# Call to Order/Verify Quorum:

Chair Griffin called the SE CPAC meeting to order at 6:30 pm and welcomed everyone to the meeting at the Mandarin Senior Center and on Zoom. Rosemary Wesolowski verified that a quorum was present.

**Approval of the Previous Meeting Summary** – The March 2023 summary was approved.

Presentation(s): C. Shay Hill, Government Relations Specialist, JEA, and Renee Manna, Director, Government Relations Specialist, JEA informed the CPAC about solar power at JEA.

There are eight solar facilities in the JEA territory that provide/sell various amounts of solar power to JEA. JEA does not own any solar facilities at this time. The facilities are located on the west side and north side of the city.

JEA acquires solar energy through a competitive bid process. The bid process includes an RFP, qualified proposals are evaluated and scored, with the highest score winning the contract. The awardee will then proceed with the facility permitting, construction and commissioning. JEA is a non-profit organization

and traditionally non-profit organizations cannot take advantage of tax incentives. That may change due to the recently announced Inflation Reduction Act, which has a tax provision that may allow JEA to perform a self-build facility. The new Act is still under review by JEA.

Mr. Hill did share some issues with solar power. Those issues include:

- Solar power is only functional when light is available (not useful at night or under clouds).
- Intermittent resource (fluctuates throughout the day as clouds pass)
- System costs (capital, operation, maintenance, and decommissioning) can be pricey.
- Solar is very land intensive (each megawatt of solar requires six to eight acres of land).
- Material used to manufacture solar modules are not "green". At the end of their useful life, the modules are more expensive to recycle than to replace. In the United States, only 10% of modules are recycled.

Currently, 58% of our power generated by JEA is from natural gas, 2% from renewable sources (solar, landfill gases, and biomass), 12% from coal/petcoke, and 28% is purchased from other energy companies. JEA has a goal of utilizing 35% clean energy by 2030 and plans an 80% reduction in CO2 emissions (from the 2005 levels) and to offset energy efficiency programs.

It was questioned if homeowners could sell excess solar power to JEA and what is the rate JEA will pay? It was confirmed that JEA could purchase the excess power and they paid the homeowner fuel cost rates (which fluctuates) versus commercial rates.

### **Elected Officials Report:**

### The Honorable Michael Boylan, District 6, shared the following updates:

- Tomorrow night at the City Council meeting, the ground use agreement (Ordinance# 2023-0209)
  for the future location of the Jacksonville Fairgrounds is on the agenda. It is proposed that the
  Jacksonville Fairgrounds should relocate to the Westside. The proposed future site is comprised
  of 82 acres and there are plans to build a 40,000 square foot exhibition hall and other buildings
  to accommodate the needs of the fair.
- City Council members will also discuss the process of posting public notices at the council
  meeting tomorrow night. A year ago, state legislature went into place to allow city governments
  the option of posting public meeting notices electronically on specific websites. This option has
  been discussed by several committees locally and the discussion will continue tomorrow night.
- Council Member Boylan stated he will hold a community meeting at the Mandarin Community Club on May 15, 2023, to discuss the proposed development on County Dock Road; this meeting will begin at 7:00 pm.
- Brief updates for a few LUZ applications in the Mandarin area were provided.
- Council Member Boylan announced that he will hold a Town Hall meeting on Wednesday, April 26, 2023, 6:30 pm at the Mandarin Senior Center.
- The old landfill on Sunbeam Road has been redeveloped and all can enjoy new bicycle and hiking trails there.

Municipal Code Compliance Division – Jared Chemay, Senior Officer, stated in the past 30 days, Code Compliance Officers completed 713 inspections.

Code Compliance Officers actively remove litter (snipe) signs and focus on identifying and fining individuals or businesses responsible for placing litter (snipe) signs in the wrong locations. Fines for litter (snipe) signs range from \$50 to \$500. The fine varies depending on how many times the individual/business has committed the violation. Citizens can remove and dispose of illegally placed litter (snipe) signs or call 630-CITY to request to have the signs removed.

Subcommittee/Liaison Reports (3-minute time limit):

**LUZ- Craig Shoup** – stated the subcommittee reviewed seven new LUZ applications and presented two recommendations to the CPAC:

Denial of Ordinance 2023-0231 at 2629 Loretto Road which seeks to rezone 10.34 +/- acres of land from RR-Acre to RLD-70 to allow for a single-family development. When a past request for the same rezoning (2016-805) was applied for this was litigated and the rezoning was denied. It was confirmed by a special magistrate. Mandarin Road is a designated scenic corridor requiring lots of one acre or more. This parcel is immediately adjacent Mandarin Road and is not consistent with the 2030 Comp Plan.

This motion passed with a 17 vs 1 vote.

Denial of AD 23-32 at 11691 Sedgemore Drive North which seeks a deviation to increase the height of a fence from 8 feet to 9 feet and reduce setbacks for multiple accessory structures. This property is in the Ramsgate Community which has an active HOA. This request should go before the HOA prior to applying for the ordinance. An approval from the HOA should be submitted with the application.

The motion passed with a 11 vs 7 vote.

**North Florida TPO – Jim Hill** – provided the following updates:
