more people into treatment; and

WHEREAS: Managing the effects of these conditions can help people achieve healthy

lifestyles, both physically and emotionally; and

WHEREAS: With this year's theme of Join the Voices for Recovery:

Together We Are Stronger, River Regions Human Services, Gateway Community Services, and Beaches Recovery continue to improve the lives of those affected by mental and/or substance use disorders by raising awareness and education communities about the prevention, treatment, and

recovery resources that are available.
