Call to Order

Chairman Vanderlaan called the meeting to order at 5:01 p.m. in Training Room 110 of the Ed Ball Building, 214 N. Hogan Street with a moment of silence and welcomed everyone.

Approval of the Minutes

Member Radlinski made a Motion to accept the minutes from the October 4, 2010 meeting. A second was made by Member LaMountain. The Vote: All in favor; none opposed.

Guest Speaker

JEA – Nancy Kilgo, Director, Government Relations, talked about the following:

- The chain link fence on Laura Street. JEA had gotten a waiver from the [Jacksonville Historic Preservation Commission](http://www.coj.net/Departments/Planning+and+Development/Community+Planning/Historic+Preservation/Default.htm) (<http://www.coj.net/Departments/Planning+and+Development/Community+Planning/Historic+Preservation/Default.htm>) and the time was almost up. The fence was put up for safety so that upgrades may be made to JEA equipment. They are planning to go back to the Commission to ask for an extension for a new permit for the fence to remain for another 18 months. Chair Vanderlaan asked if SPAR and Director Brenda Boydson knew of this? He also mentioned that the concrete railings on the creek were in poor condition. Ms. Kilgo will find out whom in the city to go to on the railings. The timeframe is expected to be another 18 months and then a new fence will be put in place.

Members had questions and concerns on the following:

- The high rates and increases on JEA bills. Ms. Kilgo did state that Jacksonville is one of the lowest rates in Florida.
- Is there any type of rate discounts for seniors or disabled? Some states are different and offer lower rates for disadvantages but Florida does not have this and it is prohibited from state law; however JEA has neighbor to neighbor that one can go to for help like the United Way or North East Florida Community Action Agency and other social service agencies to get some assistance.
- Churches like First Baptist receive a 5% discount, can ordinary citizens get that? No. There are several tiers in commercial accounts with businesses and churches that may be eligible for a certain rate class.
- Do employees get bonuses? No, there have not been raises for 3-years but it was performance pay.
- The system for calling in problems after hours needs some improvements. Chair Vanderlaan will talk to Ms. Kilgo after the meeting.
- Members wanted to know if the Neighborhood Energy Efficiency Program was still going on and in what neighborhoods. Yes, it is still going on. They worked with the Housing and Neighborhoods Department to identify older neighborhoods that had high utility usage to bring the program there.
- There will be some rebates on attic installation for improvements starting today.

Upcoming projects and meetings:

- On the Arlington Expressway from Liberty Street to the Sports Complex (Palmetto Avenue) there will be a repair project on the beams. They have been hit and will need to be replaced. One-lane traffic will be open in both directions. It shouldn't take long and should be done by spring.
- The Matthews Bridge will be going out for a contract for painting. It should start in the fall or 2011.
- Next Tuesday on Nov. 9 there will be an informal meeting on the I-95 Overland Bridge Replacement. It was built in the 1950s and needs structural replacement. It should be replaced by 2013. New Public Works Projects for San Marco and Brooklyn

Work is underway on two new infrastructure improvement projects in San Marco and Brooklyn important to the continued revitalization of downtown and its surrounding neighborhoods. On the Southbank, the Public Works Department launched the San Marco Streetscape project that incorporates historic streetlights and signage, brick pavers and crosswalk accents along San Marco Boulevard, from Prudential Drive to Naldo Avenue. On the Northbank, work began on the Brooklyn Regional Stormwater Management System to modify the existing stormwater pond at Riverside Avenue and Forest Street and improve storm sewers and utilities along Forest and Magnolia streets to support future redevelopment in the area.

- FDOT – I-95 Overland Bridge Replacement Workshop – Tuesday, Nov. 9, 2010 at 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. at the Duval County School Board Building, 1701 Prudential Dr. [32207] The project begins south of San Diego Road and ends north of Palm Avenue. Doors will open at 4:30 p.m., with a public comment period at 6:30 p.m. There will be no formal presentation. You are invited to come anytime during the workshop to meet one-on-one with project staff and discuss any questions you may have about the project. The purpose of the proposed project is to replace the Overland Bridge, which carries both northbound and southbound traffic on I-95 and spans Hendricks Avenue, Kings Avenue, and Montana Avenue in downtown Jacksonville. The bridge is being replaced due to structural deterioration which is causing the need for frequent repairs. Previous public meetings have been held to discuss this project and receive input. Based on the input received, changes are being proposed to the project. These changes will require additional right of way and may affect your property. This public workshop is being held to present and discuss the Department's proposed changes and to receive your input. - City of Jacksonville Floodplain Management Effort Lowers Insurance Premiums - Jacksonville property owners required to carry flood insurance will now receive an additional 5 percent discount, for a total discount of 20 percent, on the premium for new or renewed National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) policies. The discount will remain in place for the next five years and is expected to amount to significant savings for the owners of the approximately 34,000 properties in Jacksonville that have flood insurance. The discount comes from the City of Jacksonville's participation in a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) program called the Community Rating System (CRS) that recognizes communities for their efforts to reduce and prevent flood losses with discounts on flood insurance premiums. As part of the program, the city demonstrated its public information, mapping and regulation, flood damage reduction and flood preparedness activities. FEMA recognized Jacksonville particularly for its higher regulatory standards for construction and land development in the floodplain and its maintenance and use of digitized maps in the day-to-day management of the floodplain. Extensive city efforts to enhance public safety and protect property, such as modernizing flood maps and developing a master storm water management plan, also played a role in bringing this discount to Jacksonville property owners. Only property owners required by their mortgage lender to carry flood insurance will receive the 20 percent discount, which is automatically applied when the policy is issued or renewed. Property owners, who are not required to carry flood insurance, but elect to anyway, will receive a 10 percent discount on the policy premium.

2011 Elections – Chair Vanderlaan turned the meeting over to the Chair of the Nominating Committee Member Radlinski. Chair Radlinski gave the Slate of Officers for 2011:

Chair: Doug Vanderlaan and Vice Chair: Louvenia Tippins. He asked for nominations from the floor for the position of Chair and Vice Chair. There being none. *A Motion to have the Slate of Officers for 2011 with Doug Vanderlaan for Chair and Louvenia Tippins for Vice Chair was made and properly seconded. The Vote: 8 in favor; none opposed. The Motion carries unanimously.* The 2011 Officers will be: Chair: Doug Vanderlaan and Vice Chair: Louvenia Tippins.

Chairperson's Report

- The Pill Mills – Chair Vanderlaan thanked Member Radlinski for information from JSO Sgt. Racer, the head of the prescription fraud unit. He said JSO doesn't see the need to enact local ordinances to fight pill mills. Federal and state laws on point are being enforced against pill mills by the State and U.S. Attorneys Offices, JSO, FBI, DEA, Fla. DOH, and the IRS. On October 1, 2010 Florida law changed to make it more difficult for pill mills to operate. Before then, Sgt. Racer said, he would have appreciated a zoning ordinance imposing a moratorium on new pain clinics modeled after the one in Hillsborough County. However, with the changes in the law this month, such an

ordinance isn't necessary. He did not know how many of the 56 mills in Jacksonville were located within the Urban Core. The mills, however, are not located in rural areas of the County. Chair Vanderlaan stated that the situation bears watching but has optimism with Sgt. Racer.

- Internet Cafes appear to be doing quite poorly. The Ordinance to close the cafés has a Compromise to have 20 cafes but small internet cafes are objecting. This bears watching and will probably be completed by the New Year.
- Chair Vanderlaan was unable to go to the City Council meeting on the budget but did send an e-mail.
- A brainstorming activity will be held at the January 3, 2011 meeting to develop ideas for subcommittees for the year.
- Chair Vanderlaan thanked Member Radlinski for his work on the Homeless Subcommittee. He also thanked Member Miller for her work on the Transportation Subcommittee.

CPAC Chairs Meeting with the Mayor – Chair Vanderlaan explained that he was out of town and asked Member Tippins to attend the meeting on behalf of the Urban Core. The Mayor holds quarterly meetings with the CPAC Chairs. The topics that Chair Vanderlaan submitted for discussion for the Urban Core were:

- The revitalization of A. Philip Randolph Boulevard. CAO (Chief Administrative Officer) Kerri Steward stated that there is a plan for A. Philip Randolph to put businesses there and will get back with more information.
- Small video gambling casinos (Internet Cafes) that are causing social and economic harm to families in the Urban Core and all over the city. More and more have opened up. It was stated that there is a compromise to Ordinance 2010-326 which will allow the Internet Cafes

Subcommittee Reports

- A. Philip Randolph Corridor – Needs new leadership since Beverly Toney no longer represents the Eastside. This committee has struggled and the Urban Core CPAC needs to connect and engage with the Eastside residents to work on this.
- Transportation – Chair Celia Miller stated how important it was to have this committee report to the Urban Core CPAC. It was suggested to have a TPO representative speak in 2011. If anyone is interested in serving on the TPO on behalf of the UC CPAC to please let Chair Miller know.

