# MINUTES

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### Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 3:00 p.m. by Council Chair Antoinette Turner.

**Moment of Silence was observed.**

### NHAS Goals

Errol Schell read the NHAS (*National HIV/AIDS Strategy*) Goals.

### Roll Call

The Secretary took the roll and a quorum was declared. There were no Proxy Pool members to call to the Table.

### Approval of Minutes

Motion was made and seconded to accept the September 22, 2016 Minutes as corrected.

### **Administrative Agency Report**

Program Manager Sandy Arts started her report with a brief introduction on her background and work experience. She has been with the City of Jacksonville for 25 years, and has worked on a number of grant applications during this time. Ms. Arts stated that the 2017 application for Ryan White Part A was submitted on time. She noted that this year there is more emphasis on the HIV Continuum of Care in identifying unmet needs, gaps in care, and health outcomes. HRSA is also requiring that we be more specific about activities targeting Black MSM, Black females, and Black youth. Overall, the Jacksonville TGA is exceeding the state and nation in retaining people in care, starting them on antiretroviral therapy and reducing viral loads.

The World AIDS Day Luncheon will be Friday, December 2, and the following members have reserved a spot at the Planning Council table: Antoinette Turner, Kendall, Guthrie, Gloria Coon, Nathaniel Hendley, Veronica Hicks, Sharon Hunter, Terri Mims, Verlon Murray, Torrencia Shiloh, and Linda Williams.

The HRSA site visit, originally scheduled for December, is being re-scheduled for sometime between January and April 2017. Ms. Arts also announced that she will be traveling to Tampa next week for the Statewide Part A meeting, and she will share information with the Council during their next meeting.

Lastly, the Statewide Integrated HIV Prevention and Care Plan was submitted to HRSA. The entire plan for the state is over 840 pages. Now the real work ... the implementation, begins.

### **Lead Agency Report**

Max Wilson of the Part B Office announced that he will also be attending next week's PCPG/PPG meeting in Tampa, along with Sandra Ellis, Torrencia Shiloh, and Justin Bell.

Max spoke briefly about the state of Florida's plan to end new infections by the year 2020. The four key components of the plan to end new infections and extend the life of those living with HIV are:

- ♦ new and innovative strategies such as test and treat,
- ♦ nPEP and PrEP
- ♦ targeted and routine testing, and
- ♦ outreach and messaging

Max announced that JASMYN and the Department of Health have now enrolled their first PrEP client, so this program is now off the ground and running. UF CARES continues to be this community's leader in helping to establish nPEP resources, and have already assisted a number of people with that service.

Regarding the fourth strategy of outreach and messaging, Max asked for help. Open enrollment is nearly upon us and we will soon have to re-engage in our annual process of evaluating and determining the suitability of transitioning from a traditional ADAP plan for those who are enrolled into an ACA marketplace plan. The state of Florida has made a determination that where it is more cost effective, the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP) will pay the premiums of individuals for an ACA marketplace plan (Silver), where doing so is more cost-effective than just buying the medication. ADAP is, and must be understood to be, a medication adherence intervention first and foremost. It is not a financial assistance program; it is not an insurance alternative; it is a medication adherence program which shows in the overall program effectiveness. ADAP participants tend to demonstrate between 80-85% higher viral load suppression, and in our area it is somewhere around 86%. The decision to evaluate the cost of people's medication and weigh that against the cost of premiums for insurance that would include receiving that medication, as well as other insurance benefits, is one that we feel really good about, particularly since having now done it for two years in a row, we've been able to save enough money to seriously examine whether or not we need to expand the financial eligibility level from 250% of the Federal Poverty Level, up to 400%. We are currently evaluating that decision and it's likely that we'll actually be able to provide more ADAP services to a larger number of people because we're saving so much money in this decision to transition folks to Premium Plus. That said, the state of Florida has not expanded Medicaid, so the Department of Health is not able to facilitate ACA marketplace enrollment. However, there are a number of allies in the community who are able to help with enrollment. In this area, the ACA Navigators can be reached through the Health Planning Council of Northeast Florida, and you can call them at (877) 813-9115 to schedule an appointment or ask questions. Open enrollment begins November 1, and runs through January 31.

We do not yet know what premium plus plans we will have in this area, but as soon as we know, we will get that information out to you. It sounds like we will have multiple plans to choose from in this area. Plans vary by county and not by area.

One last note on ADAP: it does come with strings, and one of the strings that is most problematic of late is that a failure to pick up your medication in a timely fashion can result in the disenrollment from the program. We have transitioned to a new, wonderful, automated process called Provide Enterprise, that's our new information management

system, and there are great things about Provide Enterprise, but one of the not-so-great things is that it will automatically disenroll people when they don't pick up their medication. We are not able to over-ride the system, even when clients have a reasonable challenge that prevents them from a timely pick-up. We do not want to see our failure to pick-up rate becoming our disenrollment rate, so we really need help in getting this message out to the community that says 'if you're not going to pick your medication up, then call us (FDOH) and see if there is something we can do to get it to you.' Lastly, if you are picking it up from somewhere other than the DOH Pharmacy, or a pharmacy that communicates with us on a regular basis, you need to let us know. The reason is that if you pick up your medication elsewhere, and we don't know that you did pick-up, then the system will read it as though the medication was not picked up. This is a big change for us and we need help in getting that message out.

## Committee Reports

### Executive

Kendall Guthrie

The committee met earlier this month, and chairs gave a report on each of their committees. Staff provided training, and there will be additional training over the next few months.

### Membership

Nathaniel Hendley

Nathaniel reviewed the unaligned ratio and representation numbers with the Planning Council. Currently our unaligned ratio is 36.8%. Representation continues to be a challenge and Membership committee is looking to recruit qualified Black males and a Hispanic male in order to bring these numbers closer to what they should be.

During their last meeting, the committee interviewed two applicants, both of whom scored high enough to be presented to the Council. **The committee recommends that the Jacksonville Planning Council recommend Ne'Tosha Dopson to the Mayor's Office for appointment in the category of Health Care Provider.** There was no further discussion and the Council voted unanimously to recommend Ms. Dopson to the Mayor's Office.

The second **committee recommendation was that the Jacksonville Planning Council appoint Linda Williams to its Proxy Pool.** There being no further discussion, the Council then voted unanimously to appoint Ms. Williams to the Proxy Pool.

The Membership committee looked at qualifying members who could run for Planning Council office next year. The two open offices are Vice-Chair and PLWHA Representative,

and six members were deemed to be qualified, based on their attendance and leadership requirements. Those members are: Dana Barnes, Nathaniel Hendley, Sharon Hunter, Torrence Shiloh, Heather Vaughan, and Max Wilson. The floor was open for nominations, and members could also submit a nomination by email; the deadline for nominations was set for midnight, October 27. There were no nominations submitted during the Planning Council meeting.

#### PLWHAA

Gloria Coon

The committee met October 13; Heather Kilpatrick was one of the speakers and she talked about starting a project where PLWHA members who have skills, such as sewing, handyman, plumbing, etc., offer their services to other PLWHA who have a need. Beth Parker volunteered to coordinate this project. Ed Duda from Gilead was the other guest speaker who talked about preventative methods and personal responsibility.

The monthly auctions are continuing, and proceeds are now going toward 2017 scholarships for Positive Living Conference. The most recent item was a 2 carat Cubic Zirconia ring donated by Eric Peeples, and Debbi Carter was the highest bidder at \$55.00. The upcoming item is a blue tooth speaker and opening bid is \$65.00.

#### Pharmacy & Therapeutics

Dana Barnes

Dr. Barnes reported a short but powerful meeting of the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee on October 18. The committee was updated on the current Hep-C pilot program. Earlier in the year, approximately 25 bottles of Harvoni was purchased for this program; there is still enough left to treat about six people. PLWHAs who might benefit from this treatment should ask their provider to recommend them to the Comprehensive Care Center (CCC).

