1. Call to Order/Verify Quorum: CPAC Chair Michelle Tappouni called the meeting to order at 5:33 p.m. After members introduced themselves, staff confirmed a quorum.

- 2. Public Official Report: Samuel Newby, At Large District 5 Council Member (snewby@coj.net: 630-1387), reported that the Task Force on Crime Reduction selected several subcommittees during its first meeting: including, Work Force Training, Community Engagement, Leadership Programs, Business Partnerships, Education and Youth Development, Neighborhoods, Mental Health and Substance Abuse. The Urban Rest Stop opening is Thursday, February 14, 2019, in the Sulzbacher Center at 611 E. Adams St. At the soft opening in late January, 250 individuals came to shower, do laundry, eat a meal and shave. The Urban Rest Stop anticipates it will serve 450 people a day.
- 3. Chair Report: Michelle Tappouni shared the mission of the CPAC as outlined in Executive Order E-2014-03 Section 4A. The Chair requested that CPAC members to review the 2008 Urban Core Vision Plan for projects that need advocacy. Greg Radlinski expressed an interest in strengthening Guiding Principle Two from the Urban Core Vision Plan, "Promote Mixed-Use/Mixed-Income Redevelopment and Infill." to encourage homeownership in lieu of rentals downtown. The Chair encouraged CPAC members to read over the Urban Core Vision Plan and to find long-term programs or projects to will benefit the Urban Core that they would like to discuss in future meetings. She also requested that CPAC members and visitors complete the yellow "Request for Service" cards to report 630-CITY issues. They can be given directly to the staff person responsible at the meeting, or Amy Holliman will enter them into 630-CITY.
- 4. TRUE Commission Report: Niki Brunson, (nikibrunson@outlook.com), reported that the Taxation Revenue and Utilization of Expenditures (TRUE) Commission has a special subcommittee on Parks and Maintenance. The TRUE Commission has in planning inspections on 20 parks, five of which are in the Urban Core. The TRUE Commission will compare their inspection results to the reports on file with Parks, Recreation and Community Services. Niki Brunson will provide a list of the parks inspected by the Commission.
- 5. Public Official Report: Warren Jones, Duval County Public School Board Member District 5 (jonesw2@duvalschools.org: 390-2372), reported that Duval Public Schools has not had a significant enough increase from the State of Florida to accommodate the influx of new residents. Duval County Public Schools is currently conducting a series of meetings throughout Jacksonville to discuss how to proceed with maintaining the district's aging school buildings. The meeting for the Urban Core area schools is Wednesday, February 27, 2019 at 6 p.m. in Andrew Jackson High School, 3816 Main St. N.

- **6. Presentation:** Adrianne Lathrop with Plan Design Construct (PDC) Management Group shared a brief presentation of the company's potential project at 4323 Bessie Cr. E. She has requested a letter of recommendation for the project from the CPAC. Several members said they did not have enough information to make a decision whether or not to support the project. They asked that she return with additional information.
- 7. Approval of Previous Meeting's Summary: Kim Pryor motioned to approve the January 7, 2019 CPAC meeting summary. Glen VanVorst seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

8. Staff Reports

- Jacksonville Sheriff's Office: Lt. James Ricks, Patrol and Enforcement Zone 1, (James.Ricks@jaxsheriff.org), reported that a program called Downtown Incentive includes the Sheriff's Office working with Downtown Vision Inc. to identify locations with the greatest number of issues within the Urban Core. Lt. Ricks has assigned officers to monitor those locations to build relationships with the individuals living and working in those areas.
- Municipal Code Compliance: Timothy Myers, Code Compliance Supervisor (Myers@coj.net: 255-7037), reported that since the last CPAC meeting, 1,590 inspections were performed in Urban Core District and 9,750 inspections citywide. Four new MCCD Officers were hired last month. The Mid-Westside neighborhood inspection that was scheduled for last month was cancelled. Tim Myers will look into when that inspection will take place.
- **JEA:** Renee Goode, Government Relations (goodrr@jea.com: 665-5348), reported that a special JEA Board meeting is scheduled February 5, 2019 on the 9th floor of the JEA Building to discuss the relocation selection. - Public Works: Steve Long, Chief of Right of Way and Storm Water Maintenance (SLong@coj.net: 255-4283) explained that street sweeping is done to protect storm water systems, not to make the streets look clean. Springfield Preservation and Revitalization (SPAR) worked with Public Works to create a test case in Springfield to schedule street sweeping every two months. The streets are swept every six to eight weeks throughout the city, depending on the weather.
- Jacksonville Public Library: Sara Roberts, Library Services (SaraR@coj.net), reported that the February calendar of Library events is available. Goosebumps author R.L. Stein will be the featured guest on February 22, 2019 at the Main Library. Dinner will be served at 5:30 p.m., with story time afterwards beginning at 6:45 p.m. On Saturday February 16, 2019, at 1 p.m. the special program "Strange Fruit in Florida" will begin with a discussion of Florida's painful history of racial violence. On Wednesday, February 6, 2019 the exhibit of North Florida Folk Art, Blurred Lines, Florida's First Coast opens and will be in the gallery through May. Friends of the Library accepts book donations. Donations will not be placed in the collection; however they will be sold to benefit the library. Library Director, Tim Rogers reported that the Library is currently researching the options to upgrade Urban Core libraries to bring them technologically up to date.
- 9. Old Business: Darcel Harris has agreed to present a report on the Crime Task Force activities at the March, 14, 2019 CPAC meeting.
- **10. Adjourn**: Greg Radlinski motioned to adjourn. The motion carried and the meeting adjourned at 7:57 p.m.
