Sports and Entertainment Arena

• Arena is approximately 25% complete and is on schedule for dedication in Summer 2003.

Baseball Park

• The new ballpark is 35% complete and is on schedule for dedication in Spring 2003. **Main Library**

- A local joint venture, Auchter-Elkins-Lodestar-Paris, has been selected as the construction manager for the project.
- Groundbreaking is scheduled for Monday, December 16 at noon.

Regional and Branch Libraries

- Design is under way for University Park, Argyle, East Regional and South Mandarin new branch libraries.
- Design is under way on Highlands, Murray Hill, Southeast, Webb Wesconnett, and Willowbranch renovations.
- Purchase of the West Regional site has been approved by City Council.

OVERVIEW

TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM

- For the eleven-month period from October 2001 to August 2002, the city received \$52.2 million in sales tax revenue and \$6 million in proportionate share gas tax.
- Revenue is on target with the original cash model.

INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM

- For the eleven-month period from October 2001 to August 2002, the city received \$51.8 million in sales tax collections.
- For the eight-month comparative period of January 2001 to August 2001 and January 2002 to August 2002, there has been a 8.28% increase in revenues.

PROGRAM MANAGEMENT STATUS

- Recent closings:
 - 1,480 acres, adjacent to the Monticello Wildlands and Cary State Forest
 - 71 acres, the Nemours and Hawkins properties which will make up the Brandy Branch Trailhead on Beaver Street
 - 274 acres, the Davis and Peterson properties which make up the Yellow Water Road Trailhead
- The City of Jacksonville has nearly finished its review of the construction plans for the Castaway Island Preserve. Bid packages are being prepared.
- Councilwoman Alberta Hipps held a town meeting on the proposed construction plans for Camp Milton on the Westside. The residents are very supportive of the park project. The park will cost about \$2.7 million to build.
- City Council approved the purchase of 548 acres on Pumpkin Hill for \$7.95 million.
- The St. Johns Water Management District has approved an outline of a land acquisition plan that could bring up to \$8 million to the city to support the Preservation Project. The plan must still be reviewed by the Mayor's Budget Review Committee, the Mayor's Oversight Commission on Preservation and City Council.
- The total recreation and open space lands in Jacksonville exceeds 69,900 acres.

	The Better Jacksonville funds complement existing resources aimed at creating a showcase park system in Jacksonville. Since 1995, the City of Jacksonville has allocated \$73 million to improve its park system.

JEA - Septic Tank Remediation November 12, 2002

PROJECT DESCRIPTION	Under The Better Jacksonville Plan, JEA is phasing out septic tanks in six areas of the community that have been declared sanitary nuisance areas by the Duval County Health Department and the City Council. These are all areas where leaking septic tanks are polluting the St. Johns River or tributaries to the river.
	As part of The Better Jacksonville Plan, drainage improvements will also be addressed in the six identified areas. The following schedule has been adjusted to allow

construction concurrently.

Environmental Clean-Up of Contaminated Sites

November 12, 2002

• To date, the City of Jacksonville has encumbered and expended \$1,284,957.

• Lonnie C. Miller, Sr. Regional Park

The Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry has investigated potential contamination at this park at great length and determined there are no health concerns in areas of the park that are open to the public. The City's environmental consultant has completed testing in the surrounding neighborhoods. Upon receipt of the Human Health Base Line Risk Assessment from the EPA (expected by the end of the year), the City will develop the Feasibility Study to outline options for addressing contamination in the portion of the park that is fenced off and the surrounding neighborhood. The City is continuing efforts to gain access to private properties for the purpose of obtaining soil samples.

• The area around the old Bethune Elementary School

The City of Jacksonville has recently completed a second round of sampling and submitted Revision 1 of the Remedial Investigation Report to EPA. The City expects to receive the Base Line Human Health Risk Assessment from EPA soon, allowing the City to develop the Feasibility Study. The Feasibility study will outline the options available for addressing the contamination. The City is continuing efforts to gain access to private properties for the purpose of collecting soil samples.

• The area around 5th and Cleveland (Emmett Reed Park)

The City of Jacksonville is currently completing a second round of sampling and will be submitting Revision 1 of the Remedial Investigation and Feasibility Sturdy in the upcoming months. The City expects to receive the Base Line Human Health Risk Assessment from EPA by the end of the year, which will allow the City to develop the Feasibility Study. The Feasibility study will outline the options available for addressing the contamination. The City is continuing efforts to gain access to private properties for the purpose of collecting soil samples.

• The area around Forest Street and McCoy's Creek

The City of Jacksonville is currently completing a second round of sampling and will be submitting Revision 1 of the Remedial Investigation and Feasibility Study in the upcoming months. The City expects to receive the Base Line Human Health Risk Assessment from EPA by the end of the year, which will allow the City to develop the Feasibility Study. The Feasibility Study will outline the options available for addressing the contamination. The City is continuing efforts to gain access to private properties for the purpose of collecting soil samples.

• The area around Clydo Road

The City's environmental consultant is continuing to collect soil samples to determine the impact of incinerator ash disposal on and around the former incinerator site. The City currently projects that the limits and characteristics of the contamination will be determined by the end of the year. After the nature and extent of contamination have been determined, the City will propose a method to address (cleanup) the contamination.

• The area around Pope Place and Gold Merit

The City's environmental consultant has submitted a Contamination Assessment Plan to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) proposing sampling locations to determine the character and extent of contamination at the sites. A public information session was held on October 7 to solicit public comments on the proposed sampling plan. The City anticipates receiving FDEP approval of the plan by mid-November and at that time will begin requesting access to the affected private properties and begin sampling activities. After the nature and extent of contamination have been determined, the City will propose a method to address (cleanup) the contamination.

• The area around Burke Street (Air Liquide property)

The City's Environmental Consultant is currently responding to a request for additional information from FDEP regarding the proposed sampling plan submitted this past summer. The City anticipates responding to FDEP's request by November 15th. Upon receiving FDEP's approval of the sampling plan, the City will begin requesting access to the affected private properties and begin sampling activities. After the nature and extent of contamination have been determined, the City will propose a method to address (cleanup) the contamination.

Northwest Jacksonville Economic Development Fund

November 12, 2002

PROJECT SCOPE The overall vision of the Northwest Jacksonville Economic Development Fund (NWJEDF) is to be a catalyst for economic development within the target area, by working with business owners and entrepreneurs to attract new businesses and expand existing businesses. Thereby, creating employment opportunities and providing area residents with much-needed commercial, retail and entertainment services.

NWJEDF activity is summarized below:

- Hope Plaza is a commercial mixed-use development consisting of a 60,000-sq. ft. office building and the 32-acre site. The developer is moving forward with development of a PUD for the site.
- Moncrief Plaza will be a 24,000 sq. ft. retail and commercial center located on Moncrief Rd. in the 29th and Chase ICN. Demolition has been completed. Bids for construction are being accepted.
- United Optical relocation from the Cathedral area to LaVilla is complete.
- Harmony Dental for infrastructure related to new construction of an office building in LaVilla has been approved by City Council.
- One Metro North, a Commercial development located at 21st and Main St., rehab of building currently under way.
- There are 15 Façade renovations currently under contract. Over 100 applications have been approved.

CHALLENGE

The majority of inquiries received to date have been for working capital. As the BJP funding can only be used for capital expenditures identifying other funding sources is critical to our ability to provide assistance to small business.
