

WHEREAS: Complex Regional Pain Syndrome (CRPS), also known as Reflex

Sympathetic Dystrophy (RSD), is a nerve disorder that causes chronic

pain; and

WHEREAS: Those with CRPS/RSD often experience a burning sensation that is

disproportionate to the severity of an initial injury. Symptoms can also include changes in the skin color and temperature of the affected body

part, as well as skin sensitivity, sweating and swelling; and

WHEREAS: Although CRPS/RSD was first identified during the Civil War, it remains

a poorly understood condition with no known causes, singular

treatment or cure; and

WHEREAS: Treatment of this disorder only alleviates symptoms. No medication,

combination of medications, or procedure has produced consistent,

long-lasting improvement in symptoms; and

WHEREAS: Increased awareness of disorders leads to further research and

treatment options. The National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke and other entities of the National Institutes of Health support

research relating to CRPS/RSD; and

WHEREAS: Each November, members of the CRPS/RSD community spread

awareness of this poorly understood pain disorder. During the fifth annual Color the World Orange Day on November 5, all citizens are

invited to wear orange in support of those with CRPS/RSD.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LENNY CURRY, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor of Jacksonville, Florida, do hereby proclaim November 5, 2018 as
