Call to Order

Chairman Gadson Burgess called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. with a welcome and the Pledge of Allegiance at the Bradham*Brooks NW Library Auditorium, 1755 Edgewood Ave. West.

Approval of the Meeting Summary

A Motion to approve the June 11, 2009 summary as written was made by Member Wyche and a second by Member Anderson. The Vote: All were in favor. None opposed.

Staff Reports

JSO – Lt. Tyree reported that violent crime was down by13%. Zone 5 kept the numbers low this summer possibly with having extra officers in the Zone. In the Moncrief Park neighborhood off Spires Street there have been 5 residential burglaries with no pattern or trend. Please be sure to set your alarms. There have also been burglaries to businesses stealing 15 grates in the last 14 days. At 1900 West 10th Street in Grand Park there was a gang related murder. Members had questions on a new door hanger they received asking for input on a crime that was committed near by. With the COPS Grant of \$9 million how many new officers will Zone 5 get? The latest number is 8. Guest Speakers

• Duval County Health Department Environmental Supervisor Bill Nowlin and Grant Researcher Jack Swiadek are working on an EPA Environmental Justice Grant. It is for \$10,000 for Health Zone 1 which includes CPAC 1 and 5. The grant project will form an advisory board to determine appropriate responses to identified concerns. This will include strategy, direction, specific remedies and action plans. The board membership will include residents of the communities as well as other stakeholders. It will focus on identifying and prioritizing the specific environmental health concerns of the residents in Heath Zone 1. They handed out a survey and asked by a show of hands how many people were interested in the following:

Environment – 3 Social – 8 Service Concerns – 1 Other – none They will also be doing 25 home assessments for the first 25 owner occupied home applications. This will be for sanitary concerns on water and wells. There will be discussion on integrated pest management. The owner will receive some green cleaning supplies which are more environmentally friendly. There was much discussion on mold and how to address it with a moisture meter and hydrometer for humidity. Your home should have a 30 to 45% level if it is greater there is a moisture problem. Members asked questions on the following: Where is the local EPA office? None in Jacksonville but the office for Region 4 is located in Atlanta. Where can one get a soil sample? The Health Department will test for lead and if you are located in one of the 4 contaminated ash sites they may test for ash.

Mayor's Representative

Director of Central Operations Devin Reed talked about the following which included having the following Divisions under him: Human Resources, Fleet, Administrative Services, Procurement, and EBO:

- The City of Jacksonville Budget Mayor Peyton did not sign the millage that the City Council proposed and therefore the rate will be 9.2727 mills. The millage has not been increased in 17 years. The 9.2727 mills, or \$9.2727 per \$1,000 assessed taxable value rate will still leave a gapping hole by millions of dollars. Call your City Council Members to let them know what kind of city and services you want. At today's City Council Finance Subcommittee meeting they proposed to cut all salaries by 3% and budgets by 3%. This will have to go before the entire City Council to become law. They will have to vote on the budget at the September 29 City Council meeting.
 - o Member Wyche made a suggestion to help the budget by billing out-of-town visitors for emergency services and to consider a ½ cent sales tax increase. The sales tax would not be allowed by law to be used for the General Fund.
 - Member Scott commented that more people needed to be at the Budget Town Hall meeting that was a Ribault High School last week.
 - o The money for fireworks should be considered to be cut from the budget.
 - o Members also discussed that there are numerous parks that go unused with no participation from organizations or children. On Soutel alone there are 5 parks in a 3 mile radius. The parks should be there for activities for kids/families and they need to be safe. Instead of having the largest park system we need to have the best.
 - o The City of Jacksonville needs to have an identity on 1 to 3 things that we do really well instead of numerous things we have and don't do the very best at.
 - o The JEA Office on Commonwealth is no longer open. This is a concern for elderly that still pay in person.

Members asked questions on the following:

• JEDC and how they give incentives to companies. Director Reed explained about competing cities going after good paying jobs.

- They also asked about the Property Assessor's Office in the neighborhoods after the tax assessments are out. Won't the large amount of foreclosures as well as declining property values play a big part on the budget?
- Members wanted to know the status of the Trail Ridge Landfill. It was voted down by the City Council and they still haven't received specifications for a Request for Proposal.
- It was also mentioned that Duval Schools will be getting out 45 minutes earlier than in past years and the children will need to be kept busy. There will also be more children walking to school due to the new bus routes.

<u>Mayor's Office - Project New Ground</u> - Consultant Anthony McGlone, The Hester Group, reported on the following:

- The center at 1605 Myrtle Ave. is expected to open in 3 weeks.
- The actual cleanup is expected to begin in October or early November.
- If you know someone that needs or wants to sign the access agreement please let them know that the center will be open or call 630-CITY.
- Members had questions on a Lake Forest concern about lead pipes to a new sewer system and some form of ash that was being used for infill that made neighbors ill. They contacted JEA and wrote a letter and were told they stopped using that particular chemical. They still don't know what was used and would like to know for future issues. Members also asked about the Doe Boy site which in not part of Project New Ground.
- Member Wyche announced that today they learned that Tetra Tech and Second Chance were awarded the Brown's Dump site for ash removal for \$5.8 million dollars. He wanted to thank the NW CPAC for their support. If you know of anyone that needs a job to let him know.
