Call to Order

Chairman Gadson Burgess called the meeting to order at 6 p.m. with a welcome and the Pledge of Allegiance at the Bradham*Brooks NW Library Auditorium, 1755 Edgewood Ave. West.

Approval of the Meeting Summary

A motion to approve the September 11, 2008 summary as written was made by Member Rev. Wyche and a second by Member Arnold. The Vote: All were in favor. None opposed.

Staff Reports

JSO – Lt Tyree and Sgt Mahaffey reported on issues from the September meeting in the Magnolia Gardens neighborhood and asked for any new concerns:

- On Carnation Road 4 juveniles were arrested and they had roll call in the neighborhood.
- Member Parker from Lake Forest is continuing to have problems with the car wash at 7841 Lem Turner Road. They continually make it difficult for her to be in her yard without being harassed. Mayor Peyton said he would work on this at the August Meeting. She wrote a letter to Mayor Peyton and sent it certified with a copy to our Mayor's Representative Devin Reed. He asked to get a copy since he did not receive it.
- Member Kerr continues to have problems on Dignan Street. There is a HUD property that she has reported to HUD and they are working on it. She also mentioned that on a front porch in the neighborhood they had automatic weapons just sitting on the porch and wanted to know if that was illegal. Yes it is. Officer Tyree said they are working in the North Riverside neighborhood and had 7 arrests on Maplewood with a number of weapons.
- In Washington Heights there were weapons discovered hidden in the weeds behind the buildings.

Guest Speakers

JAXPORT – JAXPORT Community Outreach Manager Joanne Kazmierski passed out trinkets and brochures on JAXPORT. She asked members what they knew about JAXPORT. Members remarked that it meant an economic engine for Duval County, more jobs, an increased tax base and new business opportunities. However; with development comes negative impact such as encroachment to residential, roadbeds carrying very heavy loads with diesel fumes into the air and more. Ms. Kazmierski said that it was her job as Community Outreach Manager to educate residents on what JaxPort is doing in 5 different areas:

- Education and youth mentoring – of the 151 employees 12 are mentors (almost 10%) at R.L. Brown Elementary School near Tallyrand. They wanted to serve the school JaxPort was encroaching upon. They are proud to give back to the community with trainings for 9th to 12th graders at First Coast High School International Trade Program. They also work closely with FCCJ, beginning to work with EWC, JU and UNF for future leaders.
- Small business owners – If anyone is thinking of starting their own business and need help with imports, the port works closely with various countries like China and Italy.
- The environment as it relates to growth and growing green.
- Giving back to the Community – last year 151 employees contributed \$67,000 to the United Way campaign. They also volunteer at the Clara White Mission and other community programs.
- Jobs – people read in the Times Union that there will be 3000 new jobs at JAXPORT but the challenge is that the jobs are all over and not in one building at the port. There may be trucking jobs, Longshoremen jobs, administrative, welder, shipping or even driver's that drive cars off ships that pay \$25 an hour. It could also involve containers, security and cruise jobs. To find a job at JaxPort log on to www.JAXPORT.com and click the job seeker link.

Sign in with your e-mail address and password; or sign up – it's free! Create a resume or hit job search. Search to view all openings. The website is designed to link local job applicants with careers in the Jacksonville maritime industry.

Members asked numerous questions but in particular how many jobs are filled by the locals? Currently there are not enough qualified applicants for white collared positions that earn above \$45,000 locally. Attorney Carla Miller, City of Jacksonville "CPACs Ethics Training"

City of Jacksonville Ethics Attorney Carla Miller gave a PowerPoint presentation on Ethics Training. She went over the following:

- Sunshine Law – means that CPAC members can not leave a room and talk about business after the meeting. Members can not do anything in secret, can't send e-mails or call each other to discuss the CPAC business.
- Public Records – the Housing and Neighborhoods Staff prepare the written records which are the public record. They are open to the public and anyone can see the documents.
- Voting Conflict – if you vote on something and a say a brother-in-law or someone will benefit you have a conflict. If you are not certain get a legal opinion.
- Ethics Laws – there are three kinds of ethics – values, technical laws and criminal prosecution.
- The purpose of CPAC is to promote communication with city government and the residents it serves. As a member it is your responsibility to open up and communicate more. You may need to get answers, keep asking and put it in writing.
- These are the things that the city is working on:
 - Hired Ethics Attorney Miller who had helped write the Ethics Code in 1999.
 - Ethics Officer Miller is available to work on problems and is doing city-wide ethics training for all employees.
 - Has an Inspector General, Pam Markham, which performs city audits.
 - Started a hotline for the ethics concerns or whistle blowers at 630-1015. Calls are coming in and it's confidential and they can't be traced. One can also e-mail an issue to Ethics@coj.net
 - There are now internal controls for Procurement.
 - There is a 9 member Ethics Commission to get citizen input.

Members had numerous questions for Attorney Miller but in particular the case that Harry Shorestein resigned from. An attorney from Gainesville will be handling that. They also wanted to know if it was ethical for the city to use a registered lobbyist? There is no law against it, but is the appearance right? The Ethics Commission comes up with issues to take before the City Council. They meet once a month to propose new laws. They will have a meeting on Oct. 20 or the 4th Monday of the month. Mayor's Representative Devin Reed - Remarked that with the help of Marilyn we have speakers lined up talking about jobs. Next month we will have JEDC talking more about jobs. The city also needs mentors. There are 75,000 children that need mentors and we have 3500 adults that are available for mentoring. The budget did pass the Jacksonville Journey with programs for children. It was also for enforcement prevention and intervention. We need community organizers to take our city back. We all have to hit the tipping point – hit that a year ago. There is still too much apathy in our community with lives taken and folks not doing what they are capable of doing. There are young men not doing anything with a state of apathy. We need to get something done with the young men. With college entry where are the men? Please step up and consider mentoring. Members had numerous questions:

- o Foreclosures. How many are there in Jacksonville and what is being done? Mr. Reed suggested inviting The Director of Housing and Neighborhoods Wight Greger to an upcoming meeting.
 - o Member Parker reminded Mr. Reed that the Mayor said he would help with the car wash at 7841 Lem Turner Road. She also sent a certified letter to the Mayor and Mr. Reed. (He did not get a copy but Ms. Parker will make one for him.) The people in the car wash continue to threaten her to move away. It is an ongoing situation. She has been worked with Councilwoman Denise Lee and numerous others for the past 3 years. She also wrote a letter to Mayor Peyton on behalf of Marilyn Fenton-Harmer for a job well done and her professionalism.
 - o Members wanted to know if mentors were screened? Yes.
 - o Members also asked if there were grants available for parking for a community center? The Community Development Block Grant application cycle for 2009-2010 will have the first public hearing meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 21 at the Beaver Street Center at 6 p.m. to hear the needs of the community.
 - o Members wanted to know about the truancy centers and if they are funded for next year? Is it automatically funded for the following year? Each program with the Jacksonville Journey will be evaluated each year to determine funding for the following year.
