WHEREAS: The Joint United Nations Program on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) estimates that

approximately 38.4 million people worldwide are living with HIV/AIDS;

and

WHEREAS: Almost 1.2 million of them are Americans, as reported by the United

States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC); and

**WHEREAS:** As of 2020, Duval County has the fifth highest rate of new HIV infections

in Florida, with more than 10,000 individuals currently living with

HIV/AIDS; and

**WHEREAS:** Early diagnosis is key to effectively treating the disease and improving

the overall prognosis for those affected; and

**WHEREAS:** World AIDS Day, observed annually on December 1, challenges everyone

to recognize our individual and collective roles in the global effort to change the course of the AIDS epidemic. This observance raises awareness of the disease, fosters support for those affected by it, and

serves to share prevention methods to reduce its spread; and

**WHEREAS:** As part of the annual local observance of World AIDS Day, the NAMES

Project Foundation's North Florida Quilt Chapter displays an AIDS Memorial Quilt in City Hall as a tribute to those lost to the AIDS epidemic. Visitors can view the display from November 21 – December 6 and participate in the Quilt Ceremony to be held in the atrium on

December 1.
