The Senior Services Division provides services for Jacksonville's residents, which support successful aging and promote the realization of one's greatest potential. Various programs and activities provide for the safety and enjoyment of life. Volunteer opportunities and maximization of self-sufficiency ensure older adults can lead a life of independence and dignity to the greatest extent possible—in accordance with their wishes and desires.

Community and Senior Centers:

Some of the many activities offered to persons age 60 and above at our senior centers include cultural, social, educational and recreational programs, computer classes, exercise and dance classes, crafts, card games and sports. Free nutritional meals are served daily to all participants. Nutrition education programs are featured regularly at each center as well as fitness programs for seniors' health and wellness. Several locations schedule weekly dances, some with live bands. These facilities are also available for rental to the public for meetings, conferences, dinners, receptions and other private functions.

Eligibility guidelines include low-income individuals who are in good physical health and can provide a minimum of 15 hours of service per week. Tax-free hourly stipends are available for income eligible seniors.

Independent Living Program (ILP):

ILP administers the Respite for Elders Living in Everyday Families (RELIEF) and Senior Companion programs, which provide an average of four to six hours of in-home and center-based respite care at no cost to low-income families. These services assist to prevent premature institutionalization and elder abuse, allowing individuals to "age in place" in their own home and/or familiar environment.

Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP):

RSVP volunteers age 55 and over make a difference in the community by participating in assignments at schools, hospitals, nursing homes or the military.

RSVP TaleTellers read to Duval County Public School pre-kindergarten and kindergarten children who come from disadvantaged families. TaleTellers are provided with training, reading techniques, child development, cultural diversity and other topics that increase their effectiveness. RSVP volunteers are vital to the daily operations of our senior centers assisting with meal service and other senior activities. Nearly 1,000 senior volunteers contribute more than 200,000 hours of service to the community annually.

These are just a small sampling of the events coming to town. With so many sporting events to choose from, Jacksonville is sure to have a game for every fan.




Eat Smart in a Lean Kitchen

There are an abundance of choices in our food-frenzied marketplace, but always remember that good nutrition begins at home. Cooking meals for just one or two people can seem like a daunting task, with the potential for wasted food, but the reality can be much different. A properly stocked kitchen, with the right set of tools, can put you on track towards smarter eating.

First things first—ditch the 'unitaskers.' These are the kitchen tools that only have one useful function and will clog your cabinets. Rice cookers, ice cream makers and countertop apple corers are all items that take up too much room while offering little utility in return. Clearing out this kitchen clutter can prevent an early surrender when embarking upon your renewed cooking efforts. After the flour dust has settled, make sure you keep these items within arm's reach:










- 1. Notebook: Although it is not a tool typically associated with cooking, a notebook can be a used to write weekly menus. Set aside time each week to plan your meals and make sure your ingredient inventory levels stay up to par.
- **2. Microwavable containers and bowls:** It is important to have storage containers that are microwave safe for rapid reheating. Heatproof glass or microwave-safe plastics are well suited for the task. The bowls can also be used for mixing.
- **3. Mesh strainer:** The mesh versions offer more flexibility than plastic colanders, which typically have larger holes. The strainer can be used to rinse produce and canned foods, in addition to draining pastas and noodles.
- **4. Wooden spoons:** These spoons are the best for several reasons. They do not transfer heat or scratch the surface of your pans. Wooden spoons also do not react with acids in foods like some metal spoons are known to do.
- **5. Measuring cups:** If you are adapting recipes for a smaller audience, you may also need to make more precise measurements. Keep a set of measuring cups and spoons on hand at all times.

- **6. Non-stick pan:** A 12-inch skillet offers a wide range of cooking flexibility. However, do not be fooled into overpaying for this piece of equipment since the protective coatings eventually diminish and food begins to stick, no matter the price tag. This tool may need to be replaced every two years.
- **7. Knives:** These are often sold by the block, but you only need a few knives to cut a great deal of time from your preparations. Keep a chef's knife, a paring knife and a serrated bread knife front and center
- **8. Cutting boards:** The more the merrier as you should always use separate cutting boards for meats and produce. Wooden, plastic or bamboo are fine, just as long as you keep them clean and dry between uses.
- **9. Peeler:** This quintessential time saver removes the skins of fruits and vegetables in seconds, rather than minutes. Look for peelers with a comfortable, non-slip handle so when the job is done you can give yourself a pat on the back.
- **10. Thermometer:** You cannot tell meat is done just by looking at it. Use a probe thermometer to make sure harmful bacteria has been destroyed by cooking meat to a safe internal temperature.

Lastly, when evaluating nutrition advice always consider the source. Consult with a registered dietitian (R.D.) for professional and individualized suggestions that will make a difference for you.

Protecting Yourself from West Nile Virus

There are currently three major types of encephalitis of concern in Duval County—Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE), St. Louis encephalitis (SLE) and West Nile virus (WNV). Experts believe WNV is established as a seasonal epidemic in North America that flares up in the summer and continues into the fall. In recent years, Jacksonville has seen an increase in human WNV cases. This virus is a mosquito-borne disease that usually results in a mild infection; however, it can result in severe illness. Encephalitis is transmitted by the bite of a mosquito that becomes infected with the virus. Mosquitoes become infected by feeding on birds that carry the encephalitis virus. Infected mosquitoes can then spread the virus to humans and animals when they bite. According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), anyone can become infected with WNV, however, people with weakened immune systems and those over the age of 50 are at higher risk for developing more serious symptoms when infected.



The easiest and best way to avoid WNV is to prevent mosquito bites. When you are outdoors, use insect repellents containing an EPA-registered insect repellent. Follow the directions on the package. Good products include one of the following ingredients: DEET, Picardin (KBR 3023), IR3535 or oil of lemon eucalyptus. Many mosquitoes are most active at dusk and dawn. Be sure to use insect repellent and wear long sleeves and pants at these times or consider staying indoors during these hours. Make sure you have good screens on your windows and doors to keep mosquitoes out. If you find any holes, have them repaired. Get rid of mosquito breeding sites by emptying standing water from flower pots, buckets and barrels. Change the water in pet dishes and replace the water in bird baths weekly.

Your New Best Friend is Waiting for You





The Animal Care and Protective Services Division ensures that animals are properly treated and controlled. For many residents, its most important function is to serve as a source for healthy, adoptable pets. The division implements and enforces laws, regulations, codes and procedures concerning the treatment of domesticated animals.

Our employees consist of administrative personnel, animal control officers, kennel staff, vet technicians and veterinarians—all who want our dogs and cats to be adopted. (We receive approximately 20,000 per year.)

While our dogs and cats are here, we want them to feel as comfortable as possible. Animals are fed and kennels are cleaned once a day. The dogs have Kuranda beds to sleep on and Kong dog toys to play with. The cats have toys and are given towels and beds to cuddle with as well.

Our objective is to find a home for every single dog and cat we receive. We strive to ensure animals placed in homes are adoption-friendly and have the potential to become a valued addition to the family.

Regular Adoption Fees are:

Puppies under 3 years old: \$80 Cats under 1 year old: \$60 Cats more than 1 year old: \$20

All dogs and cats 3 years and older: No adoption fee Pets adopted by seniors 65 and older are FREE

The adoption fee includes heartworm screening, spay/neuter, microchip, initial checkup and shots (includes rabies vaccine—see below). A \$20 animal license fee is required at the time of adoption for animals at least 4 months old.

Adoption requirements ensure each animal is placed in an appropriate home; we screen potential adopters during the application process. The basic requirements are as follows:

- Adopter must be 18 years of age or older.
- A photo ID is required.
- Proof of current rabies and city license must be provided for any animals currently in the household.
- If the property is not owned by the adopter, approval is required by the property owner.

Pets can also help improve our health. They may lower blood pressure, help people with Alzheimer's, help lower stress and more. This may be why people have their dog "Pet Therapy" registered or certified before going into nursing homes and other related facilities.

The Military Affairs, Veterans and Disabled Services Department provides vital services to a population of active duty military, veterans and disabled communities that comprises more than 275,000 citizens.

Military Affairs, Veterans and Disabled Services (MAVDS) performs the following major functions:

First, we are an advocate for the expansion of military infrastructure, personnel and jobs within the City of Jacksonville and throughout Northeast Florida. The department annually manages multiple grants that support the infrastructure and environment around our community's military bases. The department team works closely with military, business, community and elected leaders at the local, state and national levels to deliver a compelling message that Jacksonville is the most military and veteran-friendly city in the United States, and that Jacksonville is strategically important to the security posture of the nation.

Second, the MAVDS department is committed to delivering timely and competent services to our large and growing veteran community. The MAVDS staff is ready to assist veterans, their survivors and caregivers who seek access to pensions, health care, disability ratings, GI Bill and other earned benefits. MAVDS also provides career assistance, housing opportunities, training and social services to homeless veterans that reside in Duval County.

Third, the MAVDS department serves citizens with disabilities, through the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance and enforcement, in addition to providing information and referral services, special events and training. The Disabled Services



office plays a key role ensuring that all city services and programs are accessible to people with disabilities while also providing informal guidance and resources as it relates to accessibility and ADA to the private sector.

Fourth, the MAVDS department oversees and maintains a Jobs-For-Vets website, a recently launched initiative by Mayor Brown designed to connect job seeking veterans to veteran-friendly employers in the City of Jacksonville and throughout Northeast Florida.

