## Call to Order

Chair Kelly called the meeting to order at 6:03 p.m. with a welcome and the Pledge of Allegiance at the Legends Center, 5130 Soutel Drive.

## Approval of the Meeting Summary

A motion to approve the August 11, 2011 summary as written was made by Member Burgess and a second by Member Scott. The Vote: All were in favor. None opposed

## Staff Reports

JSO Zone 5 – Lt. Scott reported on the following:

- In Sector M near EWC on Kings Rd. there have been a number of auto thefts with cars being recovered in Sector M 1 on Beaver Street. Watch out for young children getting out of cars and just leaving them.
- There have been burglaries to residents in the 1600 block of 32nd and 33rd Street.
- Rails-to-Trails there have been some burglaries with cars being broken into. Please call this in to JSO so that they may check to see if there is a trend.
- Elections are going on at the ShAdCo meetings.
- With the time change coming up and school back in session, please watch out for children playing and school zones.
- In Sector O on Lane Avenue and Edgewood Ave. a white male has been approaching young children. Please call JSO if you see something out of the ordinary. JSO needs help with this.

Members had questions on the following: What is happening with the shootings in the past two weeks. It has been a very busy couple of weeks. They are working on the suspects for the park shooting and they have someone in custody for the Prince Street shooting. There are no other details since the case is open. ## Guest Speakers

"Community Awareness" – Department of Health – Dr. Max Wilson, Prevention Programs Coordinator, introduced himself along with Rod Brown Senior Health Educator and Jocelyn Turner Community Outreach. He talked about reproductive health. He stated that Duval County has a serious problem with sexually transmitted diseases (STDs). Dr. Wilson passed out a flyer with comparison rates of STD rates in Duval County to the National Average from 2009:

	Duval County	Florida	United States
Chlamydia	608.9 per 100,000	387.5 per 100,000	409.2 per 100,000
Gonorrhea	200.9 per 100,000	111.0 per 100,000	99.1 per 100,000
Syphilis	23.6 per 100,000	20.4 per 100,000	14.7 per 100,000

Geographically, the Urban Core of Jacksonville has the highest incidence of STDs in comparison with other areas of the city. Zip codes with the highest STD rates (ranked from highest to the lowest) include: 1.32209 2.32206 3.32208 4.32254 5.32211

STD disparities based on age: Teenagers and young adults aged 15 – 24 years old bare the majority of the burden for STDs. 64% of the total number of STDs occur in this population. Within this age group 1 out of every 19 individuals has had an STD. Women are disproportionately affected by STDs and over 81% of STD infections occur among African American women. Other minorities also suffer from high rates of infection. Repeat STD infections ranged from 2 cases to 47 cases over a 3-year period which was troubling.

Members had questions and concerns on the following: What are the root causes, does race play into this very complex topic and what about prevention in jail? JSO does a good job of screening in jail and 80% of STDs occur in African Americans. They wanted to know about the Duval County School Board and the lack of education. They were concerned with the immediate and long term consequences and the high number of STDs in Health Zone 1. Members asked about the significance of HIV/Aids, STDs tend to follow each other. Jacksonville has 6000 cases of HIV/Aids in the 5 surrounding counties. It was said that teens have the perception that condoms and pills for birth control don't work. They do work if they are used correctly. Members talked about educating students early on in 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup> grade.

Jocelyn Turner talked about asking the community for help in reducing these rates. They have 4 committees: one for young people, one for medical providers, one for marketing and outreach and one for the community. She passed around a sign-up sheet for the Community Advisory Board. Ms. Turner stated not to feel pressure but one could show up to the meetings or just get information from the signup sheet. She is available to come to meetings to speak on numerous topics. It was also mentioned that Florida does not treat partners of those infected with an STD. Handouts on Childhood Obesity were also handed out. More children are having adult diseases. **City of Jacksonville Ombudsman** Dinah Mason introduced herself. She stated that the office of compliance handles contract compliance issues. If an agency has a problem with the city and reports it their office they investigate it. The office is neutral. They go according to what is black and white in the documents. She came tonight to let the CPACs know that the State Attorney's office will not be doing civil mediation cases any more. The Ombudsman Office will be assisting with issues in neighborhoods like property line disputes, barking dogs and tree limbs. The goal is to help to come to a resolve. They do have a small staff of two assistant ombudsmen, secretary and herself. Call CARE at 630-CITY (2489) to report a concern. Members did talk about a few examples of where the ombudsman was needed. Mayor's Office - Project New Ground - Sam Holman reported on the following:

- They have completed 400 parcels that have been remediated.
- There have been limited problems and things are going good.

