Call to Order/Quorum

Chair Lee Martin called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m. and welcomed everyone. A quorum was verified by Mary Beth Ridderman.

JSO Report: Chief Mark Richardson introduced Lt. Charlie Wall. Chief Richardson reported a reduction in overall crime in Zone 4 with auto burglaries on the rise. He recommended locking your car, taking the keys and not leaving valuable in sight. Chief Richardson provided copies of Zone 4 maps showing locations of sexual predators. He discussed the differences between predators and offenders, the Jessica Lunsford Act and the Megan laws requiring registration by certain offenders/predators. He stressed that there is no state law, so local ordinances are needed to prevent offenders or predators from living near schools. Chief Richardson suggested residents obtain additional information about predators and offenders at http://www.fdle.state.fl.us - the information is public record. Approval of the Meeting Summary

Chair Martin asked for approval of the January SW CPAC summary. Dick Jackson made a motion to accept the minutes and a second was made by Sally Robson. The vote: all were in favor. None opposed.

Public Comments:

• There were no public comments.

Introductions/Acknowledgements:

- Chairman Martin recognized the Honorable Vicki Drake, Duval County School Board, Distric 6 and thanked her for her faithful attendance at CPAC meetings.
- Chairman Martin introduced Rusty Chandler, Cecil Field Airport Manager and guest speaker.
 - Mr. Chandler introduced Matthew Claerbenot, Gloria Loungeway, Lee Lewis with AVCON, consultants for the Master Plan Update for Cecil Field Airport.

Guest Speakers:

Rusty Chandler presented information about the update for the 20 year master plan for Cecil Field Airport. He said of the area originally identified as Cecil Field was deeded over by the Base Realignment and Closure Committee (BRAC) in 1993. The City of Jacksonville owns 11,000 acres, including the Cecil Commerce Center. Clay County owns 1000 acres of undeveloped land, and JAA owns Cecil Field Airport, which encompasses 6086 acres. Cecil Field airport includes hangars, two sets of runways (one runway is two miles long), green space and the surrounding areas. Part of the master plan includes the discussion of shortening some runways to save maintenance costs and adding a fifth runway in 40 or 50 years. Mr. Chandler reported that since the Navy departed, noise contours have been reduced. Tenants include FCCJ, the Coast Guard, the National Guard and Boeing and employ over 2,500 persons. The primary activities are aircraft maintenance, aircraft reworking and flying aircraft. Cecil Field Airport is being evaluated for a space port (a private business venture) and non-aviation development is planned near Brannan Field Chaffee Road. Mr. Chandler thanked the CPAC for opportunity to present the report and asked to return later this year to present the final report. Mr. Chandler may be reached at 573-1613.

- Chairman's Report: The chairman announced;
 - Members of the SW CPAC and Westside Business Leaders are going to Kennedy Space Center to obtain information about the proposed space port.
 - The Mayor's Town Hall Meeting at Ed White High School was well attended and several issues were raised. Chairman Martin expressed his appreciation for everyone who attended.
 - Appreciation to FCCJ and special thanks to Dr. Chappell for hosting the SW CPAC.
 All 2006 meetings of the SW CPAC will be held at FCCJ Kent Campus in building F-128 until further notice.

 Duval County School Board: The Honorable Vickie Drake announced that she supports the Blueprint for Prosperity but she wants to move the recommendations for education to ten years earlier than originally recommended by Blueprint because children need to be prepared there are no "unskilled labor" jobs available everyone needs and education to be ready for the workforce or higher education. She expressed her appreciation to the mayor for the Mayor's Literacy Summit. Ms. Drake reported that the new school on Chaffee Road will break ground in May, 2006 and will open in Aug. 2007. The school board had adopted a set of core beliefs and town meeting have been

scheduled. The next meeting is Mar. 16, 2006 at Ed White High School at 7 p.m.. Ms. Drake said she is running for office again and needs signatures.

Membership Subcommittee: No report.

• Grants Subcommittee: Sally Robson reported that the Mayor's Neighborhood Matching Grants Program will be mailed soon and she is available to assist with the application. She is working on applications for Bank of America grants for student leaders.

• Education/Youth and Recreation Subcommittee: Len Burroughs gave a report for Chuck Mann. He announced that an editorial was published about Blueprint for Prosperity in the Feb. 6, 2006 Times Union and several items were listed as necessary to make the city better. One was to increase teachers' pay, a pre-k program to prepare children for school, and high school students prepared to enter the work force or go on to higher education.

• Economic Subcommittee: Dick Jackson reported that he and Dr. Chappell are working on the Blueprint for Prosperity and education is mentioned throughout the entire Blueprint. Residents may contribute to a fund for students on their monthly JEA bill. Mr. Jackson provided copies of the draft and more information is available at <u>www.coj.net</u>.

• Beautification Subcommittee: Sally Robson reported Jax Pride week is Feb. 25 – Mar. 5 and she suggested members become involved. She thanked the chairman for bringing to the mayor's attention the issue of the eyesore at the corner of 103rd Street and Blanding Boulevard.

• Land Use, Zoning, and Transportation Subcommittee: Robert Smith and Tree Kilbourn were not present but copies of the LUZ report was provided by Ms. Kilbourn.

• Planning & Development: Folks Huxford reported that the LUZ committee does a good job of keeping everyone informed but the chairman had asked that he give a report each month. The rural village scheduled for construction on Beaver Street east of Baldwin, near the Winn Dixie warehouse, will have 800 acres, 2,901 residential units, 200,000 sq. ft. of retail space and 30,000 sq. ft. of office space. The question was asked where those children will go to school and Mr. Huxford said that no new schools are planned. The question was asked why the builders of huge developments are not required to build schools to accommodate the children. Mr. Huxford answered that other counties require that. Chairman Martin expressed his thanks to Mr. Huxford for keeping the members updated.
