A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY URGING THE JACKSONVILLE MAYOR AND THE OFFICE OF GENERAL COUNSEL TO CONTINUE THE LITIGATION STYLED RANDALL WYSE, ETCITY OF JACKSONVILLE, ET AL, CASE NO. 3:13-CV-121-J-34MCR TO COMPLETION TO DETERMINE LEGAL VALIDITY OF THE "THIRTY YEAR AGREEMENT" BETWEEN THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE AND THE JACKSONVILLE POLICE AND FIRE PENSION **FUND** BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND THE APPROPRIATE ENTITY POLICE AND TO NEGOTIATE FOR FIRE PENSION BENEFITS OF TH EPOLICE AND FIRE PENSION FUND; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

whereas, the Police and Fire Pension Fund (the "PFPF") is retirement Plan for Jacksonville law enforcement officers and firefighters and is implemented by the Jacksonville Police and Fire Pension Fund Board of Trustees (also referred to herein as the "Board of Trustees"), an independent agency of the City of Jacksonville created by special act of the Florida Legislature; and

WHEREAS, in the fall of 2012, the City Council authorized the Office of General Counsel to commence litigation to determine the legal validity of the establishment of the Jacksonville Police and Fire Pension Fund Senior Staff Voluntary Retirement Plan through Resolution 2012-624-A; and

WHEREAS, in February 2013, a suit was filed against the City styled Randall Wyse, et al, vs. City of Jacksonville, et al, Case

No. 3:13-cv-121-J-34MCR (the "Wyse" litigation), to determine whether the Board of Trustees is the appropriate entity to negotiate for police and fire pension benefits; and

WHEREAS, the City made counterclaims in the Wyse litigation as to the legal validity of the "Thirty Year Agreement" which includes all prior settlement agreements between the City of Jacksonville and the Board of Trustees (as approved by Ordinances 2000-1164-E, 2003-303-E, 2003-1338-E, and 2006-508-E); and

WHEREAS, since initiation of the litigation in 2013, the Mayor, through the Administration and the Office of General Counsel, representing the City of Jacksonville, and the Board of Trustees, representing the PFPF, have engaged in settlement negotiations which would further amend the "Thirty Year Agreement"; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of settlement, the Administration, on behalf of the Mayor, has filed Ordinance 2014-386, now pending before City Council, which would purportedly become the Fourth Amendment to the "Thirty Year Agreement"; and

WHEREAS, approval of Ordinance 2014-386 by City Council would ultimately result in the approval of the Fourth Amendment to the "Thirty Year Agreement" by both the PFPF and the City; and

whereas, such approval of the Fourth Amendment would in essence validate and affirm the legality of the "Thirty Year Agreement" and would likely provide for a Consent Judgment that would settle all claims made by both parties in the Wyse litigation without addressing the validity of the "Thirty Year Agreement" or the merits of the parties' claims; and

WHEREAS, it is Council's belief that the questions of law raised in the Wyse litigation are decided appropriately through the court process and by final adjudication of the claims made in the legal proceeding by a judge, rather than by further amending the

"Thirty Year Agreement", which Council believes is illegal, invalid and not binding upon the City; and

whereas, the Council recognizes that it is in the best interests of the citizens of the City of Jacksonville as well as the members of the PFPF that any outstanding disputes be comprehensively and fully resolved through the final adjudication of the claims in the Wyse litigation; and

WHEREAS, the Council strongly feels that amending the "Thirty Year Agreement" would only add to the existing patchwork of piecemeal modifications to the PFPF without implementing the farreaching changes needed to effectuate a large scale reduction in the financial liability that the City currently faces; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Litigation to its Conclusion on the Merits. The Council of the City of Jacksonville hereby urges the Mayor and the Office of General Counsel to continue the litigation filed as Randall Wyse, et al. vs. City of Jacksonville, et al., Case No.: 3:13-cv-121-J-34MCR, until final adjudication, through the appellate process if necessary, to determine the legal validity of the "Thirty Year Agreement" and the appropriate entity to negotiate for police and fire pension benefits of the Police and Fire Pension Fund.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.

