Call to Order/Verify Quorum: Chair Salem called the December 2019 GAB CPAC meeting to order at 6:30 pm. Rosemary Wesolowski verified that a quorum was present.

Presentation: Sarah Green, Strategic Partnerships Coordinator, 2020 Census introduced herself and provided an overview of the *Duval Counts Campaign* for the 2020 Census.

Every 10 years, the federal government conducts a population count of everyone in the United States. Data from the census provide the basis for distributing billions in federal funds annually to communities. These funds support vital programs—impacting housing, education, transportation, employment, health care, and public policy. The data is also used to redraw the boundaries of congressional and state legislative districts and accurately determine the number of congressional seats each state has in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Beginning in mid-March, we will receive a notice in the mail to complete the 2020 Census. For the first time ever, the U.S. Census Bureau will accept responses online, but you can still respond by phone or mail if you prefer. In May, the U.S. Census Bureau will begin following up in person with households that haven't responded to the census.

The 2020 census will collect basic information about the people living in your household. When completing the census, you should count everyone who is living in your household on April 1, 2020.

An effort to protect your personal information, the Census Bureau has worked very hard to secure their technology. Strict federal law protects your census responses. It is against the law for any Census Bureau employee to disclose or publish any census information that identifies an individual. Census Bureau employees take a lifelong pledge of confidentiality to handle data responsibly and keep respondents' information private. The penalty for wrongful disclosure is a fine of up to \$250,000 or imprisonment for up to 5 years, or both. No law enforcement agency (not the DHS, ICE, FBI, or CIA) can access or use your personal information at any time. Data collected can only be used for statistical purposes that help inform important decisions, including how much federal funding your community receives. The Census Bureau has a robust cybersecurity program that incorporates industry best practices and federal security standards for encrypting data. Additionally, please remember that the Census Bureau will never ask for: Social Security numbers; bank or credit card account numbers; money or donations or anything on behalf of a political party.

a public comment period at 6:30 p.m. Attendees will have the opportunity to view displays and discuss the proposed changes with project staff and consultants
