June 24, 2003

## **Sports and Entertainment Arena**

• Arena construction is approximately 65% complete and is on schedule for dedication on June 26, 2003, with substantial completion in Fall 2003.

## **Baseball Grounds of Jacksonville**

• The Baseball Grounds of Jacksonville officially opened on April 4 with the Jacksonville Suns hosting their first home game in the new facility on April 11. Feedback from the fans has been extremely positive.

## Main Library

• Construction is under way and on-schedule to open in late 2004. Construction is under way on the foundation of the Main Library and the erection of the pre-cast for the parking garage.

## **Regional and Branch Libraries**

• All regional and branch libraries are under design and proceeding smoothly. The San Marco Branch Library reopened April 19 with a wonderful celebration in conjunction with the opening of the Balis Community Center.

## **County Courthouse Complex**

• The groundbreaking was held on April 9 and phase one of demolition is complete.

## **Roadway and Infrastructure Improvements**

• Construction is complete on 11 projects. Design is under way on 39 projects and nine projects are under construction.

## Street Resurfacing

• Approximately 1,081 miles have been resurfaced to date.

## Neighborhood Sidewalks

• More than 60 miles of sidewalks have been constructed to date.

## **Preservation Project**

• By mid-July, the city and its partners will have acquired in excess of 45,000 acres for preservation.

## **Neighborhood Park Improvements**

- There are 180 Better Jacksonville Plan park projects in process.
- A park project status report is included.

## **Environmental Clean Up of Contaminated Sites**

• To date, the City of Jacksonville has encumbered and expended \$1,908,553.

## **Cecil Equestrian and Recreation Complex**

• The Equestrian Center was dedicated on June 19 with a traditional Topping Off Ceremony.

## Jacksonville Zoo Improvements

## **OVERVIEW**

## TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM

- For the six-month period from October 2002 through March 2003, the City received \$29.9 million in sales tax revenue and \$3.4 million in proportionate share gas tax.
- For the six-month comparative period of October 2001 through March 2002 and October 2002 through March 2003, there is a 3.3% increase in revenues.
- Revenue continues to be on target with the original cash model.

## INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM

- For the six-month period from October 2002 through March 2003, the City received \$28.6 million in sales tax collections.
- For the six-month comparative period of October 2001 through March 2002 and October 2002 through March 2003, there is a 2.79% increase in revenues.

## **PROGRAM MANAGEMENT STATUS**

- Castaway Island Preserve, a 311-acre Preservation Project park on San Pablo Road, is on schedule and approximately \$400,000 under budget. We are working with the district council member on proposed project enhancements.
- The City Council is currently reviewing 13 land use amendment requests, classifying Preservation Project properties as either conservation or recreation/open space.
- The City of Jacksonville submitted June 10 four Florida Communities Trust applications in support of Preservation Project Jacksonville land acquisitions: McGirts Creek Expansion, phase III; Sal Taylor Creek Preserve; Yellow Water Creek Trailhead and the Northbank Riverwalk Park. If approved, potential revenue on the project from the state will exceed \$4 million.
- Camp Milton Historic Preserve construction project will be submitted to the city for design review.
- City Council is reviewing approximately 1,050 acres of acquisitions. In addition, City Council approved June 10 a 4,886-acre mitigation/preservation site. By mid-July, the city and its partners will have acquired in excess of 45,000 acres for preservation.

## **Environmental Clean-Up of Contaminated Sites**

June 24, 2003

• To date, the City of Jacksonville has encumbered and expended \$1,908,553.

### • Lonnie C. Miller, Sr. Regional Park

The Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry has investigated potential contamination at this park at great length and determined there are no health concerns in areas of the park that are open to the public. The City of Jacksonville is 90% complete with the last round of sampling and is preparing Revision 1 of the Remedial Investigation Report. Once the laboratory results have been validated the report will be completed and submitted to EPA. Additionally, the City's Consultant is moving forward with the development of the Feasibility Study, which will outline the options available for addressing the contamination.

#### • The area around the old Bethune Elementary School

The City's consultant has completed Revision 2 to the Remedial Investigation Report. Additionally, the consultant has submitted the Feasibility Study to EPA outlining the options available to address the contamination at the site.

## • The area around 5<sup>th</sup> and Cleveland (Emmett Reed Park)

The City of Jacksonville is 90% complete with the last round of sampling and is preparing Revision 1 of the Remedial Investigation Report. Once the laboratory results have been validated the report will be completed and submitted to EPA. Additionally, the City Consultant is moving forward with the development of the Feasibility Study, which will outline the options available for addressing the contamination.

