

Call to Order

Chairman Vanderlaan called the meeting to order at 5 p.m. in Training Room 110 of the Ed Ball Building, 214 N. Hogan Street and welcomed everyone.

Approval of the Minutes

Member LaMountain made a Motion to accept the minutes from the February 7, 2011 meeting. A second was made by Member Rev. Hamilton. The Vote: All in favor; None opposed.

Chair Vanderlaan thanked Membership Pat LaMountain on her outstanding membership drive. He then welcomed the new members and asked them to talk about their organization:

- Sustainable Springfield Robert Ian Owenby stated that Sustainable Springfield is a Non-Profit for the community gardens. There is one on Laura Street and Ionia Street. They reach out to citizens for the community garden.
- St. Johns Lutheran Church Rev. William Hamilton and Rev. Victoria Hamilton stated that St. Johns is the oldest Church in Jacksonville and the second oldest in Florida starting on Ashley Street. They moved to Springfield in 1926. The Hamilton's have been there for 11-years to help restart it and get it moving again for the neighborhood.

Jacksonville Sheriff's Office (JSO) Zone 1 Sqt. Yul reported on the following:

- There has been a rash of burglaries to autos with it being a smash and grab. 25% of the people left their car doors unlocked.
- Near the Omni Hotel they have witnessed some men checking all car doors and if they
 didn't find any open they would leave it alone.
- Please be sure not to leave anything valuable in your car like cell phones, GPS devices, laptops or pocket books.
- There did arrest one person last week that cleared 5 cases when they caught him with the GPS devices and credit cards on him.

Guest Speakers

- Digital Sign Ordinance 2010-0900 Tracey Arpen presented the attached PowerPoint Presentation on this Ordinance. Bill Brinton gave members a handout on Billboards in the Digital Age Unsafe (and unsightly) at any Speed by Scenic America Issue Alert 2 Electronic Signs. Attorney Karl Sanders representing Clear Channel Outdoor spoke on the opposite side of the presentation. Chair Vanderlaan read the attached Resolution that the SW CPAC had adopted. A Motion was made by Member Cronrath to discuss the Digital Sign Ordinance 2010-0900 and a second by Member DeVall. Discussion: Members did not think that it was appropriate to have the name of Clear Channel in the resolution focusing on one company and also stating that it would hurt small business should not be in the resolution. The Vote: All in favor of the discussion; None opposed. Member Miller made a Motion to support the Digital Sign Ordinance as read by Chair Vanderlaan. A second was made by Member LaMountain. Members discussed the resolution, safety and timing. The Vote: All in Favor; None opposed. The Motion carries unanimously. Chair Vanderlaan thanked all the guest speakers for attending.
- Project New Ground (PNG) Panel and Update Chair Vanderlaan gave some background information on Project New Ground for our new members. There are four sites: 5th and Cleveland in the Urban Core and the other three: Forest Street, Lonnie Miller Park and the Brown's Dump Site in the Northwest Planning District –NW CPAC #5. Currently PNG is doing remediation on parcels that have been identified as contaminated. The Environmental Subcommittee had a meeting with PNG and Diane Kerr from the NW CPAC/Forest Street Site. They had discussed in length if there was a need to have a mediator in place if there were lots of homeowners that were not satisfied with the way their remediation was being handled. Since the Forest Street site has seen much of the work Ms. Kerr had only mentioned a few problems that were being worked on. Chair Vanderlaan stated that at this time he did not think mediators were needed. In the 5th and Cleveland site an area in Springfield - OU2 - has not started yet. There were concerns in Durkeeville with poor performance and follow through. Residents want to see their property in better condition after remediation. There approximately 7 to 8 properties in Durkeeville that still have concerns with fencing, driveways and flooding. They would like to know who to complain to.

