Call to Order

Chairperson Kerr called the meeting to order at 6:03PM at Murray Hill Library, 918 Edgewood Avenue South and welcomed everyone. Chairman Kerr asked members and guests to please sign in.

Approval of the Meeting Summary

When a quorum was established the meeting summary from the July 11, 2002 and August 8, 2002 meeting were reviewed. A Motion to Approve was made by Thomas May and a second from Larry Solomon. The Vote: All were in favor, none opposed.

Guest Speaker

Duval County Schools - Leila Mousa - Regional Superintendent Region II & Peggy Williams, Regional Director Region II introduced themselves as the New School Board Representative taking Ken Manuel's place. The District has 167 schools and are divided up into 5 areas. They supervise 31 schools with 19 elementary, 5 middle, 4 high schools and 3 special schools. It is like a mini school district. The office for Region II is located behind Paxon High School. They can be contacted at 693-7938. School problems need to go through the school Principal first. At this time there does not look as if there will be summer school. They are identifying students who are having trouble now and getting remediation before they get too far behind. A question on uniforms and the dress code were asked. The School Board has gone with the current Code for Dress and will wait until next year to be discussed.

Northwest Vision and Master Plan -Jesse Wiles, President Asset Property Disposition - introduced Laura Reid and explained how he was a consultant for EDAW with 2 plans - SW& NW Plans - Jack Shad is the contact for the Planning Department's NW Plan. If you can please fill out the survey and return it before the end of this meeting that info will be included in the plan. In order to have more input from the neighborhoods on the "big picture" of what you would like the neighborhood to look like in the 2010 Plan they will be contacting groups to have meetings in a geographical area. The plan is being done to develop a community profile for the NW Planning District, have community values that are important to the neighborhoods and look for trends to correct problems.

Parks & Recreation - Bob Baughman, Deputy Director - There are 3 divisions and 327 parks, 58,000 acres under the Parks Department. The following parks will have work done to them: Murray Hill, Nips Sam Memorial Park, Willowbranch Park, Charles Reese Boat Ramp, and Westside Park just to mention a few. There were lots of questions on specific parks especially Lonnie Miller. Member Joseph Anderson explained that he hunted for Quail on the Ellis farm. The previous owner had a Septic Company and dumped the sewage where the land is fenced off as well as ash was used as land fill. The area of the park that is open was where the Ellis homestead was. It has been tested and re-tested and is not contaminated. If you have questions on Park Maintenance please call Lorenzo Williams at 630-5431. There is a process if you know of an area that would be a good place for a park.