The Municipal Code Compliance Division (Property Code Enforcement) enforces Chapter 518 - Property Safety and Maintenance Code, and Chapter 656 - Zoning Code, which address:


- Nuisance conditions—overgrowth, weeds, trash, debris, etc.
- Property maintenance and housing safety
- Unsafe structures
- Junk and abandoned vehicles
- All zoning-related violations

The City of Jacksonville acknowledges the need to enforce a certain level of property maintenance and ensure a reasonable quality of life for the city's residents and neighborhoods. Citizens play an integral role in keeping our community attractive, clean and safe. Through education and awareness, we may all contribute to making Jacksonville the best city in which to live, work and raise a family.

Most common violations cited by the Municipal Code Compliance Division:

- Junk (inoperable) and/or abandoned vehicles (expired tags or missing license plates)
- Accumulation of garbage, rubbish, trash and/or debris
- Unsafe buildings/structures
- Substandard exterior or interior conditions at residential or commercial buildings
- Excessive growth of weeds, grass and/or noxious vegetation
- Potentially dangerous dead trees and/or limbs on privately-owned properties

- Conditions that may breed or harbor insects or rodents
- Unmaintained swimming pools
- Dangerous or deteriorated electrical fixtures, wiring or devices
- Fences, gates or accessory structures in disrepair
- Structural deterioration, rotten wood and/or peeling paint
- Improper stacking or storage of materials
- Unsanitary conditions
- Failure to maintain minimum residential and commercial standards
- Zoning—unpermitted land use
- Zoning—parking of commercial vehicles on residential property
- Zoning—inadequate off-street parking
- Zoning—operating a business in a residentiallyzoned area



Unsafe Structures

The Property Safety and Maintenance Code authorizes the Municipal Code Compliance Division to condemn any structure that is structurally unsound and/or unsafe. If necessary, the city may take action to demolish the structure. Failure by owner(s) to correct violations may result in referral of the owner to a special magistrate for prosecution, which may result in property fines and/or demolition by a city contractor.

Nuisance Property Conditions

High grass, trash and/or debris on vacant lots, and vacant, open or unguarded structures constitute nuisance violations. Failure to correct violations of this section may result in removal of violations or board-up of an open structure by a city contractor (abatement) with subsequent costs placed on the property (liens). In addition, repeat violations may also result in a referral of the owner to a special magistrate for prosecution and possible subsequent fines.

Junk/Abandoned Vehicles

"Junk vehicles" are defined as inoperable vehicles, which threaten or endanger public safety or welfare; create a blighting influence upon the neighborhood where the vehicle rests; or are, or may reasonably become, infested or inhabited by rodents, vermin or other animals, or may furnish a breeding place for rodents, vermin or animals.

"Abandoned vehicles" are defined as vehicles that do not bear a license plate, or on which the displayed license plate is invalid, unless said vehicle is stored within a completely enclosed building, on a bona fide sales lot, or on an automobile storage or wrecking yard, which threaten or endanger public safety or welfare; create a blighting influence upon the neighborhood where the vehicle rests; or are, or may reasonably become, infested or inhabited by rodents, vermin or other animals.

"Inoperable," when referring to a vehicle, means the vehicle is incapable of being immediately driven, moved or pulled in the manner for which it is intended or designed.

Zoning

The Zoning Code regulates the use of land and buildings. The following items are examples of common Zoning Code issues frequently enforced by the Municipal Code Compliance Division:

- No fence or wall in excess of eight feet in height shall be permitted in a residential district and further, no fence in excess of four feet in height shall be permitted in a required front yard in a residential district.
- No person shall sell or conduct the sale of household or personal property, not including animals, in a residential district for more than 10 days during a calendar year.
- The following vehicles shall not be parked in off-street parking lots; in access to highways; on private property in a residential district; or in the CO, CRO, CCG-1 or CN districts, or on any public right-of-way in a residential, CO, CRO, CCG-1 or CN district:
 - 1. Heavy trucks and truck tractors for commercial use
 - 2. Motor vehicles equipped with machinery
 - 3. School buses
 - 4. Commercial wreckers
 - 5. Hearses
 - 6. Ambulances
 - 7. Passenger vehicles for ten or more persons
- Non-conforming land use in a residential area is not permitted or permissible by exception through the Planning and Development Department.

CPACs - A Resource in Your Community



Jacksonville's more than 500 neighborhoods are divided into six planning districts, each with a Citizens Planning Advisory Committee (CPAC). The primary purpose of the CPAC is to maintain open and effective communication between Jacksonville residents, businesses, neighborhoods, community organizations, educational institutions and city government.

Effective government requires meaningful citizen participation. Broad-based public involvement in planning, land use, zoning, transportation, community services, economic development,


recreation, schools, police and public safety are absolutely essential. Citizens of any neighborhood within a planning district may attend meetings to learn more about issues affecting their community.

AgeWell's New Concept in Health Care



Maybe it's making it to weekly lunch with old friends from your neighborhood, or watching your grandchildren play soccer on a Saturday morning. Whatever the activity, it's difficult for seniors, physically and psychologically, when their health starts to prevent them from doing the little things they enjoy the most.

