Call to Order

Approval of the Meeting Summary

A motion to approve the June 9, 2011 summary as written was made by Member Burgess and a second by Member Tompkins. The Vote: All were in Favor; none opposed.

Staff Reports

JSO Zone 5 – Lt. Scott introduced herself and stated this was her first CPAC meeting. She reported on the following: The homicide number for 2010 was 80 and year-to-date it is 43. For manslaughter it was 7 last year and 1 this year. Crime is down 7.92% year-to-date. There has been an increase in certain crimes. Please be more aware of your surroundings. The latest ploy is asking for a light for a cigarette and pulling out a weapon. Property crime, auto and home burglary are up. If you go into a store please do not leave your car running or the keys in the car. It only takes a few seconds for it to be gone. There have been a number of smash and grabs (breaking the car window and grabbing what is in the car). Don't leave anything of value in view. Call JSO if you see anything suspicious. You are the eyes and ears of the neighborhood. Members had questions on crime on the Baldwin Rails-to-Trails. She did not know but would check on it. Where are the hot spots for robberies? Members had questions on the following: redistricting, electoral college, jobs, education and the bills that Rep. Fullwood was working on. Rep. Council Member Robin Lumb, At-Large Group 5, introduced himself and his Executive Assistant Donna Barrow. He reminded members that they had 6 Council Members, the five at large and their District Council Member. He was there for their concerns. He answered a number of questions that were directed for Rep. Fullwood. City Council redistricting hearings will be going on around the county. These are for members and citizens to express their concerns. There are a number of Council Members that will not be running next time due to term limits. Members were concerned that more jobs need to be brought to the Northwest. They were also very concerned with the failing Duval County Public Schools. Council Member Lumb stated Mayor Brown proposes to have a Commissioner of Education. The failing schools are mostly in the Northwest and all in his area. Members thanked Council Member Lumb for returning an e-mail when others had not. Council Member Lumb thanked the members for speaking and stated that he was very impressed with how the City Council Members cared and were all involved. He stated that Mayor Brown was very dynamic and was getting involved so early. They were all there to make it work and make it better for Jacksonville. Emergency Preparedness Training Coordinator Elizabeth (Liz) Henderson spoke about the Legends Center being the only city owned evacuation shelter in the county. Volunteer workers at the shelter are needed. Volunteers are requested to sign up. Training would be provided free of charge. CERT – the Citizens Emergency Response Team training will be available to community members. This would train volunteers to be first responders during an emergency. Please remember that anyone that has medical or special needs has to register each year to go to that evacuation shelter. These special needs shelter will have a doctor and nurse on staff. Staff Reports

<u>Mayor's Representative Devin Reed</u>, Director of Central Operations, reported on the following from Mayor Brown's Office:

- A balanced budget was presented to the City Council without raising fees. Today was the
 first day that the City Council would be going over the budget. The meetings will be for the
 next three Thursdays. Mr. Reed stated that in his department he had to cut 35 positions with
 19 currently filled. Everyone is cutting to the bone into the marrow and doing more with less.
- Jobs Mayor Brown met with our Congressional leaders and Lt. Governor Carroll on the need for the port to be dredged. This is greatly needed to complete with other east coast ports. Jacksonville needs a deeper channel. Getting this would help create more jobs.
- Mayor Brown appreciates the military installation at Mayport and the need for them to expand them and make it friendlier for the military. The City of Jacksonville needs to show just how serious we are about the military. When a number of ROTC programs in the Duval County Public Schools were going to be eliminated Mayor Brown went to agencies to become private partners to support and sponsor the programs. If Jacksonville wants to get a Naval Carrier and Sub we need to support the military at every level.
- Mayor Brown wanted to be sure that all children are in school the first week that classes begin. This is the time that the schools get funding for the rest of the year.
- The City Council has passed legislation that all new City of Jacksonville employees are to be Jacksonville (Duval County) residents.

Members had questions on the following: What is being done about the Port? Members want to know if JAXPORT will be ready by 2015 when the Panama Canal is finished with their renovations. They are working with the legislators to make sure this happens. They are going to Washington D.C. and are being proactive to try and get federal funding. They asked about downtown development. Mr. Reed suggested that members attend City Council meetings and voice their concerns. Chair Kelly thanked Mr. Reed for bringing us this valuable information. <u>FDOT</u> - Thomas Hill reported on the following projects under construction:

- Highway Avenue had been delayed but it is back on
- I-10 and Halsema Rd. is on schedule to finish in the spring of 2012
- I-10 rehabilitation concrete pavement to Stockton Street is on schedule, estimated completion 2012

New Program:

 They have new technology to increase data on how people are traveling in the surrounding counties. It is on cell phones with a blue tooth signal. They pick up the signal on a receiver and track it along the highway. It will determine how fast you are going if the road is congested.

Coming up:

• A new interchange on MLK at 21st street will be starting soon. They will be opening bids in September for approximately \$39 million dollars. This will allow for port traffic to get to Interstate I-95. The project is expected to begin in 2012

Follow up from June meeting:

- Lem Turner on the southbound exit
- They will not put up a barrier wall for a nuisance.
- On MLK there are 2 resurfacing projects going on and the new interchange
- Beaver Street fell out of the TPO Plan, not all projects made it for construction.

