TO:JACKSONVILLE CHILDREN'S COMMISSION BOARD OF DIRECTORSFROM:LINDA LANIER, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

REQUESTED ACTION:

The Summer Camp Review Committee respectfully recommends that the Summer Camp Grants for the Jacksonville Children's Commission, and the Jacksonville Journey, be awarded to the agencies below. Please note that the agencies are listed in alphabetical order, with corresponding number of camp seats, and the budget amount.

NARRATIVE:

A total of 49 applications were submitted, to include one from the Sanctuary of Northeast Florida; however, the application was not reviewed due to the agency being on the City's Non-Compliance List.

Therefore, 48 grant applications were reviewed and scored, and 26 applications are being recommended for funding. This references 54% of the grant applications scoring an average score of 75 or above. The quality of the applications was pivotal in this process and only applicants scoring 75 or above are being recommended for funding. However, the City of Jacksonville, Department of Recreation and Community Services has proposed to operate a summer camp in 17 different geographical locations throughout the City of Jacksonville; giving the Children's Commission the geographic coverage that it needs to meet the needs of the children.

Just as the other approved agencies, and camp site locations, the Department of Recreation and Community Services will be required to adhere to the guidelines set forth by the Children's Commission, and will be monitored for program quality. With this inclusion, 27 agencies are being recommended for funding.

Applications were also submitted from the organizations listed below; however, they did not score 75 or above, making them ineligible for funding.

The 27 approved agencies will provide high quality 4 week summer camps in 84 different locations, serving approximately 5,675 children. Please note that these numbers do not include the 5 additional Camp sites funded via 21st Century Grant Dollars that will reach about 745 children. When combining all site locations and the number of children served, the Children's Commission will have 89 different locations, and will serve approximately 6,400 children.

Additional dollars of \$142,450 will be used to allow the highest scoring agencies to expand their program from 4 weeks to 5 weeks if they choose to do so.

FISCAL IMPACT:

An amount of \$1,828,841 was budgeted to fund summer programs. This includes the Children's Commission funding of \$747,441 and the Jacksonville Journey funding of \$1,081,400. A total of \$1,672,500 is being allocated to the 27 qualified providers, and \$13, 891 is being set aside for Northshore 21st Century site to operate an additional 2 weeks of summer camp.

After the above allocations, the remaining balance from the summer camp budget is \$142, 450.

GOVERNANCE/PROGRAM IMPACT:

These programs provide four weeks of high quality summer care, consistent with JCC's philosophy of securing the best services for children through a competitive grant process. Staff will monitor all camps for quality and safety.

OPTIONS:

- 1. Vote to approve