In many cases, seeing a geriatrician who is specially trained in the health issues seniors face as they age can make enough small changes to get your health back on track.

At the Baptist AgeWell Center for Senior Health, patients have the luxury of an interdisciplinary team that includes a geriatrician, pharmacist, mental health provider, dietitian, care coordinator and rehabilitation therapists. This system assesses the whole person's needs rather than focusing on treating a specific medical condition, and the patient's health and personal goals are the foundation of care.

The first patient visit is a complete geriatric assessment—a comprehensive evaluation of all the physical, psychosocial and environmental factors that can affect the health and wellness of older adults. The average AgeWell patient is 82 years old and is on 12 different prescription medications. The clinical pharmacist can make tremendous improvements in a person's life by simply adjusting medications and removing some that may not be necessary or that are duplicative. Changes can even be as basic as moving the time a patient takes a diuretic so they won't have to get up several times during their Thursday morning card game.

After the visit, members of the interdisciplinary team meet to discuss the needs and, most importantly, the goals of the patient. Based on the findings of the geriatric assessment, an integrated care plan is developed and a care coordinator, who is a qualified social worker, works with the patient. The care coordinator also works with the patient's family, primary care physician and the rest of the multidisciplinary team to implement the plan.

The care plan also incorporates a Health Passport, which includes prescription history and reminders for various milestone tests. Patients are encouraged to bring the passport to all of their medical encounters, not only to record the new events, but also to provide history to those delivering care.

AgeWell is available to patients 65 or older with multiple or complex issues affecting their daily life. Some of the more common issues include:

- · Memory loss
- Decline in function or ability to care for oneself
- Multiple ER visits or unplanned hospitalizations
- Multiple prescribed medications
- Diagnosis of multiple diseases or conditions
- Compromised caregiver support

Having a clear care plan directed by a geriatrician can improve a senior's health and functional independence, as well as improve access to care for routine examinations and appointments.

Seniors vs. Crime



The Jacksonville Sheriff's Office (JSO) has been working with the Attorney General's Office to help prevent seniors from being the victims of fraud. The Seniors vs. Crime Project educates Florida seniors about economic crimes, frauds and scams, and rights civil wrongs perpetrated by cheats, including deceptive contractors, repairmen and car dealers. Seventeen senior volunteers work with members of the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office to address various issues.

The volunteers in Duval County work in three JSO substations:

- Zone 2 9501 Regency Square Boulevard
- Zone 4 3726 Blanding Boulevard
- Zone 6 936 Dunn Avenue

In 2011, Seniors vs. Crime in Duval County assisted 92 seniors with advice to solve their own civil issues; assisted 51 seniors with complaints resulting in more than \$300,000 in the return of money and/or services; aided law enforcement by referring cases that led to four arrests; and referred one case to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and another to the Attorney General's Office. All in all, the volunteers put in 926 hours of service.

The Seniors vs. Crime Project traces its roots back to 1989, when the Florida Legislature ordered a task force to be formed to report on crimes against the elderly. Through a series of public meetings and surveys, it was discovered that the elderly were being targeted by scammers, subjected to sales fraud and deceived by false advertising.

Seniors are very willing to assist law enforcement in fighting crime. A member of the task force, Vern Thornton, is credited with creating the Seniors vs. Crimes Project, which was implemented by the Florida Office of the Attorney General, and trains seniors in the various ways they can both assist law enforcement and prevent other senior citizens from being victimized.

Volunteers with this program, called Senior Sleuths, are the eyes and ears of law enforcement. A Sleuth can observe a bad practice and report through a chain of command to the Attorney General's Office, usually by email. Their work includes simple tasks as well as more complicated undercover stings, which capture salespeople utilizing high-pressure tactics and engaging in false and deceptive practices. An example is the use of undercover Senior Sleuths to assist the Florida Department of Law Enforcement with deceptive practice cases against water treatment companies in the Tampa area.

There are two primary educational programs—Florida Seniors Against Investment Fraud (FSAIF) and Senior Medicare and Medicaid Patrol (SMMP). FSAIF teaches seniors how to avoid becoming victims of financial fraud. SMMP educates seniors on how to read medical billings, identify questionable charges and procedures and teaches seniors who to contact about their suspicions. And there are other education programs, such as how to watch for identity theft.

Statewide, the Seniors vs. Crime Project volunteers worked 2,425 cases, resulting in the following:

- 588 cases were determined to be unworkable
- 1,416 were minor cases, where assistance was provided
- 520 cases were resolved
- 485 cases resulted in the recovery of money, with a total of \$623,071 returned to seniors
- Services were arranged at a value of \$1,656,811 (non-cash resolutions, such as new paint on a defective paint job)
- 123 referrals to law enforcement (instrumental in nine arrests)
- 429 educational presentations conducted
- 35,470 volunteer hours contributed
- 206 clients referred to other agencies for assistance

The Seniors vs. Crime Project is funded primarily by settlements reached by the Florida Attorney General with companies who have been investigated for defrauding the elderly. No tax money is involved.