• The recommendation at Union Street at the Davis Street exit was checked. The site had a drainage problem. It has been corrected but it still has a structural problem to fix. Members had questions on the following: What is happening with Chaffee Road north of Normandy? There is a project connecting up with Chaffee with interchange modifications. Will it come into Pritchard Road? Yes, however there are no plans after Pritchard Rd. On Tallulah and Pearl the signal light needs to be painted. The project of painting poles started 2 months ago and has been ranked. They started 2 months ago with the one on Lem Turner at the Wal-Mart and Home Depot. Members want to verify that the pole is on the list. Members did state that Tallulah looks great and the speed limit is 35 mph. They are working with JSO and signage to blink if speeding. They would like to know if this can be installed. Members would also like more information on the new project with the cell phone tracking. <u>Municipal Code Compliance</u> – Zone 5 Supervisor Danny Connell introduced Zone 6 Supervisor Bruce Chauncey. The Districts overlap and the NW CPAC wants information from the North area which is about 20% of Zone 6. This is a very busy time of year and they are working as hard as they can to address the concerns. He reported on the following:

Zone 5 will have done 40 Systematic Inspections in the neighborhoods which is three times as many as the other zones have done. They are working hard to respond to the communities wants. <u>Planning & Development</u> – Planner Lurise Bannister passed out the monthly report and spoke on the following: The top items have been approved.

• The new item 2011-041 is an Exception to allow for a crematory on 0.51 care of CCG-2 (Commercial Community General – 2) located at 4416 Brentwood Ave. (at the corner of Brentwood Ave. and Woodbine St.) A crematory is allowed with the CCG-2 zoning but in the Metro North Neighborhood Action Plan (NAP) retail is what was stated. The Planning Department did vote to deny this application. The neighborhood association is in opposition to this. It was deferred. A community meeting will be held on Monday, August 15 with Council Member Gaffney. Members asked if it were too early to send communication on this. They also stated that this would be a detriment to the area.

Recreation and Community Services – Daryl Joseph reported on the following:

- The goal of the Parks Department is to make sure they have the best park system in the city and the state. They want them to be safe for the children to use them.
- The following projects are going on in the Northwest:
 - o Shade structure amenities that families use for Pop Warner games have begun.
 - o Upgrades to the following parks: Riverview Park, Singleton Park, Harborview Boat Ramp, Royal Terrace and Tallulah Park.

Members asked what was going to happen at Harborview Boat Ramp – restrooms, parking lot and fencing. Members asked about the James Fields Park, 3327 Lane Ave, 32254. <u>Housing and Neighborhoods (HAND)</u> - Neighborhood Coordinator, Marilyn Fenton-Harmer reported on the following:

- The Mayor's Transition Team presented their report to Mayor Brown on August 8th. The following was what was reported in the Housing and Neighborhoods Committee Report:
 - I. Make neighborhoods a major focus of the Alvin Brown Administration.
 - 1. The Mayor should immediately begin a program called "Mayor Brown Around Town," consisting of frequent and well publicized visits by the Mayor to as many of the city's 250+ different neighborhoods as possible in the course of a year. These appearances could be a visit to a coffee shop, a neighborhood walk, or a speech at a neighborhood organization meeting.
 - 2. As part of the "Mayor Brown Around Town" program, hold four Town Hall meetings per year, one in each quadrant of Jacksonville, with the Mayor and City representatives present to answer questions and to learn about neighborhood issues.
 - 3. The Mayor should call a Council of Neighborhoods meeting at least once a year, with delegations from all of the city's 400+ neighborhood organizations.
 - 4. Convene the current Chairs and Vice Chairs of the Citizen Planning Advisory Committees (CPACs) to discuss ways to restructure them for improved effectiveness. Consider smaller geographic areas for each CPAC, rather than the six vast planning districts, so that neighborhoods covered by each CPAC will have more in common. The CPAC chairs should meet with the Mayor at least every three months.
 - 5. Empower existing neighborhood associations by providing a liaison within the government with which their leadership can communicate, and promote the development of new neighborhood associations with a mentorship program via the Housing and Neighborhood Department (HAND) and utilizing established neighborhood groups to share their knowledge and experience.
 - 6. Explore the use of neighborhood-building grant opportunities, such as AmeriCorps, to create a city-wide Block Captain Program, and expand such programs as HAND's "CommUniverCity" program that would create a direct line of communication with the City, organizing education, training, neighborhood watches
 - II. Aggressively promote collaboration planning and zoning.
 - III. Strictly enforce current codes and laws to strengthen neighborhoods.
 - IV. Strengthen the Housing and Neighborhoods Department (HAND).
 - V. Encourage Public-Private Partnerships to support, stabilize and enrich neighborhoods.
 - VI. Promote neighborhoods enhancement initiatives to support quality of life.
 - VII. Evaluate and implement existing neighborhood plans and studies.
 - VIII. Improve inter-departmental coordination, communication and collaboration.
- Neighborhood Coordinator Marilyn introduced the first Chair for the Northwest CPAC Lou Myers.

- Duval County Health Department Issues Mosquito-Borne Illness Alert August 11, 2011 The Duval County Health Department (DCHD) continues its mosquito-borne illness alert for Duval County. Additional human cases of West Nile Virus (WNV) have been confirmed and there is a heightened concern that additional residents will become ill. Duval County has eight confirmed cases of West Nile Virus (WNV) in 2011.
- Don't Eat the Fish in Hogan's Creek and Long Brach tributaries in Health Zone 1. The Duval County Health Department (DCHD) and the City of Jacksonville (COJ) are jointly issuing a Fish Consumption Advisory for largemouth bass, blue tilapia, and striped mullet from Hogan Creek and Long Branch tributaries in Health Zone 1. The advisory recommends that people should not eat largemouth bass and striped mullet from Hogan Creek due to their contamination with polyaromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs). In addition, largemouth bass and blue tilapia from Long Branch should not be consumed due to pesticide (dieldrin) contamination. The concentration of contaminants found in the mentioned fish species from these creeks could pose a health concern for the people who eat them.
