<u>JSO</u> – Zone 5 Sgt. Cannon sends Lt. Beltz regrets for not being at the meeting. He reported on the following: Crime is down but there are problems with arsons on vacant houses and vandalism. There have also been a few stolen cars that were burnt that count as arson as well. The murder rate is down 50% with 11 last year this time and 8 year-to-date. Rapes and other robberies are down 15%. There are still robberies to persons so please be mindful when you are going home at night that someone may be waiting to rob you.

Chair Kelly explained that the NW Library where we normally meet had a higher priority program and waned to thank Saint Clair Evans Academy for hosting the meeting. He also thanked PTA/SAC Chair Ms. Gamble for the use of this very nice facility.

Guest Speaker

- Matt Shirk, Public Defender for the 4th Judicial Circuit serves Duval, Clay and Nassau Counties introduced himself and thanked Chair Kelly, members and Neighborhood Coordinator Marilyn Fenton-Harmer for having him. He talked about how the office was created in 1963 and how he became the Public Defender. Matt Shirk is the fourth Public Defender elected to serve the 4th Judicial Circuit. It is an elected position and he is the 4th one: Former Ed Austin was the first one, Lou Frost for 36 years, Bill White for 4 years and in 2008 he was elected and took office in 2009. He has a new style of leadership along with a new mission statement for the Public Defender to be an efficient administrator and provide effective representation and are bound by the Code of Ethics to be effective to the clients and engaging the community and try to improve the quality of life in the First Coast. Since taking office they are working on ways to save taxpayer funds. They have a \$15 million dollar budget with a staff of 140. They started a speaker's bureau for the attorneys to be engaged with the community. He has hired an ex-offender Sylvester Black to be a mentor with juveniles. The juvenile system is for rehabilitation. They will also have a summer camp for at risk youths to try to stop them from going into the adult system which is for punishment. They have launched the first Public Defender's website at www.mattshirkpublicdefender.com and have a page on Face book. The website can access a court date, the Judges name and Attorney's name. Members asked questions on the following: How many crimes does a person have to do to be considered a habitual offender? There are several types of crime but technically it is 3. How many investigators are there? The Office has 13 investigators that have been involved with law enforcement. They also have interns and law students that also help. Members also asked about how a juvenile would be tried as an adult. He was also asked how the Legislation dealt with the trust fund. They were asked about diversionary programs but the Department of Corrections does that. The questions of the Drug Court came up. The Drug Court only a 10% recidivism rate of those attending go back to jail and this is one last chance before jail to get help. Members also wanted to know how many clients the office serves. Staff Reports

Mayor's Representative and Director of Central Operations Devin Reed reported on the following: A Memo dated 5/13/10 from Chief Administrative Officer Kerri Stewart on Operational Reductions in Fiscal Year 2009-2010. This year's budget is \$22 million dollars short. City Council did set aside \$9.5 million in a salary contingency fund which still leaves a shortage of \$12.5 million. This is a very bleak time and layoff announcements have stared. In Central Operations he had to layoff 6 people today effective June 30. The level of city service will not be what residents are use to. Libraries will be going from 40 to 50 hours to 20 hours with some closings. The mowing cycle for the city right-of-way will be once a month. Members had questions and concerns on the following Will half the street lights be turned off? Not at this point. One of the issues from the Jacksonville Journey is trying to improve the crime rate and it is a proven fact that if it is well lit there will be less crime. The city needs to check on some ball fields where lights come on automatically and noone is playing ball. This could help save money. How large a staff does the Jacksonville Human Rights Commission have since they will be losing 4 positions? He will have to check on that. Members encouraged other members to become involved and find out what is going on. At Tuesday night's City Council meeting it was a packed house on the issue of gaming – Internet Cafes. Find out what services will be eliminated and how your City Council Member will vote. Don't wait till it hits home.

Members were concerned for senior citizens on a fixed income with the amount of the new garbage fee and if there were any programs to help with this. Members talked about the deficit and making concessions that impact jobs that never materialize and the tax payers up picking up the deficit. There is no recourse. The ones making the decisions come from money they need to decrease their salary by 10%. Director Reed commented that Jacksonville is a lot better off than a lot of other cities. People from other communities are surprised at the level of taxes that are here. Members wanted to know about the Neighborhood Coordinator's position. Something should be known in 2 to 3 weeks. Mayor's Office – Project New Ground – Samuel Holman reported on the following:

- The Outreach Center is located at the Oaks at Durkeeville, 1605 N. Myrtle Ave. Come to the Center to get information.
- They are continuing to clean up in the Brown's Dump area.
- They are cleaning the Emmett Reed Center in the 5th and Cleveland area and residential will begin next week.
- The J. S. Johnson Center is being worked on this week and residential to follow.
- Lonnie Miller Park will start this month.
- Access agreements are still needed.

Members had questions and concerns at the progress at the old Mary M. Bethune School? It is being used as a staging area. Not sure what will be done once it is cleaned. How many days is it taking for a residential cleanup? It can take any where from 7 to 14 days depending on what type of situation may arise. Members were concerned with the cost of the clean up if the access agreement is not signed and they have to return to that street. <u>Planning & Development</u> – Planner Lurise Bannister reported that this was her second meeting as the NW Planner. There are 9 items on the NW Planning Report. Number 2009C-016 and 2009C-021 are being pushed back to process a PUD and will go to the Planning Commission in July. 2010A004 and 2010B-001 were to go before City Council today. The Planning Department approved them. The three exceptions might be deferred since they have not gotten back the environmental study. <u>Code Compliance</u> – Zone 5 Supervisor Danny Connell went over what a Systematic Inspection is: All the Zone 5 Officers (8) work 2 to 3 days in one neighborhood going street by street looking for violations. By doing this it puts each officer behind the 2 to 3 days on their normal work but it makes a difference in a neighborhood. Each Zone is tasked with doing 18 Systematic Inspections each year and Zone 5 did 40 last year. Division Chief Kim Scott works closely with the Officers on what neighborhood is selected. Systematic Inspections for April were done in the following neighborhoods:

- April 8 Lackawanna 318 cases
- April 20 Magnolia Gardens 188 cases
- April 26 Woodstock 420 cases
- May 13 Royal Terrace 97 cases
- Presently on-going Biltmore and in 2 weeks Ribault and Sherwood Forest.

In talking with residents they asked about mowing the fence line. Because of that suggestion they now include the fence line to be cleared off. <u>Recreation and Community Services</u> – Daryl Joseph reported on the following:

- Summer Camp registration is going on now and there is still a lot of availability. The Camp will start June 18 costing \$50 per session with an option for extended day. There are a lot of fun camps. Camps at Carvill, Clanzel Brown, Charles Clark, Dinsmore, Emmett Reed, Kennedy Center and Mary Lena Gibb are still available.
- The concern from last month with the Summer Night Lights program and having people going home at midnight is being addressed with JSO having more patrols in the neighborhoods after the events.

Members asked when the renovations at Clanzel Community Center will be complete. There is no date yet but it will be done before the summer programs begin. Duval County Public Schools (DCPS) – Elaine Mann, Chief Officer, High School Education (Cluster 3) reported on the following:

- The money levels in the budget were maintained but cost levels went up.
- Bus students last year in Duval County went to the State requirement of being bussed if you lived 2 miles from the school. A lot of magnet bus routes were cut.
- They reduced the school day in middle and high school by 45 minutes.
- Students in high school can now only earn 7 credits a year instead of 8.
- They have cut every place and they still have to keep cutting.
- This upcoming school year will be the first year of the Class Size Amendment in every class. From Kindergarten to 3rd grade – 18 in a class, middle grades 22 in a class and high school no more than 25 per class. There is no space in the schools and they were not built for these numbers. Every class that is over will have to pay a penalty. It will cost \$25 million to do implement the Class Size Amendment.
- There has not been a salary increase in three years. There was a small salary step increase but employees will have to start to paying insurance costs that were at a no cost for employees therefore there really isn't an increase but a decrease in salaries.
- DCPS is phasing out Jacksonville Sheriff's Resource Officers (SRO) and hiring their own. This will be less expensive since the cost of the SROs is up 50% in the last 3 years.
- Each high school will have one of the four Board Approved accelerated programs: AICE (Advanced International Certificate of Excellence): Fletcher, Forrest IB (International Baccalaureate Diploma Program): Parker, White, Wolfson Early College: Englewood, Sandalwood, Lee, Ribault

AP Honors: AAA, Baldwin, First Coast, Jackson, Wolfson, White, Forrest Ms. Mann just attended a reception at FSCJ Kent Campus for Lee and Ribault High School where parents and students spoke on the program. Students at the age of 18 are graduating from high school with an A.A. degree that were in the Early College program. The accelerated programs and the smaller learning communities are working.