Seniors vs. Crime is always looking for clients who need help and volunteers who can provide that help. Volunteers are trained and supervised by manager volunteers for each office. 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Environmental Protection Board

The Environmental Protection Board (EPB) was established foremost as an enforcement body for environmental matters in Duval County. The EPB receives its authority from Chapter 73, Ordinance Code, and Chapters 360 et sequence, Ordinance Code. The board develops regulations necessary for administration and enforcement of the city's environmental laws. It conducts investigations of complaints, takes testimony in matters under its jurisdiction and provides a hearing platform for environmental matters within the city. The board works very closely with the Environmental Quality Division of the Neighborhoods Department. This division is the operational arm of environmental regulation within the city.

In carrying out its responsibilities, the board cooperates with all federal, state and local agencies, as well as with groups interested in the field of environmental quality control, to improve the regulation, administration and enforcement of the environmental quality of the city. Holding public hearings, arranging programs with speakers who are experts in the field of pollution control, water supply and conservation, and environmental quality control programs in other areas are also essential for the board to carry out its scope of duties as established by Chapter 73, Ordinance Code.

Although many of the functions of the EPB are regulatory in nature, the EPB is charged with educating citizens regarding environmental matters. To this end, the EPB developed an extensive public outreach program that includes sponsoring environmental conferences, being very involved in the local Earth Day Jax Committee and other environmental events annually. The EPB is also involved in sponsoring two free environmental education days at the Museum of Science and History; sponsoring a county-wide Earth Day Poster Contest for all school children in Duval County; and making presentations to school groups from Pre-K through college students and all types of community organizations.

The members of the board are appointed by the Mayor and City Council for four-year terms. They are chosen to represent business and industry, conservationist organizations, professional engineers, the medical profession and the general public.

Regular board meetings are typically held on the second Monday of the month at 5 p.m. at 214 North Hogan Street, 5th Floor, Conference Room West.

Most of the routine assessment of operations and enforcement actions are carried out first in standing committees of the board, which meet at least once per month.

The Water Committee meets on Monday during the third FULL week of the month at 4:30 p.m.

Bathtub Restoration: Things to Consider

Acrylic vs. Tile

Various forms of tile and grout have long been the standard product used for most bath and shower areas. Although tile and grout offer choices for consumers like colors, shapes and designs, these few attributes only last for a short time before the real problems appear.

Tile and grout materials are porous in nature, and even if a sealant is used, it will only last temporarily before needing to be reapplied—which most people don't take the time to do. These problems force you to clean with abrasive or toxic chemicals, only to frustratingly have it return over and over again. As a result of using harsh or abrasive chemicals, you're actually causing the grout to deteriorate even faster, thus creating a larger issue—holes or penetrations in the grout lines.

This condition most commonly occurs without being noticed because even a very small hole in the grout will easily allow water to seep through to the drywall or wood stud structure area behind the tiles. Usually, the homeowner does not realize this problem until wall tiles become loose or fall off into the tub or shower area. Damage occurring at this stage is usually beyond minor repairs. A complete tear-out and rebuild of the wall area is required, which is a very expensive repair and usually takes several days or weeks to complete.

Fortunately, these problems can largely be avoided by choosing an acrylic bathtub. Acrylic bathtubs and seamless wall liners allow you to keep your existing tile and tub in place—assuming it is not damaged as described above. Acrylic bathtubs and showers can also be installed in new construction projects or in place of traditional tile and grout for damaged areas. Acrylic that is manufactured from raw materials with an acrylonitrile butadiene styrene (ABS) backing is ideal, and should measure one-quarter inch thick for bathtubs or shower bases and one-eighth inch thick for seamless wall liners.

Acrylic products offer several immediate, yet long lasting, benefits to the consumer and to the environment, including:

- Acrylic saves consumers money and time. Consumers do not have to remove existing products, which eliminates lengthy downtime, dust, debris, noise and frustrations associated with traditional retiling projects.
- Acrylic products can typically be installed in only one day, getting you and your bath area, back in business faster.
- Using acrylic liners avoids adding to already overcrowded landfills, helping to keep the environment much greener and safer for generations to come.
- Acrylic is a great thermal insulator and maintains water temperature longer, allowing you to enjoy extended bathing times.
- Acrylic is non-porous, which means soap scum, mold and mildew will not form on the surface. Keeping acrylic clean can be as simple as using vinegar and water or other non-abrasive cleaners.
- Acrylic won't crack, peel, fade, chip or discolor, so your bath area will look and perform like new for many worry-free years.
- Acrylic products are offered in a wide variety of tile patterns, textures and colors, which make this truly unique product even more appealing to consumers.



