OVERVIEW

TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM

- For the four month period from October 2002 through January 2003, the City received \$19.6 million in sales tax revenue and \$2.2 million in proportionate share gas tax.
- For the four month comparative period of October 2001 through January 2002 and October 2002 through January 2003 to September 2002, there was a 4.86% increase in revenues.
- Revenue continues to be on target with the original cash model.

INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM

- For the four month period from October 2002 through January 2003, the City received \$18.8 million in sales tax collections.
- For the four-month comparative period of October 2001 through January 2002 and October 2002 through January 2003 to September 2002, there was a 4.38% increase in revenues.

Under The Better Jacksonville Plan, JEA is phasing out septic tanks in six areas of the community that have been declared sanitary nuisance areas by the Duval County Health Department and the City Council. These are all areas where leaking septic tanks are polluting the St. Johns River or tributaries to the river.

As part of The Better Jacksonville Plan, drainage improvements will also be addressed in the six identified areas. The following schedule has been adjusted to allow construction concurrently.

Environmental Clean-Up of Contaminated Sites

April 8, 2003

• To date, the City of Jacksonville has encumbered and expended \$1,284,957.

• Lonnie C. Miller, Sr. Regional Park

The Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry has investigated potential contamination at this park at great length and determined there are no health concerns in areas of the park that are open to the public. The city's environmental consultant has completed testing in the surrounding neighborhoods. The City is developing the feasibility study to outline options for addressing contamination in the portion of the park that is fenced off and the surrounding neighborhood. Although we are confident that we have adequately defined the limits of the contamination, we are continuing efforts to gain access to private properties for the purpose of obtaining soil samples.

• The area around the old Bethune Elementary School

The city's consultant is currently responding to EPA comments and preparing Revision 2 to the Remedial Investigation Report. Additionally, the consultant has submitted portions of the feasibility study to EPA outlining cleanup options for the site. The city is continuing efforts to gain access to private properties for the purpose of collecting soil samples.

• The area around 5th and Cleveland (Emmett Reed Park)

The City of Jacksonville is continuing to collect a second round of soil samples and is preparing Revision 1 of the Remedial Investigation Report. The city is continuing efforts to gain access to private properties for the purpose of collecting soil samples. However, the lack of consenting property owners is currently delaying progress on the project and has resulted in an expansion of the site to meet the requirements of the EPA approved work plan. Once EPA is confident that we have adequately determined the extent and nature of the contamination we will begin development of the feasibility study, which will outline the options available for addressing the contamination.

The area around Forest Street and McCoy's Creek

The City of Jacksonville is continuing to collect a second round of samples and is preparing Revision 1 of the Remedial Investigation Report. The city is continuing efforts to gain access to private properties for the purpose of collecting soil samples. However, the lack of consenting property owners is currently delaying progress on the project and has resulted in an expansion of the site to meet the requirements of the EPA approved work plan. Once EPA is confident that we have adequately determined the extent and nature of the contamination, we will begin development of the feasibility study, which will outline the options available for addressing the contamination.

The area around Clydo Road

The city's environmental consultant has essentially completed sampling activities at the site. The contamination assessment report summarizing the findings of the sampling activities is currently at 80% complete. Our consultant is now in the process of evaluating remedial alternatives for the closure of the site.

• The area around Pope Place and Gold Merit

The city's environmental consultant has completed sampling of the Pope Place site and is currently preparing the contamination assessment report, defining the nature and extent of contamination. Wet weather has delayed completion of the sampling activities at the Gold Merit Site and approximately 90% of the field work remains to be completed. We anticipate sampling activities will restart this week. After the nature and extent of contamination have been determined at both sites, the City will propose a method to address (cleanup) the contamination.

Environmental Clean-Up of Contaminated Sites (continued)

April 8, 2003

The area around Burke Street (Air Liquide property)

The city has received approval of the contamination assessment plan from FDEP. FDEP recently has sent notice to Air Liquide, the owner of the property, requesting that they take certain actions regarding possible contamination on the property. The City is working with Air Liquide to coordinate sampling efforts and prevent the duplication of work by both parties. The consultant has began sampling activities at the site. After the nature and extent of contamination have been determined, the city will propose a method to address (cleanup) the contamination.

• Crystal Springs Road Park

The City of Jacksonville is continuing to investigate contamination in two areas of the Crystal Springs Road Park. Recent soil tests performed by the city's consultant indicated the presence of pesticides, metals, and dioxins in concentrations above regulatory guidelines. The contamination is limited to areas restricted from public access and warning signs have been posted. The city has completed additional sampling activities to confirm the contamination and is currently evaluating remedial options to address the contamination. We are in the process of negotiating with FDEP for the Cleanup of the northern undeveloped area. The portions of the park currently open to the public have been determined to be safe.

Confederate Park

The City of Jacksonville has secured the services of an environmental consultant to investigate contamination at Confederate Park resulting from the operation of a Manufactured Gas Plant (MGP) on adjacent properties. The MGP was believed to have operated from 1875 to 1912. The city's consultant has submitted a contamination assessment plan to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection) proposing sampling locations to determine the character and extent of contamination at the site. Once the plan has been approved the city's consultant will conduct sampling activities at the site to determine the need for additional work and/or remediation. The consultant has responded to the first round of comments from the FDEP and is currently finalizing the contamination assessment plan. Additionally, the consultant has preformed one subsurface boring to gather site specific information to refine the sampling approach. Once the sampling plan is approved, we will move forward with determining the nature and extent of the contamination at the site.

Highlights of NWJEDF activity for the second quarter of FY 02/03 are summarized below:

- Cain & Bultman, Inc., a flooring manufacturer and distributor, is located in the Enterprise Zone at 2145 Dennis St. The project was approved for a grant from the BIG Program in the amount of \$180,000. Capital investment \$2,480,000.
- Drummond Press, approved for an \$85,000 infrastructure grant. Total project capital investment is \$2,051,000.
- Victory Land Day Care received approval for a \$240,000 loan for acquisition.
- Sterling Classics received approval of a \$49,986 grant for infrastructure improvements.

JEDC has approved the introduction of legislation to request reallocation of BJP funds to extend the Façade Grant Program and to establish the Small Business Corridor Loan Program (SBCLP). An additional \$500,000 would fund the continuation of the Façade program with and \$1 million to the SBCLP. The SBCLP would provide funds to small businesses for leasehold improvements and machinery and equipment in amounts up to \$25,000.