#### RESOLUTION 2014-704

A RESOLUTION ENCOURAGING THE COUNCIL PRESIDENT TO USE THE AUTHORITY AFFORDED TO THE COUNCIL PRESIDENT PURSUANT TO SECTION 22.02 OF THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE, TO CONSIDER REPLACING THE CURRENT CITY COUNCIL APPOINTEES TO THE POLICE AND FIRE PENSION BOARD OF TRUSTEES WITH GEORGE ROBBINS AND JOHN THOMPSON; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Police and Fire Pension Board consists of five trustees; and

WHEREAS, of the five trustees, two are selected by the Jacksonville City Council and serves a term for four years "unless sooner replaced by the City Council, at whose pleasure they serve" according to Section 22.02, Jacksonville Charter; and

WHEREAS, the City Council in Resolution 2012-411-A confirmed the council appointments of Walter Bussells and Adam Herbert to the Police and Fire Pension Fund Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, since these appointments there has been significant discussion about the Police and Fire Pension Fund, including several lawsuits, numerous pieces of legislation and a Police and Fire Pension Fund Task Force; and

WHEREAS, throughout the discussion and debate, new ideas and directions have taken hold; and

WHEREAS, the Council believes that the Council appointments to the Police and Fire Pension Fund Board of Trustees should reflect the movement that has occurred over the last 3 years; and

whereas, appointees with significant financial understanding and who are not themselves partaking of a public pension should be highly considered for the City Council appointees to the Police and Fire Pension Fund Board of Trustees; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The Council urges the Council President to consider replacing the current City Council appointees to the Police and Fire Pension Board of Trustees with George Robbins whose resume is attached hereto as Exhibit 1 and John Thompson whose resume is attached hereto as Exhibit 2.

Section 2. Effective Date. This resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.

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RESOLUTION 2014-769

A RESOLUTION REAFFIRMING AND REAUTHORIZING THE GENERAL COUNSEL AND THE OFFICE OF GENERAL COUNSEL TO COMMENCE LITIGATION TO DETERMINE THE LEGAL VALIDITY OF THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE POLICE AND FIRE PENSION FUND SENIOR STAFF VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT PLAN AND TO DETERMINE WHETHER MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE POLICE AND FIRE PENSION FUND MISMANAGED OR TOOK UNAUTHORIZED ACTIONS IN CREATING AND ADMINISTERING THE SENIOR STAFF VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT PLAN; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Article 22 (Jacksonville Police and Fire Pension Board of Trustees) of the Charter establishes the Police and Fire Pension Fund Board of Trustees (the "Trustees") to administer the Police and Fire Pension Fund ("PFPF"); and

WHEREAS, the plain language of Article 22 does not provide the Trustees with the ability to create a new trust for separately identified employees to be funded by the City Council. Instead, managing a trust is a limited authorization of power, and does not carry with it the exercise of additional powers beyond that necessary for managing the body of the trust; and

WHEREAS, on September 20, 2000, the Police and Fire Pension Fund Board of Trustees established a separate pension plan for the Administrator and Assistant Administrator of the Police and Fire Pension Fund, named the Senior Staff Voluntary Retirement Plan ("SSVRP"); and

WHEREAS, the language in the SSVRP provided that other individuals could be added to the plan and in 2004, a third individual was approved to join the plan upon becoming employed by the PFPF; and

WHEREAS, it was not until spring 2012 that the SSVRP was noted in the review of documentation by the Council Auditor's Office in their audit of the PFPF; and

WHEREAS, the legality of the SSVRP was called into question in the summer of 2012, and as a result, the Office of General Counsel provided an opinion in August 2012 that the SSVRP was not created legally and was not authorized; and

