them with dignity and respect; and

WHEREAS: Providing victims with knowledge of their rights and available

services further strengthens their ability to recover by restoring a

sense of self-empowerment; and

WHEREAS: Crime victims who feel understood and advocated for are more

likely to divulge their victimization, seek services, and participate

in the judicial process; and

WHEREAS: In Jacksonville, our community recognizes the importance of

honoring the courageous victims and the professions who have made outstanding contributions to victims, making a difference in

our community.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, LENNY CURRY, by virtue of the authority vested in me as mayor of Jacksonville, Florida, do hereby proclaim April 24-30, 2022 as