The committee reviewed a utilization report from the Department of Health. At this time there doesn't appear to be any medications to add or remove from the list. In July 2015, the Planning Council approved a motion to adopt the statewide formulary when it was finalized. This formulary was separate from the ADAP formulary. The state is still working on the formulary and there is no firm date on when it will be finalized; therefore, the committee is recommending that the Planning Council rescind that earlier motion. After some discussion, the motion was voted on and approved. The Planning Council will continue to use their local formulary; since there were two drugs approved in February (Pradaxa and Ceftriaxone), the current formulary should show a revised date of 02/25/16. At a later point

in time when the state finalizes its formulary, the Planning Council can look at that final version and discuss adoption again.

### **Unfinished Business**

Kendall explained the 'jargon cards' that were at members' tables. A member should hold up a jargon card whenever they feel a speaker is going overboard with jargon or abbreviations. Several members asked that jargon cards also be spread out to guests, so that guests and non-members alike will have a better chance at understanding the conversations. Staff agreed and more cards will be in the seating area going forward.

### **Program**

Several PLWHAA committee members who received Positive Living Scholarships shared with the Planning Council what they learned at this conference.

- ♦ Jerry Murray attended several different workshops and met a lot of people. The conference is impressive; it is for PLWHAs, put on by PLWHAs.
- ♦ Antoinette Turner said this was her second year attending. She said there were a lot of educational programs and of course, you met a lot of people. What impressed her was meeting several people who have been positive longer than she has.
- ♦ Terri Mims attended a couple of classes while there, and she also attended the Positive Women's Conference that was held just before Positive Living. She heard that there were several chapters in the North for Transgendered Women, and these chapters seem to be very active in the community. She also heard of several teenage girls who were told by their parents that they had a different medical condition, and didn't learn the truth that they were HIV until later. Terri was also impressed with the Quilt Opening Ceremony that Justin Bell coordinated.
- ♦ Verlon Murray attended a class on laughter. The instructor shared with the group how laughter not only improves your mood, but actually releases a chemical that helps.
- ♦ Torrencia Shiloh thanked everyone for their support throughout the year in donating items to auction, and for those who purchased the items. Through donations, they were able to provide scholarships to ten PLWHAA committee members. Qualifying for the 2017 scholarships will begin soon, and she will go over the criteria at the November PLWHAA meeting.

**INTERVIEWS:**

- ♦ The committee interviewed Linda Williams for a seat on the Proxy Pool. Antoinette Turner made a **motion**, seconded by Sharon Hunter, to **recommend that the Planning Council appoint Linda Williams to the Jacksonville Planning Council's Proxy Pool**. There was no further discussion and the motion passed.
- ♦ The committee next interviewed Ne'Tosha Dopson for a seat in the Health Care Provider, including FQHC, category. It was noted that although Ms. Dopson has been regularly attending Planning Council meetings, she has not yet had an opportunity to officially join a committee. A **motion** was made by Sharon Hunter, seconded by Gloria Coon, **that upon Ms. Dopson joining a committee, her name would then be submitted to the Council for their recommendation to Mayor Curry for appointment**. There was no further discussion and the motion passed.

## UNFINISHED BUSINESS

There was no unfinished business.

## NEW BUSINESS

- ♦ **Qualifying candidates:** Sandy handed out attendance sheets on Planning Council members which showed their combined attendance percentages. Membership Committee members identified those who had a combined attendance of at least 75%, and who had served at some point as a committee chair, co-chair, or officer. This left six (6) PC members who qualified: Dana Barnes, Nathaniel Hendley, Sharon Hunter, Torrencia Shiloh, Heather Vaughan, and Max Wilson. By acclamation, the Membership Committee accepted this as the list of qualified candidates who could run for office in 2017.
- ♦ **Slate of Candidates:** The Membership Committee next came up with candidates to put on the slate. Antoinette Turner nominated Nathaniel Hendley for Council Vice-Chair; this was seconded by Gloria Coon. Gloria Coon nominated Sharon Hunter for PLWHA Representative; this was seconded by Nathaniel Hendley. Both nominations were approved by acclamation. These are the only two offices to be voted on in December; Kendall Guthrie will move up to Planning Council Chair in January. This is the last term where a Vice-Chair automatically moves up. Beginning in 2018, the Planning Council Chair will be nominated and voted on, like the other two officers.
- ♦ **Nomination and Election Process:** Sandy will email everyone the list of members who are qualified to run. Additional nominations can be sent to Nathaniel between now and the Council meeting. Nominations from the floor of the October Planning Council meeting will be accepted. Only those who were qualified to run can be nominated. Nominations close at midnight October 27.