Don't take baths any more? Not to worry—there is another option to consider. Replacing the bath tub with an acrylic freestanding shower or low threshold wheelchair accessible shower are two options available.

Typical items to consider when converting a bath tub to a shower include adding safety grab rails in strategic locations for easy ingress and egress or a fold-up acrylic seat for convenience and safety while in the shower. Additionally, a handheld shower head with slide bar allows each user to customize his or her shower by placing the shower head in a variety of positions, or removing it from the slide bar to apply water pressure in trouble spots of the body. Lastly, adding acrylic accessories such as corner shelves, soap dishes and towel bars maximizes the convenience of your new space. Acrylic and accessory items are color matched and positionable to your specific needs.

Robotic Surgery: A New Wave of Technology

Catch a glimpse into the future of medical procedures by diving deeper into the world of robotic urology surgeries. Compared to traditional scalpel induced surgical procedures, robotic procedures are performed using a state-of-the-art surgical system designed to help your surgeon perform a minimally invasive surgery through small incisions. Through these tiny, 1 to 2 centimeter incisions, surgeons can operate with greater precision and control to minimize the pain and risk associated with large incisions, while increasing the likelihood of a fast recovery and maintaining excellent clinical outcomes. By introducing miniature wristed instruments and a high-definition 3-D camera, your surgeon views a magnified high-resolution 3-D image of the surgical site while seated comfortably at the console.

At the same time, state-of-the-art robotic and computer technologies scale, filter and seamlessly translate your surgeon's hand movements into precise micro-movements of the robotic instruments. The

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system cannot be programmed and it cannot make decisions on its own. Instead, it requires every surgical maneuver be performed with direct input from your surgeon.

Consider for a moment hearing you need gynecologic surgery. For women facing gynecologic procedures, the period of pain, discomfort and extended time away from normal daily activities usually following traditional surgery can understandably cause significant anxiety. What if you could take that all away with a new kind of surgical procedure? With the controversy swirling around traditional placed vaginal mesh to correct the anatomical position of a vaginal prolapse, robotic sacrocolpopexy is a great alternative for candidates. For most women, robotic sacrocolpopexy offers numerous potential benefits over a traditional open approach including, significantly less pain, less blood loss and need for transfusions, less risk of infection, less scarring, a shorter hospital stay, shorter recovery time and a quicker return to normal activities.

Another minimally invasive procedure boasting excellent benefits to its recipients is the robotic prostate cancer surgery. About 16 percent of American men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer. Fortunately, early detection is on the rise and mortality rates are declining thanks to greater public awareness. Prostate cancer is a disease in which malignant cells form in the tissue of the prostate gland in the male reproductive system, located just below the bladder and in front of the rectum. The traditional surgical removal of the prostate gland involves an open surgery resulting in an 8 to 10 inch incision and leads to substantial blood loss, a lengthy and painful recovery, and the risk of impotence and incontinence (bladder problems). The robotic prostatectomy, however, is less invasive, more precise and less painful.

With the robotic surgery options now available, surgeons are rewriting standards for surgical procedures and forever changing the experience of surgery for the better.







A multi-funded agency that provides many services and programs for people 60+, who are physically frail or disabled. All programs are designed to assist individuals to remain in their own homes. Fees are assessed for some services depending on program guidelines. Some fees are based on the individual's ability to pay.

- Caregiver Support Services Support groups, individual and group training, RELIEF, IIIE, respite and caregiver mentor services are available to those caring for their frail and elderly loved ones (60+) who require a full-time caregiver. Companionship and telephone reassurance services are available to those frail elderly (60+) who are alone and need assistance in order to remain independent.
- Community Care for the Elderly Provides case management and essential social services to maintain the frail elderly (60+) at home and assist caregivers of the frail elderly. Services vary according to clients' needs, but can include personal care, homemaking, adult day care, medical transportation, respite care, chores, and emergency alert response services.
- Emergency Alert Response Systems (EARS) Provides personal emergency response equipment to allow frail individuals to summon aid when in distress by pressing a button worn on a pendant. Service includes daily monitoring and can be customized to clients' needs.
- Florida Self-Directed Care (SDC) Program The mission of Florida SDC is to create, maintain, and access an environment in which SDC participants freely navigate the road to recovery on their own terms, making informed choices along way to achieve a state of mental wellness and to return to, or achieve, a productive lifestyle, including employment.
- Home Health Services We are available for skilled nursing services, home health aides, rehabilitative therapies and medical social work. Our goal is to provide clients with appropriate safe, quality health care at home and to recognize them