Chair Vanderlaan thanked the Project New Ground Panel for coming and being patient. From Project New Ground was: Greg Bruce, Consultant from the Hester Group along with Madelene Skinner, City Attorney Kristina Nelson, Juanita Clem from England-Thims and Miller, Felicia Boyd, FMB and from the Department of Health Gale Tucker-Disney and Grazyna Pawlowicz. Greg Bruce thanked the CPAC for allowing them to come and speak. They are wiling to come to neighborhood meetings and are available at the Outreach Center at 1605 Myrtle Ave. They have done 350 properties. After remediation each homeowner is requested to do a survey on the contractors performance. On average they come back good. Members would like to know what the comments say on the PNG surveys. Members would like for PNG to come back at a future meeting with a bar chart on the ratings and comments. Members would like to know do the

problems get resolved. The experts and maps were available for members to review and ask specific questions at the tables around the room. It was stated that the residents were not informed of the litigation on the class action suit that was settled. Attorney Nelson stated that Project New Ground is under the remediation plan and there is no bearing with the class action suit. Mr. Bruce stated that they are in the process of correcting some concerns but it is a slow process. He also said that one problem is too many and communication needs to be worked on. Member Miller will give the names and addresses to PNG/Greg Bruce to report back at the next monthly meeting of the Urban Core CPAC.

Florida Department of Transportation (FDOI) - Jim Green reported on the following:

- There are no new items but is following up on past ones:
- The Hart Bridge lights are back on and the painting is still under way.
- The rehab on Newnan and Hubbard Street over Hogan's Creek Master Plan states it is to be closed to cars and the bridge would be for pedestrians. In talks with the Recreation Department the improvements are not funded for a few years but they are talking so they can both save money.
- The discussion on Main Street becoming a 2-way roadway was presented to the Department. FDOT has not done a study on this and would have to have the City of Jacksonville request it.

Member LaMountain made a Motion to ask the City to request that Main Street from Union Street to State Street become a 2-way road. Member DeVall made the second. Discussion: Members would like to see Main Street become accessible. The Vote: All in Favor; None opposed. The Motion carries unanimously.

 Supports an amendment to Ordinance Number 2010-900 that would prohibit digital billboard faces

 Urges Mayor Peyton to veto Ordinance 2010-900 should these amendments not be incorporated into the final version of Ordinance Number 2010-900 by the City Council.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 would allow electronic changing message signs in Jacksonville to change every eight seconds (10,800 times per day) or to scroll continuously, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 reverses the interpretation of the City's Building Inspection Division and Planning Department that such signs may legally change only once every three minutes, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 will also apply to digital billboards, if erected in the City, and

WHEREAS, Clear Channel Outdoor seeks to erect more than a dozen digital billboard faces (i.e., 672 square foot and 300 square foot TV-like screens) at nine locations around the City, with more to come in future years at unknown locations, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 could result in flashing, scrolling on-premise signs at tens of thousands of locations in Jacksonville, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 does nothing to regulate the brightness or spacing of electronic message signs or their proximity to signalized intersections, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 creates traffic safety problems as drivers' attention is diverted from the highway, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 will hurt the many small businesses which, unlike large businesses and national retail chains, cannot afford this more expensive sign technology, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 is out of step with many other cities around the state and nation that only allow electronic changing message signs to change once an hour or once a day, if they are allowed at all, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 will irrevocably damage the City's scenic landscape through the proliferation of rapidly changing electronic signs, and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2010-900 is a giant step backward in the City's 25-year effort to improve our scenic environment by reducing visual pollution, and

WHEREAS, the Jacksonville Planning Commission has held public hearings and meetings in January and February 2011, heard from a wide range of speakers, and considered written material submitted in connection with the proposed Ordinance 2010-900, and

WHEREAS, the Jacksonville Planning Commission has recommended approval of Ord. No. 2010-900, only as amended so that: 1) Scrolling signs be prohibited and 2) the hold time for a changing message board be 3 minutes instead of 8 seconds,

WHEREAS, there are no digital (internally illuminated/light emitting diode) billboard faces/displays in Jacksonville, and the City of Jacksonville has the authority to prohibit such display faces for reasons of traffic safety, or aesthetics, or both;

Now therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that on March 7, 2011, the Urban Core Citizens Planning Advisory Committee voted and hereby:

- 1. Supports the Planning Commission's two amendments to Ordinance Number 2010-900 that (1) prohibit scrolling signs, and (2) establish the hold time for a changing message board as 3 minutes rather than 8 seconds,
- 2. Supports an amendment to Ordinance Number 2010-900 that would prohibit digital billboard faces, and
- 3. Urges Mayor Peyton to veto Ordinance 2010-900 should these amendments not be incorporated into the final version of Ordinance Number 2010-900 by the City Council.

