



PROCLAMATION

ONE CITY. ONE JACKSONVILLE.

WHEREAS: In 2013, community advocate and philanthropist Delores Barr Weaver demonstrated her commitment to improving the lives of Jacksonville citizens with the establishment of the Delores Barr Weaver Policy Center; and

WHEREAS: A nonprofit entity, the Delores Barr Weaver Policy Center engages communities, organizations, and individuals to advance the rights of girls and young women with dedicated emphasis on those in or at risk of justice system involvement; and

WHEREAS: The Policy Center serves to inform laws, policies, and practices that disproportionately harm girls and young women through comprehensive research, advocacy, and training assistance to prevent initial or further justice system involvement; and

WHEREAS: In 2018, 20% more of the girls arrested in Florida were left with unaddressed trauma compared to their boy counterparts; and

WHEREAS: Since its inception, the Policy Center has served 2,700 girls and young women, produced 25 original research reports, created 5 model programs, and partnered with the Children's Campaign for the successful passage of five laws; and

WHEREAS: In recognition of the tremendous work done by the Delores Barr Weaver Policy Center, the City of Jacksonville honors Mrs. Weaver on her birthday with a celebratory observance of "See the Girl Day".