Members asked for the background of Project New Ground and how the parcel was remediated. They take out the contaminated dirt and put in new dirt. Years ago (40/50) incinerators burned garbage and the ash that was created from the garbage was used as fill dirt since it was not known that the ash contained harmful chemicals. There was a class action suit that has been settled and the EPA has been working with the City of Jacksonville to remediate the contaminated properties at the 4 sites: 5<sup>th</sup> and Cleveland, Forest Street, Brown's Dump and Lonnie Miller Park. There were questions on Lonnie Miller Park, a field on Soutel next to Walgreens that is not part of Project New Ground and a Church on Forest Street. Mr. Holman will check on this. Duval County Health Department Issues Mosquito-Borne Illness Alert - The Duval County Health Department (DCHD) continues its mosquito-borne illness alert for Duval County. Duval County has eleven confirmed cases of WNV in 2011. There has been one reported death associated with a confirmed case of WNV (West Nile virus). About 1 in 150 people infected with WNV will develop severe illness. Symptoms include high fever, headache, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness, vision loss, numbness and paralysis. These symptoms may last several weeks and neurological effects may be permanent. The state monitors animals as sentinels for WNV, to determine if any viruses are present in the community.

There is no vaccine for preventing West Nile virus or Dengue Fever. The best defense against mosquito-borne illness is prevention. The most effective measure for residents is to avoid mosquito bites by using repellents or staying behind screened windows and doors when mosquitoes are active. DCHD continues to advise the public to remain diligent in their personal mosquito protection efforts. These should include remembering "<u>Drain and Cover</u>". For information go to: <u>www.dchd.net</u> "<u>Drain and Cover</u>" <u>DRAIN</u> standing water to stop mosquitoes from multiplying

<u>Drain</u> water from garbage cans, house gutters, buckets, pool covers, coolers, toys, flower pots or any other containers where sprinkler or rain water has collected. <u>Discard</u> old tires, drums, bottles, cans, pots and pans, broken appliances and other items that aren't being used. <u>Empty and clean</u> birdbaths and pet's water bowls at least once or twice a week. <u>Protect</u> boats and vehicles from rain with tarps that don't accumulate water. <u>Maintain</u> swimming pools in good condition and appropriately chlorinated. Empty plastic swimming pools when not in use. - COVER skin with clothing or repellent CLOTHING - Wear shoes, socks, and long pants and long-sleeves. This type of protection may be necessary for people who must work in areas where mosquitoes are present. REPELLENT - Apply mosquito repellent to bare skin and clothing Always use repellents according to the label. Repellents with DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, and IR3535 are effective. Use mosquito netting to protect children younger than 2 months old. - COVER doors and windows with screens to keep mosquitoes out of your house - Repair broken screening on windows, doors, porches, and patios.

**DCPS** – Chief of Secondary Turnaround Cluster Tony Bellamy reported on the following:

- School is open and in full swing. The first weeks have been setting a routine. If you can't control you can't teach.
- The 4 Intervene Schools are: Raines, Ribault, Andrew Jackson High Schools and North Shore Elementary. They have hired an outside company to run the schools but the State did give Duval Schools a one year extension. The perception is that the schools are not going forward but Jackson High School scored 48 points more than any other school. Raines scored 31 points but they are still behind. They are a few points away from a grade of C.

Members had questions and concerns on the following: How can the community be more responsive to the health of students in relation to STDs. How can the community help with the Intervene schools? There are community assessment teams at the 4 schools and they are asking for support to strategize on how to improve the schools. They met yesterday at 4:30 p.m... He will get the meeting date, time and location to members. The Intervene schools are making progress. What is happening with Butler Middle School? They have moved the students from Paxon Middle School to Butler due to capacity. Butler had 250 to 300 students and needed more. They retired the Paxon Middle School name. The building that housed Paxon Middle School is housing the James Weldon Johnson program. The transition has been a dream. Members also wanted to know who hired the leaders at the schools since it is such an important part. The Superintendent makes the final decision with input from himself and the 4 cluster chiefs. They talked about the teachers at

the Intervene schools and incentives. They have invited the best teachers to come but they do not accept. Members also talked about the brain drain from the neighborhood schools. Chair Kelly Invited Mr. Bellamy to the next meeting.

#### Chair Kelly's Report

- Chair Kelly thanked members for getting involved and making a difference.
- He appointed the following for the 2012 Nominating Subcommittee for Chair and Vice Chair: Member Scott, Member Currier and Member Burgess. He asked Member Burgess to Chair the subcommittee. He asked members if they were interested in being considered for the Chair or Vice Chair for 2012 that it was for a one-year term starting in January.
- Chair Kelly thanked the UNF Nursing students that come every year especially the head nurse William Ahrens. Mr. Ahrens stated that the CPACs were a valuable contribution and thank you to the CPACs for enhancing their professional development.
- He also stated that there were 2 more meetings for 2011. At the next meeting there will be a sign up for refreshments and volunteers will be needed for this subcommittee.
- He asked members to not hold side bars during the meeting. It is very distracting. We all need to listen to know what is going on.
