Call to Order

Angie Vannatter, Chair, called the meeting to order at 6:35 p.m.

Subcommittee Breakout Sessions

The subcommittees met from 6:35-7:05 p.m.

Jacksonville Sheriff's Office – Sgt Kenny reported that the sheriff's office is implementing directed patrol programs. He also reported on crime statistics in the southeast district. The largest problem is burglary to autos and residences. Keeping doors locked and garage doors closed are the best safeguards. The southeast district traffic fatalities account for 30% of the overall traffic fatalities in the city. Questions were asked about abandoned cars along highway. Call JSO's non-emergency number for these. For junk cars on private property, contact 630-CITY.

Speakers

Sherry Hogan, Director of Development at JMOMA (Jacksonville Museum of Modern Art) gave an overview of their renovations and programs. Free Art Walks are held every 1st Wednesday and Sundays are free when accompanied by children. She encouraged everyone to become a member.

Anna Dooley with Greenscape gave a history of the organization. This non-profit group is responsible for a lot of the trees planted along roadsides. She stated that Greenscape functions by donations and "doers" and encourage membership. She also encouraged members to get in touch with Greenscape about other needed projects.

Susan Hughes, Vice President of Environmental Services at JEA gave a brief history of the organization and the environmental achievements that have been reached over the years. JEA went from being one of the most expensive to one of the least expensive over time. JEA is also the largest producer of solar power in the state. A question and answer period followed.

Chair's Report

- The minutes were unanimously approved.
- Angie introduced new members Susan Cave of Hunter's Green and Gene Maszy and Dave Pentel of Southside Business Men's Club.
- Clean It Up Jacksonville Day was scheduled for Saturday, October 23 but was canceled. With the
 number of hurricanes and subsequently clean up from storm debris, other CPAC chairs were
 concerned that "clean up fatigue" would affect participation. The next big cleanup is scheduled
 prior to Super Bowl. Jail trustees are going to be used to cleanup Cuba Hunter Park due to the
 swampy nature of the surrounding land.
- Angie established a nominating committee for the election of Chair and Vice-Chair for 2005. The subcommittee chair is Kim Whigham (262-9619) with members Bill Kintz (568-7325) and Gamal Lyons (880-9075). The election of new officers will be completed at the November meeting. Call any of these members with nominations.
- Angie passed around the courthouse presentation given to the BJP Oversight Committee at its last meeting.

Subcommittee Reports

Economic Development & Transportation –Gamal Lyons reported on the following issues the subcommittee discussed:

- Baymeadows Golf Course future development. There will be a meeting on Wednesday at 7p.m. at Twin Lakes Middle School on this issue.
- Kernan Boulevard becoming 4 or 6 lanes
- Rapid Transit and Baymeadows Road
- The possibility of toll lanes on Butler Boulevard
- Increasing the use of students on buses

• Cuba Hunter park walkway proposal by Lowell Griffith

Environmental –Chris Fuchs reported on the following issues the subcommittee discussed:

- Plans for the Baymeadows golf course and the issue of fertilizer run-off causing toxic soil and pollution to Pottsburg Creek
- Carriage Crossing Phase I has completed a Communi-Tree application
- Slowness of the city to pick up yard waste
- Cuba Hunter park walkway proposal by Lowell Griffith

Land Use & Zoning – Paul Riel reported on the following issues the subcommittee discussed:

- Proposed condominium development on Greenland Road there is a meeting on November 18 at Loretto Elementary School at 6 p.m. concerning this issue.
- Cuba Hunter park walkway proposal by Lowell Griffith
- Kernan Coalition lowering their opposition to 6 lanes provided the city involves and preserves the community.

Neighborhood Outreach/Membership – Jim McKenney reported that he is receiving calls on the following issues:

- Yard waste not being picked up
- Political signs obstructing views while driving (these can be removed by anyone they are illegal
 when not in someone's private property or when posted without permission of the owner of a
 home or business)

Jim thanked everyone again for nominating him for the CPAC individual award from the mayor.

Staff Reports

- John Crofts, Mayor's Liaison, reported that Sharon Copeland is now the City Council LUZ chair.
- Jeri Ricks, Building Inspection, stated that political signs are a focus of the division at this time.
- Kris Barnes, DCSB, reported that
 - o Duval County schools will be making up 5 of the 6 hurricane days.
 - o There will be a redistricting of Spring Glen and Greenfield Elementary Schools. A meeting will be held at Twin Lakes Elementary School in January on this issue.
 - o The Duval County magnet school program was awarded \$9 million to start up new programs.
 - o The land search for a high school of the southside is getting close to an end.
- Jim Green, FDOT, reported the following:
 - Southside / Baymeadows intersection improvements Monday, November 8 at Twin Lakes Middle School
 - o Long Range Transportation Plan is nearing completion and will be adopted in December
 - o Tolls on Butler may be in the future because of budget shortfalls. These would be in the form of "hot lanes."

• Dawn Wood, Neighborhood Services Division, reported that the Florida Neighborhoods Conference was a great success with over 1400 participants including exhibitors. She thanked everyone who volunteered and attended. Chris Fuchs won a state Neighborhood Award. Congratulations to her.

- George Tawes, Property Safety Code Enforcement, reported that junk vehicles must be on private property for it to be handled by them.
- Michael Dickey, Consumer Affairs, gave two links for information on checks and finances:
