WHEREAS: The Victims of Crime Act, enacted by Congress in 1984, affirms a

dignity and respect; and

WHEREAS: Providing victims with knowledge of their rights and available services

further strengthens their ability to recover by restoring a sense of self-

empowerment; and

WHEREAS: Individuals who feel understood and supported are more likely to

disclose their victimization, seek services and participate in the judicial

process; and

WHEREAS: National Crime Victims' Rights Week is recognized each April to

recommit to ensuring that all victims are afforded their rights and receive a trauma-informed response that promotes healing and fosters strength. This year's theme, "Expand the Circle — Reach All Victims," emphasizes the importance of inclusion and collaboration in rebuilding

lives.