- as individuals with unique health care needs. We provide considerate, respectful, skilled care by competent and compassionate professionals.
- Meals on Wheels Hot, nutritious meals delivered daily, five days-per-week to homebound, frail, elderly and disabled individuals living in Duval County. Meals are delivered by a combination of paid or volunteer staff. Individuals may also qualify for frozen weekend meals, or frozen meals in lieu of hot meals, under special circumstances.
- Financial Counseling Services Financial counseling, budgeting and daily money management for frail seniors and disabled individuals who require this assistance to remain independent. May also provide representative payee services, health care surrogate services, guardian advocate and guardianship services for frail seniors and disabled adults on a limited basis, as legally appropriate and necessary.
- The Mobile Assessment for Seniors (MAS) This program reduces isolation, depression, and other undiagnosed and untreated mental health conditions among older adults living in Duval County by providing in-home mental health assessment and referral services.
- "Get Back Into Life!" Group Therapy Program The goal of "Get Back Into Life!" is to improve the quality of life for isolated older adults with depression, anxiety, and grief and loss issues by decreasing symptoms of depression that interfere with the ability to actively engage in society. The group offers these older adults the opportunity to share with those who are experiencing similar situations, learn problem solving skills and adopt new ways of coping.
- Mental Health Counseling In-home mental health assessment and counseling to address the symptoms arising from the stresses of the aging process and the functional limitations of that process or disability.
- Targeted Mental Health Case Management Case management services for older adults with mental illness.
- Relatives as Parents Program of Jacksonville (RAPPJAX) The Relatives as Parents Program of Jacksonville (RAPPJAX) provides educational/support groups for grandparents and other relatives raising children throughout Duval County. The RAPPJAX program also offers a network of community resources, trainings,

seminars and special events for relative caregivers raising children.

• Senior Connections Long-Term Nursing Home Diversion Program - This program is designed for seniors age 65+ who need help to remain at home or live in an assisted living facility. The program provides a wide range of services to make it easier for seniors to get the care needed to live safely and independently in a community setting, such as their own home or assisted living facility. The program also pays medical co-payments/deductibles while allowing the member to continue to see their personal providers. Senior Connections coordinates all your services with qualified providers of your choice. THERE IS NO COST for this program except for assisted living and long-term nursing stays. The program requires a functional eligibility determination and a financial eligibility determination.



If you are registering for the first time, you must do so 29 days prior to the election in order to vote in that election. After registering, you will receive a voter information card in the mail. If you have already registered, it's important the Supervisor of Elections Office has your current signature, address and party affiliation on file. If you need to change your address, name, party affiliation, or submit your updated signature, please call **630-1414** for instructions.

• Voting – Your voter registration card will identify your precinct and polling location on Election Day. Absentee and early voting are alternative options to voting on Election Day. Florida Election Law requires a photo and signature identification (ID) at the polling place.



The Behavioral and Human Services Division provides an **Emergency Assistance Program** to serve eligible households and individuals who are facing financial difficulties due to an unexpected emergency. The crisis generally involves the loss of a job, loss or reduction of household income, unexpected medical expenses, car repairs, a family dissolution, death in the family or an expense due to foreclosure, condemnation, fire or disaster. The program provides temporary financial assistance to prevent eviction for non-payment of rent/mortgage or interruption of utilities.

Specific guidelines and policies are used to determine eligibility, level of financial assistance and other needed resources. Rent, mortgage and utility payments are made directly to the supplier in an amount and for a period of time specified by policy. On a daily basis, trained staff is available to provide temporary financial intervention and basic case management services in order to stabilize the household's overall well-being. Additionally, participation in a two-hour budgeting and money

management workshop is an integral part of the financial intervention and case plan.

Available Services

- Temporary financial assistance with rent, mortgage and/or utility needs.
- Wintertime heating and fuel oil assistance for eligible elderly individuals ages 64 years and older and disabled adults.
- Temporary financial assistance and coordinated case management for eligible individuals living with HIV/AIDS.

Other resources may be explored to help address the needs of the household. As a result, applicants will be asked to sign a release form for the purpose of sharing information with other agencies that provide services.

Qualifying for Financial Assistance

- You must be a Duval County resident.
- Your household income must not exceed 135 percent of the federal poverty level.
- You must be in a documentable crisis situation.
- You must have an eviction, foreclosure or shut-off notice or loss of utility service.
- You must meet the established eligibility guidelines and provide proof of eligibility.
- You must not have received financial assistance from our program within the past 30 months.
- You must have had the capacity to meet basic needs before suffering the current financial hardship.
- You must provide a picture ID for the applying client and all adults in the household.
- You must provide Social Security documentation for all household members.
- You must provide proof of all household income and resources for the past 45 days.

- You must provide a lease agreement and copy of eviction notice.
- You must provide utility shut-off notice if applicable.

