Call to Order

Chairman Vanderlaan called the meeting to order at 5:03 p.m. in Training Room 110 of the Ed Ball Building, 214 N. Hogan Street with a moment of silence and welcomed everyone.

Approval of the Minutes

Member LaMountain made a made a Motion to accept the minutes from the April 5, 2010 meeting. A second was made by Member Arnold. The Vote: All in favor; none opposed.

Guest Speaker

North Florida TPO (Transportation Planning Organization) Executive Director Jeff Sheffield presented information on the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Fiscal Years 2010/11 – 2014/15. He talked about the Urban Core projects that were in the TIP handout. The Urban Core TPO representative Member Miller has the entire book of projects. He went over the following projects some of which only touch the Urban Core boundary:

- 1. Arlington Expressway Palmetto Bridge Overpass restoring the conditions of the bridge
- 2. Hart Bridge paining which is on going and the remaining cost of \$51 million dollars
- 3. I-10/I-95 Interchange landscaping
- 4. I-95 at Myrtle Avenue Bridge rehabilitation to keep them in shape
- 5. I-95 Overland Bridge from the bottom of the Fuller Warren Bridge to ground level with a 10-lane span. The entire structure is to be replaced. This will have a tremendous impact for a number of years with a cost of \$161 million dollars

- 6. I-95 from JTB to Atlantic Blvd. pavement rehabilitation
- 7. The 7 HUB Transit BRT system with Amtrak, the Skyway, buses etc. to have a fully multi modal complex to complete the design to 100%. Currently there are no funds for this and it will be hard to find the dollars in this economy
- 8. Matthews Bridge paining which will cost \$31 million

The definitions for the Phase/Agency are listed on page A2-2 of the handout. The most used for the Urban Core for the Phase are: PE = Preliminary Engineering, CST = Construction, RRU = Railroad/Utilities. Also under the headings are the funding source and years it may or may not be funded. The money listed for 1000 means a million. Members had questions on the following: The feasibility plan cost for funding the JTA rail projects and the details? JTA will be able to answer those questions. They will be a speaker in June. What is the status of the interchange on MLK/20th Street and the Port? It was just taken out of the 5-year Plan due to funding. Project New Ground Consultant Madeline Skinner from The Hester Group reported on the following:

- Cleaning is going on at the Brown's Dump site. At the 5th and Cleveland site they started at St. Stevens Church, Emmett Reed Community Center and some properties at the Oaks at Durkeeville. They will be looking at the residential properties in a week or so.
- The J. S. Johnson Center in the Forest Street site is scheduled for next week and the residents in mid May.
- Lonnie Miller will start at the end of May and then all sites will have cleaning going on simultaneously.
- Some families have opted for temporary housing and that is going well.
- Access agreements are still needed. Some residents are hesitant to sign off but once they see the site cleaned will sign the agreement.

Members had questions and concerns on the following: How many homes have been cleaned? 20 homes at the Brown's Dump site. There have been some daycares that have not been done and children were supposed to get priority and fast tracked. It was also stated by a Member that had a relative in the Forest Street site that rumors are stirring that the dirty dirt that is being placed on Davis Street is being reused. The Davis Street site is a staging area for the dirty dirt. Neighbors are really hesitant to sign an access agreement if the dirt that is supposed to be clean is possibly dirtier than the dirt that is already on their land. Planning and Development - Emery Nauden reported on the following:

• E – 10-26 1282 Kings Rd. the old Standard Feed building that is a split parcel that is currently zoned IL and CCG-2. The plan is to bring in a Dollar General type store for retail. The exception is for the parking lot and storm water retention pond to change the zoning. It will go before the Planning Commission on Thursday, May 13, 2010. It is approved in the Neighborhood Action Plan (NAP) and the Planning Department is leaning towards approval.

Members commented that in these tough economic times this would be a real improvement. The need for upgraded retail and site improvement and landscaping is needed however; they are concerned with the lack of communication with the neighborhood. - This summer the Recreation Department will pilot a new program called "Summer Night Lights" at 5 locations: Clanzel Brown, Charles Clark, Mitchell Center, Kennedy Center and Mary Lena Gibbs Center. These parks are housed in high-crime neighborhoods and working with JSO hopes to reduce gang activity and crime. The community is invited to become involved. Chairperson's Report

Chair Vanderlaan wanted to discuss two things: Internet Cafes and the Urban Core Vision Plan.

