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NEW FACES: GET TO KNOW A MEMBER

I was born in Millington, Tennessee as a Navy Brat in 1974. My mom moved to Jacksonville, Florida, when I was four months old, where she met my late dad, Mark Purcell. To answer your questions now, Mark has always been my real father in my eyes, because he took me and my 3-year older sister in when he was only a 19-year-old Navy man himself.

My dad did everything that a dad normally tries to do with their sons growing up (i.e., playing catch, soccer, yard work, changing a tire, checking your oil or fluids, showing me how to fix the basic things around the house, and learn the value of a dollar). My dad later died at age 43 from colon cancer. I was 21, but before he died, I had my name legally changed to reflect his name. Growing up, I sang for the Walt Disney World Candlelight Ceremony, three years in a row during Christmas time. My first Job was at age 13, as a busboy at a Mexican restaurant.

I have been HIV positive since April 2000, when there was only one drug given at that time, AZT. It made many of us sick or even caused death. When I got my results, I just knew it was a death sentence. They set me up with a Make-A-Wish foundation representative. They gave you a permanent plastic Ryan White card with your name and Ryan White number. They set you up with case management and a doctor. They even had HIV/AIDS housing for those needing a place to live called St. Johns Horizon House.

Also, back then we use to have two different camps for HIV/AIDS patients one being in the Fruit Cove/Switzerland, Florida area, and the other was in Live Oak, Florida. I started going to a support group, "Positive Attitudes of Jacksonville" since day one of my positive results and I will always be with them. Frieda Saraga is the facilitator, and she is just wonderful and the best woman you would ever want to meet.

In 2009, I met my late husband, Garlyn, at a NFAN community luncheon, thanks to my dear friend Justin Bell. He was disabled, he could barely walk, he had some severe health issues (that no one knew about) and needed round the clock care. We had our commitment ceremony in 2010. Later we were the first gay couple to get married on the courthouse steps in Jacksonville, Florida, when the Supreme Court passed the law allowing same-sex marriages. Garlyn, died on January 12, 2018. He was my love, my life, my all, and my missing puzzle piece. In 2010, I graduated from FSCJ North campus, where I studied for Massage Therapy, so I could help those with HIV/AIDS, that couldn't afford to get a massage.

This is my first year serving on the Metropolitan Jacksonville Area HIV Health Services Planning Council. I was approached by CJ Osburn at AHF and he told me that I would be a great fit for the Planning Council. From that day forward I haven't shied away from the planning council or

any of its commitments. I can only promise that I will be a voice to all of us living with HIV/AIDS. I am getting myself more familiar with the process and who to talk to with certain issues.

People think that the medication is making us better, so we should be doing jumping jacks, running around, getting off our soap boxes and keep quiet and live life. That may be true for the newly diagnosed individuals with HIV/AIDS, however for those of us that are long-term survivors with HIV/AIDS, it's a totally different story. We have been through a lot more and our bodies have been through the mill, and we are still going through problems related to the past. Don't let someone tell you that you are getting better, you have a voice. Use your voice with your doctors, nurses, and most importantly your politicians. Don't let someone that may not have HIV/AIDS control what happens to your funding.

If you have noticed, things have changed completely since last year, five years ago, 10 years ago, all the way to 20+ years ago. I have seen all the changes and I have kept quiet, but no more. What's being done is not right and we need more voices of people with HIV/AIDS to stand up and do what we did in the past and that is to "ACT UP" (AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power). Maybe all our voices need to be heard – those long-term survivors and newly infected.

The more people infected or affected by HIV/AIDS that come to our meetings, committees, and give input, the better. This is your time to "ACT UP" and use your voice, come to the meetings either in person or via zoom, and make sure that your voice is heard. Just remember this one thing - Silence = Death!!!