The state agency that administers Florida Medicaid is the Agency for Health Care Administration (AHCA). AHCA provides information and referral assistance to beneficiaries, as well as technical assistance and policy interpretation to other agencies, medical providers and the general public. AHCA has 11 area offices throughout the state that serve as the local liaisons to providers and beneficiaries. Two basic groups of people are eligible for Medicaid: low income children and families; and the aged, blind and disabled. Within these two groups, there are several categories of eligibility. In addition to qualifying under one of these two basic groups, an eligible Medicaid beneficiary must meet income and asset limits. These vary by category. SNFs are licensed and inspected by the State of Florida and SNUs are licensed as part of a hospital.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYER: Each Florida resident applying for a total and permanent disability exemption must present to the county property appraiser, on or before March 1 of each year, a copy of this form or a letter from the United States Department of Veteran Affairs or its predecessor. Each form is to be completed by a licensed Florida physician.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYER AND PHYSICIAN: Section 196.131(2), Florida Statutes, provides that any person who shall knowingly and willfully give false information for the purpose of claiming homestead exemption shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable by a term of imprisonment not exceeding one year, or a fine not exceeding \$5,000, or both.

NOTE: Disclosure of your social security number is mandatory. It is required by sections 196.011(1) and 196.101(5), Florida Statutes. The social security number will be used to verify taxpayer identity information and homestead exemption information submitted to property appraisers.

HEALTH CARE ADVANCE DIRECTIVES - THE PATIENT'S RIGHT TO DECIDE

All adult individuals in health care facilities such, as hospitals, nursing homes, hospices, home health agencies and health maintenance organizations have certain rights under Florida law.

You have a right to fill out a document known as an "Advance Directive." The document says in advance what kind of treatment you want or do not want under special, serious medical conditions—conditions that would stop you from telling your doctor how you want to be treated. For example, if you were taken to a health care facility in a coma, would you want the facility's staff to know your specific wishes about decisions affecting your treatment?

WHAT IS AN ADVANCE DIRECTIVE?

An Advance Directive is a written or oral statement that is made and witnessed in advance of serious illness or injury about how you want medical decisions made. Two forms of an Advance Directive are:

- Living Will
- Health Care Surrogate Designation

An Advance Directive allows you to state your choices about health care, or to name someone to make those choices for you if you become unable to make decisions about your medical treatment. An Advance Directive can enable you to make decisions about your future medical treatment.

WHAT IS A LIVING WILL?

A Living Will generally states the kind of medical care you want or do not want if you become unable to make your own decisions. It is called a Living Will because it takes effect while you are still living. Florida law provides a suggested form for a Living Will. You may use it or some other form. You may wish to speak to an attorney or physician to be certain you have completed the Living Will in a way so that your wishes will be understood.

WHAT IS A HEALTH CARE SURROGATE DESIGNATION?

A Health Care Surrogate Designation is a signed, dated and witnessed document naming another person such as a husband, wife, daughter, son or close friend as your agent to make medical decisions for you, if you should become unable to make them for yourself. You can include instructions about any treatment you want or wish to avoid. Florida law provides a suggested form for designation of a health care surrogate. You may use it or some other form. You may wish to name a second person to stand in for you, if your first choice is not available.



WHICH IS BETTER?

You may wish to have both or combine them into a single document that describes treatment choices in a variety of situations, naming someone to make decisions for you should you be unable to make decisions for yourself.

DO I HAVE TO WRITE AN ADVANCE DIRECTIVE UNDER FLORIDA LAW?

No, there is no legal requirement to complete an Advance Directive. However, if you have not made an Advance Directive or designated a health care surrogate, health care decisions may be made for you by a court-appointed guardian, your spouse, your adult child, your parent, your adult sibling, an adult relative or a close friend in that order. This person is referred to as a "proxy."

CAN I CHANGE MY MIND AFTER I WRITE A LIVING WILL OR DESIGNATE A HEALTH CARE SURROGATE?

Yes, you can change or cancel these documents at any time. Any changes should be written, signed, and dated. You can also change an Advance Directive by oral statement.

WHAT IF I HAVE FILLED OUT AN ADVANCE DIRECTIVE IN ANOTHER STATE AND NEED TREATMENT IN A HEALTH CARE FACILITY IN FLORIDA?

An advance directive completed in another state, in compliance with the other state's law, can be honored in Florida.

WHAT SHOULD I DO WITH MY ADVANCE DIRECTIVE IF I CHOOSE TO HAVE ONE?

Make sure that someone such as your doctor, lawyer or family member knows that you have an Advance Directive and where it is located. Consider the following:

- If you have designated a health care surrogate, give a copy of the written designation form or the original to the person.
- Give a copy of your Advance Directive to your doctor for your medical file.
- Keep a copy of your Advance Directive in a place where it can be found easily.
- Keep a card or note in your purse or wallet that states you have an Advance Directive and where it is located.
- If you change your Advance Directive, make sure your doctor, lawyer and/or family member has the latest copy.
- If you need further information about an Advanced Directive, please consult with those who are in charge of your care.

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
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
