Jacksonville and encourage all citizens to recognize the importance of workplace safety and join me in honoring those who lost their lives to workplace injuries.
