Hope Crossing: Community Impact Spreading the Love Through Soup, Soap and Salvation



- Serve 155 residents each month 48 Family Section, Single Women in Crisis,
 Walk-In Community social services. Most impoverished and underserved within our community
- 51,856 nights of shelter last year
- Case management, advocacy, emergency financial assistance with rent and/or utilities, financial literacy, daily living skills, yoga, Taekwondo, Bible study, chapel services and more is offered to promote transitional support
- Provision of educational scholarships towards job related certifications, job
 placement assistance through resume building, interview skills, and referrals to
 community partners for mock interviews with corporations, professional human
 resource specialists and a clothing closet
- Meals for residents, volunteers, staff, and meal ministry approximately 10,200 every month and 177,217 last year
- Food pantry serves approximately 70 families each day recent uptick this month to average 80-100 each day- One of the largest Food Pantry's and greatest volume of people served in NEFL

How Can You Help?

- Meal ministry Serving homeless, transients, and the displaced 365 days a year averaging 25,500 people
- Holiday Meals Thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter- last year 264 families and individuals enjoyed a holiday luncheon with the support of our community volunteers
- Food Pantry week days 8-12 those who are marginal and often must choose between paying their rent or buying groceries for their family. Last year served 18,200 people. For many, this service prevents them from having to chose between paying rent or buying groceries
- Emergency Disaster Services need volunteers for: Canteen meal assistance, meal serving, emotional and spiritual support among other duties as the crisis unfolds
- Seasonal community assistance: Holiday application process where will sign-up approximately 1,200 families, create 1,000 Thanksgiving baskets, Toy Shop sorting, organizing, and distributing for 5,000 children.