#### • The area around Forest Street and McCoy's Creek

The City of Jacksonville is 90% complete with the last round of sampling and is preparing Revision 1 of the Remedial Investigation Report. Once the laboratory results have been validated the report will be completed and submitted to EPA. Additionally, the City Consultant is moving forward with the development of the Feasibility Study, which will outline the options available for addressing the contamination.

#### • The area around Clydo Road

The city's environmental consultant has essentially completed sampling activities at the site. The contamination assessment report summarizing the findings of the sampling activities is currently at 90% complete. Our consultant is now in the process of evaluating remedial alternatives for the closure of the site. The Contamination Assessment Report is projected to be submitted to the State by early August.

#### • The area around Pope Place and Gold Merit

The city's environmental consultant has completed sampling of the Pope Place site and is currently preparing the contamination assessment report, defining the nature and extent of contamination. The Consultant has completed sampling activities at the Gold Merit site and

has prepared a limited contamination assessment report. We are currently coordinating the placement of wells with the state to determine the ground water flow at the site. After the nature and extent of contamination have been determined at both sites, the City will propose a method to address (cleanup) the contamination.

#### • The area around Burke Street (Air Liquide property)

The city has received approval of the contamination assessment plan from FDEP. FDEP recently has sent notice to Air Liquide, the owner of the property, requesting that they take certain actions regarding possible contamination on the property. The City is working with Air Liquide to coordinate sampling efforts and prevent the duplication of work by both parties. The City's Environmental Consultant has completed approximately 50% of the sampling activities. Recent rains have flooded portions of the site and delayed completion of the filed work. After the nature and extent of contamination have been determined, the city will propose a method to address (cleanup) the contamination.

#### • Crystal Springs Road Park

The City of Jacksonville is continuing to investigate contamination in two areas of the Crystal Springs Road Park. Recent soil tests performed by the city's consultant indicated the presence of pesticides, metals, and dioxins in concentrations above regulatory guidelines. The contamination is limited to areas restricted from public access and warning signs have been posted. The City's Environmental Consultant has submitted a proposed cleanup strategy to the state for the property. The portions of the park currently open to the public have been determined to be safe.

## • Confederate Park

The City of Jacksonville has secured the services of an environmental consultant to investigate contamination at Confederate Park resulting from the operation of a Manufactured Gas Plant (MGP) on adjacent properties. The MGP was believed to have operated from 1875 to 1912. The city's consultant has submitted a contamination assessment plan to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection) proposing sampling locations to determine the character and extent of contamination at the site. Once the plan has been approved the city's consultant will conduct sampling activities at the site to determine the need for additional work and/or remediation. The consultant has responded to the first round of comments from the FDEP and is currently finalizing the contamination assessment plan. Additionally, the consultant has preformed one subsurface boring to gather site specific information to refine the sampling approach. Once the sampling plan is approved, we will move forward with determining the nature and extent of the contamination at the site. The City's Environmental Consultant has completed initial sampling activities at the site and is currently performing groundwater modeling of the site. Based upon the first round of sampling, an additional sampling effort will be performed to determine the origin and limits of the contamination at the site.

- The Wright Center for Life-Long Enrichment received approval for a \$80,000 loan and a \$10,000 grant for acquisition and renovations. The capital investment is \$118,000. (4)
- Jax Casual Dining, LLC, LaVilla Bistro received approval for a loan in the amount of \$1.9 million dollars for project construction. The capital investment is approximately \$2,442,000. (142)
- The Hair Citadel of Susa received approval for a \$50,000 loan from the Small Business Development Initiative Program for renovation, a \$25,000 loan from the Small Business Corridor Loan Program for equipment, and a \$10,000 Small Business Development Initiative Grant for façade improvements. The capital investment is \$166,725. (8)
- Norwood Automotive Repair and Tire Center received approval for 80,000 loan from the Small Business Development Initiative Program for renovations, a \$25,000 loan from the Small Business Corridor Loan Program for equipment, and a \$10,000 Small Business Development Initiative Grant for façade improvements. The capital investment is \$175,000. (4)
- Fernety David Communications, Inc. received approval for a loan in the amount of \$114,000 and a grant for \$32,000 from the Small Business Development Initiative Program. The capital investment is \$384,000. (6)
- Edward Waters College Community Development Corporation was approved for a grant in the amount of \$550,000 from the Small Business Development Initiative for the construction of CDC Commercial Complex. The capital investment is \$3,283,062.
- City Council approved two pilot programs to expand eligible uses under the NWJEDF. The pilot programs allow businesses to request assistance for leasehold improvements and equipment purchases.