WHEREAS, in the fall of 2012, the Council authorized the Office of General Counsel to commence litigation to determine the legal validity of the establishment of the PFPF through 2012-624-A; and

whereas, in February 2013, a suit was filed against the City styled Randall Wyse, et al, vs. City of Jacksonville, et al, Case No. 3:13-cv-121-J-34MCR, to determine whether the PFPF Board is the appropriate entity to negotiate for police and fire pension benefits; and

WHEREAS, in its answer to the suit the City has offered as an affirmative defense to that action that PFPF breached its fiduciary duty in establishing a separate retirement system for the Executive Director and funding such system out of trust funds; and

WHEREAS, on May 7, 2013, Carla Miller, as Director of the Ethics Office, recommended by letter to the General Counsel that the validity of the SSVRP and the questions concerning special financial benefits paid to members of the SSVRP be handled separately and not commingled with the legal issues in the Wyse litigation, fearing that global settlement would seemingly "condone potentially illegal and/or corrupt actions"; and

whereas, in July 2013, the Council Auditor's Office released its Audit of the Police and Fire Pension Fund- #736, dated November 12, 2012, in which the Council Auditor's recommended that financial and legal issues be addressed by the appropriate parties and that the reporting requirements and representation be corrected going forward; and

whereas, since the discovery of the SSVRP, additional facts surrounding its creation and administration have been uncovered, and questions have been raised as to whether the Trustees have met their fiduciary obligations to the PFPF and whether the Trustees acted ultra vires in the creation and administration of the SSVRP; and

whereas, under Article 22, the City is empowered to select two of the five members of the Trustees, and so may exercise its discretion to remove its two representatives, but is limited in the action it can take against the other Trustees delegates in the event that the Trustees have not fulfilled their duties or have exceeded their authority; and

whereas, it is Council's belief that these questions of law are decided appropriately through the court process, through the commencement of a legal proceeding by the City, which is specific to these questions and apart from any other pending litigation between the parties; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Litigation. The Council of the City of Jacksonville hereby reaffirms its action taken as Resolution 2012-624-A and directs the General Counsel and the Office of General Counsel to commence litigation, through the appellate process, to determine the legal validity of the establishment of the Police and Fire Pension Fund Senior Staff Voluntary Retirement Plan. The Council of the City of

Jacksonville also directs the General Counsel and the Office of General Counsel to investigate whether claims against the Police and Fire Pension Fund Board of Trustees are appropriate for mismanagement and/or unauthorized actions by the Police and Fire Pension Fund Board of Trustees concerning the Senior Staff Voluntary Retirement Plan and further authorizes the General Counsel and the Office of the General Counsel to include such claims, if appropriate, in the litigation.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.

WHEREAS, the Jacksonville City Council Auditor's Office performed a limited audit on the Police and Fire Pension Fund, Audit #736, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit 1; and

WHEREAS, the City Council Auditor's Office found significant issues concerning the application and effective retirement date for Deferred Retirement Option Plan ("DROP") members which is utilized to determine the length of DROP eligibility; and

WHEREAS, the City Council Auditor's Office found significant issues concerning the compensation amount which is used to calculate the cost of time service connections for members; and

WHEREAS, on December 10, 2014, Representative Janet Adkins, Chair of the Duval Delegation, requested Governor Rick Scott direct the Chief Inspector General and FDLE to investigate the Police and Fire Pension Fund and its application of funds to the Senior Pension Plan and allowing retirees to enter the DROP plan early;

now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Urging Governor Rick Scott to take action. The City of Jacksonville hereby supports Representative Adkins' request and joins in the action urging Governor Rick Scott to direct the Chief Inspector General and the FDLE to provide an audit, investigation and review of the Jacksonville Police and Fire Pension Fund.

Section 2. Direction to Circulate. The City Council Legislative Services Division is hereby directed to provide a copy of this resolution to the Governor of Florida, President of the Florida Senate, Speaker of the Florida House and members of the Duval Legislative Delegation.

Section 3. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