1. <u>Internet Cafes</u> – If members recall that last September 2009 the Urban Core CPAC adopted the following motion and read the following letter that was sent to the City Council, Mayor, Sheriff and State Attorney:

At the September 3, 2009 meeting of the Urban Core Citizens Planning Advisory Committee (UC CPAC) Member Vanderlaan made the following motion. The Motion was properly seconded with a unanimous vote:

The Urban Core CPAC urges the Jacksonville City Council, Mayor, JSO and the State Attorney's office to work together to establish and enforce regulations on the small unregulated casinos know as "internet cafes". Considering the known harmful social effects of gambling, and the fact that Northeast Florida already offers dog racing and a state lottery, we advise the Jacksonville City Council to enact an ordinance to close the "internet cafes".

Chair Vanderlaan was pleased that the City Council has the proposed Ordinance 2010-0326 that says "Prohibition on the use of slot machine-like spinning reels, video displays or similar technology to display the results of a raffle, sweepstakes, contest or other promotion." The public hearing will be on Tuesday, May 11. 2010. This is sponsored by the following Council Members: Hyde, Redman, Holt, Bishop, Yarborough, Davis, Shad and Corrigan. Chair Vanderlaan was pleased to see the City Council coming around to see it our way. He then introduced former City Council Member Alberta Hipps. She appreciated the opportunity to speak on Ordinance 2010-0326 which was introduced at the City Council meeting last Tuesday night and went to meetings today. She hopes that many understand the importance and introduced Attorney Wyman Duggin. He did the legislation and research on this. Jacksonville is becoming a meca for this. He has checked with JSO on the amount of calls for service where they are located. They do donate to charities. This type of activity is illegal. They are not helpful to the community. Mr. Duggin urged members to come to the City Council meeting to know what the city really thinks about this. Chair Vanderlaan did his research on this and spoke with one of Allied Veterans attorneys. They spoke about donations but he wanted to know what percentage of money was being donated from the amount of money that was being taken in. They would not answer that. Members talked about this being gambling no matter what they say it is. They are cheating people since they can not claim their losses on their taxes since it is not legalized. They also are not paying any taxes to the city or state. This is a real concern for community standards. Currently the Attorney General is leaving it up to local law enforcement. Ordinance 2010-0326 can enforce this. The Chair also stated that these operations are exploiting a loop hole. A discussion ensued and there were lots of questions.

2. Urban Core Vision Plan - Chair Vanderlaan remarked that the Plan was not perfect and has some flaws. The Vision Plan is a document that is not to be detailed but what will be done in the future. Members want things better for the Urban Core and some of the pictures depicted were a dream for the future. Member Arnold made the following Motion - The Urban Core CPAC partially supports the Urban Core Vision Plan but is disappointed that not all neighborhoods were adequately communicated with and represented nor reflected in the final Vision Plan. Discussion: Members wanted to be sure that someone from the UC CPAC attended the last Urban Core Vision Plan Steering Committee meeting on Thursday, May 27, 2010 at 5:30 p.m. in the Ed Ball Training Room 110. This information needs to be sent to Adrianne Lathrop before May 21st to be put on the Agenda for the Steering Committee meeting. Chair Vanderlaan said he would be at the meeting but if for some reason he was not there wanted to be sure that someone from the UC CPAC would present the Motion if approved as read and that would be it. Members from the Eastside were not pleased and were passed over in the Plan. It was also stated that there was far too much focus on Springfield. Mid-Westside also felt omitted from the Vision Plan. Members also stated that there was more need for communication on the Plan besides e-mail. It must be remembered that not everyone has a computer or e-mail address. Some of the Urban Core neighborhoods are not a technical oriented community. It was also stated that there should have been representation from each neighborhood in the Plan. That said even with representatives participating on the Steering Committee their neighborhoods were still left out. This Plan is important because the future development of the Urban Core will be in writing. With the possibility of light rail members do not want to see neighborhoods split apart again like when I-95 was constructed. The Vote: All in favor; none opposed. The Motion carries unanimously.

