WHEREAS: The Irish first came to Spanish "La Florida" in the 1500s, serving as

missionaries, mercenaries, planters, traders, businessmen, doctors

WHEREAS: Around 1600, Fr. Richard Arthur, an Irish-born priest, established the

first public school in North America. This school was located in St.

Augustine, Florida and taught boys and girls of all races; and

WHEREAS: Andrew Jackson, first United States Governor of Florida, Future United

States President, and namesake of Jacksonville, was of Irish heritage;

and

WHEREAS: Twenty-two Presidents have claimed Irish Heritage, and Irish leaders

and thinkers helped lay the ideological and physical foundations onto

which the United States would be built; and

WHEREAS: The United States, Florida, and Duval County all continue to benefit

greatly from the rich cultural heritage and valuable contributions of

Irish Americans.