If there is only one person nominated for office, then the candidate's election can be accepted by acclamation at the December meeting, and a ballot will not be needed for that particular office.

If there are two or more candidates for an office, then voting will be done by ballot at the December 15 Planning Council meeting. New officers will be sworn in at the January Council meeting.

## STAFF REPORT

- **Applications:** Sandy reported that six people attended the September 22 Planning Council Orientation (f/k/a *New Member Orientation*). This included the two newest members of the Council, two applicants who were interviewed today, and two other applicants who are now ready to be interviewed. Additionally, there is one other applicant who is nearing the interview stage.

Nathaniel stressed again that we need to build up the Proxy Pool. Since there are more applicants ready to interview, and in light of the work Membership Committee needs to do to prepare for the 2017 election, Nathaniel called for committee meetings in November and December. The next meeting will be Wednesday, November 2 at 10:00 a.m.

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## CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 1:02 p.m. by Chair Dana Barnes.

## SELF-INTRODUCTIONS BY MEMBERS

## UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- Evaluation of the Hepatitis C Pilot Program: The APO reported that 25 bottles of the Hep-C medication had been purchased. Five patients were in the pilot program, and staff verified that they qualified as having no other payer source. There are 20 bottles left on the shelf which can treat six more patients. Several committee members stated that they would contact the other agencies to make sure they know that they can refer their Hep-C patients who might qualify.

## NEW BUSINESS

- Utilization Reports: The committee reviewed a utilization report submitted by the APO. There was no report submitted by AHF. The drug utilization report showed activity from March through August 2016, and listed the prescriptions filled. The list was from the state formulary and it did not show every drug listed, only those where a prescription had been filled.

- **Rescinding Earlier Motion:** Dr. Prier said the objective of the State Formulary was to have one list for the entire state, thereby replacing local formularies of EMA/TGAs. Question was asked if the State Formulary had been finalized yet, and the answer was that it had not. Dr. Prier offered to write the committee chair and ask when this formulary is expected to be finalized, and he will relay the answer to Dr. Barnes.

The Planning Council had voted in July 2015 to adopt the state's formulary as soon as it was finalized, and since that has not yet happened, the committee discussed whether it should rescind that action. A **motion** was made by Frank Emanuel, seconded by Sandra Ellis, **to recommend that the Jacksonville Planning Council rescind their decision to abide by the state formulary and go back to our old formulary.** There was no further discussion and a vote taken; 6 in favor, 0 opposed, and 1 abstention (Prier). The motion passed.

Staff was instructed to update the Jacksonville Planning Council's Formulary, and to email copies to committee members and the AHF Pharmacy.

## **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

- Question was asked if a particular medication was covered under either one of the formularies? The formulary provided at the committee meeting was from the State, and listed only medications that had been filled in Area 4 during the past six months or so. There was no copy provided of the Jacksonville TGA's formulary, which was last updated in 2013. The response was that even if a drug or medication wasn't on the formulary, an override could be written and approved, if the drug was medically necessary.

## **ANNOUNCEMENTS**

- Dr. Barnes shared that the PLWHAA Committee is auctioning a Cubic Zirconia ring. Proceeds go towards a scholarship for next year's Positive Living Conference.

## **ADJOURNMENT**

The meeting ended at approximately 1:30 p.m.