Ordinance 2010-900

What It Does

- Allows electronic message signs to change once every 8 seconds
- · 10,800 times per day, per sign
- · Allows signs to scroll continuously
- Would apply to digital billboards Clear Channel is planning to erect

How We Got Here

- · 1987 Sign Ordinance
 - outlawed portable signs
 - prohibited flashing signs
 - prohibited animated signs
 - But... "animated sign" does not include "changing message sign"

The Missing "Not"

"Changing message device means any device ... across the face of which a verbal message moves or appears to move, or which contains a verbal message which otherwise changes electrically or mechanically [not] more than once in any three minutes."

Result?

- Sign that changes every four seconds, or even every <u>second</u> = Legal
- Sign that changes every four minutes = Illegal

June 18, 2010 Sign Bulletin

- Issued by City Building Inspection Division and Planning and Development Dept.
- Clarified that electronic signs cannot change more than once every three minutes
- Followed by July 18, 2010 T-U story
 - Sign company GM quoted saying sign companies already advise sign buyers of 3minute rule

Ordinance 2010-767

- · Introduced 10/28/2010
- Would have clarified and confirmed 3minute interpretation
- Part of bill making changes to real estate sign rules
- · Heavy lobbying by Clear Channel
- Removed from bill for separate consideration later

Planning Dept Report on 2010-767

- · Recommended approval
- · "Consistent with previous interpretations"
- "Studies conducted by the Federal Highway Administration suggest that changing message devices with a high frequency of change leads to driver distraction and a significant increase in the number of accidents."

PDD Report on 2010-767 (cont.)

- "The proliferation of these types of signs increases the level of distraction for drivers..."
- "These commercially oriented signs are located on the most heavily traveled commercial roadway segments with numerous driveway cuts and other visual distractions which further detract from driver safety."

The Other Shoe Drops...

- One week later Clear Channel applications to erect 14 digital sign faces on 8 structures
- · More digital billboards to come
- Permits approved against advice of 3 attorneys that digital billboards violated settlement agreement

Digital Billboards

- · 672 square foot TV screen
- Uses 23x energy of regular lighted billboards

On-premise Digital Signs

- Allowed in almost all commercial zoning districts and all industrial zoning districts
- Allowed by sign waiver for institutional uses in <u>residential</u> zoning districts
- Approx. 26,000 sign permits in those districts
- Minimal spacing between on-site signs in some areas

Are Electronic Signs Especially Distracting?

- "Nothing's as eye-catching as an electronic LED display. The brightly-lit text and graphics can be seen from hundreds of feet away, drawing the attention of everyone within view."

The Two-Second Rule

An analysis of the 100-Car Naturalistic Driving Study, conducted by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, released in 2006, showed that taking one's eyes off the road for more than two seconds for any reason not directly related to driving (such as checking the rearview mirror) "significantly increased individual near-crash/crash risk."

Studies and Common Sense

"It is a given that a billboard can constitute a traffic hazard. It flows that EMCs, which provide more visual stimuli than traditional signs, logically will be more distracting and more hazardous.... Indeed, plaintiff's own witness stated that bypassers focus more on rapidly blinking electronic signs than static signs."

Naser Jewelers, Inc. v. City of Concord, First Circuit Court of Appeals (2008)

Is 3 minutes really reasonable?

- · Beaches cities: once a day
- · St. Johns County: once every 2 two hours
- · Electronic message signs replace manually changeable signs (typically changed NMT once a day)
- · Once every 3 minutes still allows
 - 20 message changes an hour
 - 480 message changes a day

Planning Commission Recommendation

- · Changes once every 3 minutes, not once every 8 seconds
- · No scrolling allowed

Recommended Action

- · Support Planning Commission recommendation
 - -3 minutes, not 8 seconds
 - No scrolling signs
- · Urge City Council to prohibit internally illuminated/digital billboards
- · Urge Mayor Peyton to veto the bill if it doesn't include these changes