TRUE Commission – Member Arnold stated that Member Chance had not been to a TRUE Commission meeting. Member Chance had volunteered to take Member Tippins place. Member Tippins will call Jeff Clements to see what is happening and Marilyn Fenton-Harmer will call Member Chance. Member Chance stated that she will not be able to attend the TRUE Commission meetings due to the time of day and other commitments at that time of day. This will be revisited at the January meeting.

Presentations

- On behalf of Mayor Peyton and Director of Housing and Neighborhoods Wight Greger Neighborhood Coordinator Marilyn Fenton-Harmer presented Chair Vanderlaan a Certificate of Appreciation and a signed book *Just Miles From Downtown –Photographs of Jacksonville's Preservation Lands* for his work as Urban Core CPAC Chair.
- Subcommittee Chairs: Tippins, Miller, Radlinski, LaMountain, Chance and Vanderlaan were also given Certificates of Appreciation from Mayor Peyton.
- Chair Vanderlaan presented all Urban Core CPAC members and staff Certificate's of Appreciation.
- Chair Vanderlaan thanked the UNF Nursing Students for coming to the meeting.

Announcements - none

Public Comments

- Member Arnold asked about last month's meeting on the garbage on vacant lots. Marilyn Fenton-Harmer will follow up with Solid Waste. Here is their response:
I apologize for my tardiness. (Chief) Mr. Forbes did reiterate that we do not pickup vacant lots when it was first mentioned. Mr. Forbes said we would pickup in front vacant homes meaning furniture clothing and etc. The committee that was formed looked at the enormous cost and voted against it. Thank you again for bringing this matter to my attention.

Here is the response from Public Works Deputy Director Jeff Beck:

The UC CPAC meeting members had not heard back on the following:

- Banner Arms on 8th Street: All lower arms without banners have been removed.
- Caving streets and sewer grates on Myrtle Avenue: This area was the Durkeeville West Drainage project, west of Myrtle Ave. The photos were taken in the vicinity of 8th St, Pearce St, 7th St, and Tyler St. The project is now complete. Inlets have been repaired, curb/gutter reconstructed, and streets resurfaced. The photos were obviously taken a while ago when the project was under construction. They are not indicative of the current condition. The project has been complete for some time.
- The complete cleanup of the Myrtle Avenue Underpass: Clean up project for the underpass will start this month to remove vegetation, graffiti, do some painting and remove trash.
- Dangerous sidewalks from Forest Street to Myrtle Avenue: Added CARE 2011-13563 to repair hazardous sidewalks and install missing sidewalks on Myrtle Ave between 29th St W and Golfair Blvd. It usually takes about 90 days. There are several large oak trees that prevent the complete installation of sidewalks in this area.
- Phoenix Avenue and 21st Street to be resurfaced and railroad crossing: Added Phoenix Ave from 21st St to 17th St to the resurfacing program. This can take several months or longer depending on pending work by utility companies.
- Trees on Myrtle Avenue at 1452 N. Myrtle Avenue were supposed to have been replaced. What is happening with this? Marilyn Fenton-Harmer will check on this. In talking with the Urban Forester Don Robertson he stated that the trees would be replace before the end of the year.
- Please be sure to vote tomorrow and know the candidates and issues.
- Members would like to see someone from the Office of Environmental Justice speak in the New Year on how they plan to clean up Health Zone 1.
- Member LaMountain stated how wonderful our Neighborhood Coordinator Marilyn Fenton-Harmer is and Chair Vanderlaan expressed appreciation as well.
- Guest Shereline Redden introduced herself and Cynthia and Ernest Whigham from Stand Your Ground, a 501c3 non- profit working in Brooklyn.