• Teachers have been attending a lot of training programs for these upper level programs as well at trainings for the smaller learning communities. The IB program only does training in 10 cities and Jacksonville was one of them. Some of the training has taken place at the Sawgrasss which is just over the county line. This has to be reported as travel. These are grant funded dollars and can only be used for that purpose.

Public Comments

Alberta Hipps announced that Ordinance 2010- 352 will be coming up for a vote by the City Council. It is on the development agreement with Cecil Field. In 1993 representatives started the talk of closing Cecil Field. In 1995 the city worked with Department of Defense and then it was closed in 1999 giving the City of Jacksonville 17, 000 acres. The city has had if for over 10 years. Ms. Hipps then introduced the Executive Director of the JEDC (Jacksonville Economic Development Commission) Ron Barton. He spoke about the Master Development of Cecil Field. Some of the land has been developed with the Parks such at the Equestrian Center and the Recreation Center with the swimming pool. However; there is 6,000 acres not part of the aviation portion of the land that includes

wetlands easements. It is a hard parcel to develop and ends up to be about 4,500 acres. He talked about the city business plan for all the pieces to carve out and generating jobs. The city for over a decade (11years) has tried to attract businesses and jobs. They would like to city government out of the development and let them spend money on it and get jobs. This will be quicker and shift the risk. The city will not spend money to generate the jobs. It is a big investment. The build out will take many years. Three years ago Lad Daniels said there was not enough industrial land with good paying jobs. That is when 7,700 acres was rezoned for industrial uses. The RFP (Request for Proposal) is no secret. It was advertised nationally. Hillwood has done projects like this other cities with base closures. There were questions if we were under selling the land. Mr. Barton said we are not. We are trading a land sale for the risk of \$275 million and not all land is created equal. An income analysis approach was done on what the land is worth and this is not misleading as well as not wasting money.

The Opposition: Peter Anderson from Pattillo Companies thanked Chairman Kelly for having him and Ron Barton for his presentation. He didn't want to set up a pricing model but not to give all our money away. This property is a jewel. He said most of wetlands have been permitted away from the Corps of Engineers which allows them to do this. The 6,000 acres numbers keep moving all around and is difficult to determine. He disagrees with the contract since the buyer will have a very low price will of \$1000 an acre. He wants to get a fair market appraisal. Banks require this to protect us and the appraisal will take into account all factors. The city has already spent \$200 million dollars building the interchange and some infrastructure and permitting. We have already seen pictures like LaVilla and the Shipyards and \$40 million later have nothing there. Before we

give away the land to Mr. Perot for possibly \$3, \$4 or \$5 million let's us ask the City Council to get an outside third party appraiser. Maybe we ask to much of Mr. Barton and his staff. They are not expert land appraisers and that is what we need to ask the City Council for, a third party appraisal.

Ms. Hipps asked the NW CPAC to support the SW CPAC that voted unanimously on the Master Developer for Cecil Field. Supporting other CPACs is a good idea. Members wanted to know when it would be coming up for a vote: It will be in committees the first week in June.

Members had questions on the Cecil Field real estate, the appraisal and value of the land and if an evaluation/appraisal of the land was done. *Member Anthony mad a motion to join the SW CPAC recommendations on Cecil Field. A second was made by Member Burgess. Discussion: Some members did not agree with this since the city needs to do evaluations/ appraisals on other properties. Tax payers have been taken for a ride. They talked about having one price for a buyer or seller and then the new owner gets three times as much money with the city losing millions of dollars not coming out ahead. There is nothing wrong with getting an independent appraisal. The Vote: 3 in Favor; 5 opposed. The Motion fails.*

TO:Jacksonville City Council MembersFROM:Kerri Stewart, Chief Administrative OfficerDATE:May 13, 2010RE:Operational Reductions in Fiscal Year 2009-2010

As you are well aware the city is currently facing significant financial challenges both in the current year and in the upcoming fiscal year which begins Oct. 1. Due primarily to revenue underperformance and the presupposition of a 3 percent salary reduction and employee healthcare cost sharing, we are currently facing a deficit of approximately \$22 million in the current fiscal year.

In order to account for salary and benefit negotiations, council set aside \$9.5 million in a salary contingency fund. However, even with the contingency, our deficit still stands at about \$12.5 million in the current year. To address this hole the Mayor's Office will be implementing a three-pronged approach that includes making about \$2 million in operational cuts to this year's budget, capturing about \$4.9 million for the return of excess premiums from risk management operations and utilizing operating reserve funds.

