

## PROCLAMATION

ONE CITY. ONE JACKSONVILLE

WHEREAS: On August 26, 1920, women officially gained the right to vote with the

passage and ratification of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. This Amendment marked the end of a three-generation struggle for women's right to vote and progress toward voting rights

for women of color; and

WHEREAS: The passage and ratification of the 19th Amendment was possible

because local, state, and national organizations and activists fought

together for change at every level of society and government; and

WHEREAS: In Jacksonville, Suffragists Roselle Cooley, Frances Anderson, and

other energetic women organized the Florida Equal Franchise League,

which expanded into other communities in Florida; and

WHEREAS: By November 1920, the movement had spread to 13 other Florida

counties and the Florida Equal Franchise League became a pivotal

influencing group in Florida's suffrage movement; and

**WHEREAS:** As we commemorate the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment to

the Constitution of the United States, let us recognize the contributions of suffragists which ultimately paved the way for women to fully participate in democracy and fundamentally change the role of civic life

in Jacksonville, the State of Florida, and our Nation.

**NOW, THEREFORE, I, LENNY CURRY,** by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor of Jacksonville, Florida, do hereby recognize