Members would like and update on the Mayor's meeting with the CPAC Chairs. Chair Vanderlaan explained that he was away and Vice Chair Williams attended the meeting. Marilyn Fenton-Harmer will contact him. Members also wanted a copy of the summary from the meeting.

Subcommittee Reports

- TRUE Commission Representative Tippins was not in attendance but Member Arnold is the TRUE Commission representative for the NW CPAC. She reported that the Commission meets on the first Thursday of the month at 4 p.m. at City Hall Council Chambers, 117 W. Duval Street. They talk about so many things and how they are funded as well as how it affects our communities. They vote on things and then present them to the Mayor or City Council. One recent issue they discussed was JEA and closing locations in the areas that most need them to pay their monthly bills. Not all people have access to pay by phone or the internet. The TRUE Commission is a voice to benefit the community.
- A. Philip Randolph Corridor Chair Beverly Toney reported that the committee met in April to come up with a strategy for: 1. Retail in the commercial area with employment opportunities. 2. Mixed use development 3. Infrastructure that will enhance A. Philip Randolph corridor. They had lots of ideas but there is no economic driver. During the Jaguar games they would like to have vendors for people coming into the area. Can they get a permit to do that? Chief of Recreation and Community Programming Shorty Robbins said they could get a permit for that. Sheriff Rutherford has stated that crime in the Eastside is down 32% and this should not be an issue with having vendors. Next they want to work on recommendations on a policy for the A. Philip Randolph corridor to present to the City of Jacksonville. They have a meeting with Director of Housing and Neighborhoods Wight Greger. They would like to do a walk on A. Philip Randolph for the next meeting. They also want to work with Code Enforcement on absent landlords. She has spoken to Buster and Marion Graham Mortuary about the walk. They want to bring businesses to the area. Chair Vanderlaan thanked Chair Toney for the report that sounds great.
- Homelessness and Panhandling Chair Vanderlaan reported for the excused Chair Greg Radlinski on the following report that was submitted: (1) DVI canceled their quarterly meeting in April; (2) the ESHC meeting hasn't been rescheduled; and, (3) ShAdCo for Zone 1 established a subcommittee chaired by JEDC's Karen Nasrallah to consider panhandling/loitering in downtown. The subcommittee (Karen, DVI's Amy Harrell, and me) met in mid-April. JEDC's Paul Crawford attended as did JSO, ShAdCo Zone 1 Chairman Brand Cologne, and CM Redman and his aid. The subcommittee came up with some suggestions: increased police presence (the JSO lieutenant said that he would conduct roll call for his sector staff in the vicinity of Hemming Plaza); clearer "No Panhandling" signage (a hand, palm up, within a circle with a line across it); repositioning the public furniture within Hemming Plaza; and, installing low, decorative fences around flower beds to discourage persons from sitting on the flower bed boxes. CM Redman said that he was meeting with the Mayor immediately after our Committee adjourned, and that he would discuss these suggestions with the Mayor that very day.
- Transportation Chair Celia Miller reminded members that she wants a replacement for the TPO. She did not want to resign until there was a replacement. Transportation is an important topic for Jacksonville. The CAC meeting takes place on the first Wednesday of the month at 1022 Prudential Drive and 6 p.m. and they try to be done by 7 p.m. If members want to review the TIP for the entire city she has a copy. Members asked if there were term limits for the CAC. There are new by-laws and she will have to check with Marcy Lawson.

Vacant Properties - Chair Doug Vanderlaan stated that at the last meeting they met with
the Real Estate Division and the Director of Housing and Neighborhoods Wight Greger
who has been so helpful and knowledgeable. This has turned out to be a very
complicated issue. They will meet a few more times and pull away from the details and
develop policy statements.

- Jacksonville Selected as Environmental Justice Showcase Community
 Jacksonville was selected by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as one of 10
 communities to receive a \$100,000 grant to promote collaborative, community-based
 approaches to improve public health and the environment. At a news conference last
 week, Mayor John Peyton said, "The designation highlights our ongoing efforts to improve
 the quality of life for our citizens living in areas of environmental concern." For more on

- Member Toney reported that they received 130 applications and 40 children will be employed this summer. They have started the training process with the children on Saturdays until they begin working in June. They will work Monday – Thursday and on Friday they will do community service projects.