Our goal is to realize as much savings as possible through operational reductions and minimize the use of operational reserve funding. To that end, in addition to operational changes outlined below, I have also instructed department heads to curtail all discretionary spending within their areas.

A report detailing all of the above will be delivered to you and the Council Auditor's office Monday, May 17.

As previously discussed, department leaders were asked to present recommendations on budget reductions within their respective departments for next fiscal year (those have previously been provided to you). From those recommendations we have identified a number of items that will be implemented immediately and will result in savings of approximately \$2 million in the current year.

These items represent cuts from only the executive departments within the operational control of the administration.

In short, our approach breaks down into basically three strategies: existing contract reductions, privatization measures and various operational cuts. This memo outlines some of those changes as well as the effects they will have on

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our service levels and employees. A more detailed breakdown is attached to this memo.

Contract Reductions

We will reduce mowing frequency at all city buildings, rights-of-way, landscaped medians and city-maintained parks, excluding athletic fields. The city currently has a contract in place for the mowing and maintenance of these properties and all changes will take effect 30 days from today.

In addition we will be reducing guard service at the Florida Theatre office building and the St. James Building. Employee turnstiles will be activated at the entrance to City Hall, eliminating the need for one guard to check employee identification badges.

Privatization Measures

As you know the city is already in the process of outsourcing the desktop support function of ITD. When we began looking at our internal operations for savings, we contemplated the privatization of other areas throughout government.

Just this week we posted a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the management and execution of the Building Inspection operations. We will not know the potential savings of outsourcing until we begin receiving responses.

The city is also in the process of developing RFPs for other functions across government including the Sexual Assault Response Center (SARC), Tennis Center Partnerships and Public Buildings. We expect these to be finalized and posted by the end of June. The potential impact to current employees within these functions is unknown at this point and will be dependent upon responses from the RFP process.

As it relates to the privatization of departments, we are aware of our obligation to submit a plan to City Council for its review and final approval, set forth in Sec. 21.302 of the Municipal Code. The plan must contain a financial analysis of the privatization, which necessitates the need for RFP responses prior to submittal of the plan.

Other Operational Cuts

As I said, since January I have been working with department heads to identify cuts to their operational budgets in preparation for next year. Each was asked to submit recommendations on ways to reduce their operating expenses by 5 percent. From that list, we were able to identify savings that could be captured

in this fiscal year and carried over into next fiscal year. I'm proud of the work they've done and the seriousness with which they've approached this task.

Beginning immediately, we will be working to implement the following changes:

- Reduction in library hours at 5 branch locations
- Closure of regional libraries on Sundays
- Removal of engine companies from Fire Stations 12 and 14 and transfer of rescue units to those locations
- Elimination of approximately 70 full-time positions from throughout the executive departments, more than half of which are currently filled

With respect to the JFRD reductions, each was included in their proposed 5 percent reduction list and based on call volume and proximity to other fire suppression units. In the last five years, approximately 80 percent of all calls for service were EMS related. A more detailed JFRD reduction list is attached.

The reductions to the library system were voted on by the Board of Library Trustees earlier this year when asked for a 5 percent cut to their operational accounts. The board based their decision on branch usage data and proximity to other libraries.

While the savings from these cuts will carry over, they are not the only cuts we expect to make to fill next year's budget deficit. We continue to work with various departments including the Sheriff's Office, other constitutional officers and our internal service providers to identify savings for next year.

Moving Forward

In March, the mayor outlined in his memo to Council the city's five-year outlook on revenue and expense projections. Expenses are expected to continue to grow by 35 percent, while revenue will grow only 10 percent. About 75 percent of this growth can be attributed to employee-related expenses, particularly pension and healthcare costs.

While our projected deficit for next fiscal year is about \$40 million – down from \$58 million following the passage of fee legislation – the deficit five years from now will be closer to \$250 million.

By taking these steps now, in addition to a pension reform plan and employeerelated expenses currently being negotiated at the collective bargaining table, we are helping to ensure the future viability of our city finances and the community at large. These are no doubt tough decisions, but ones that are necessary for Jacksonville's long-term financial sustainability.

- Eliminate 3 safety captain positions (one per shift)
 Each shift will still operate with 1 safety captains
