



# PROCLAMATION

ONE CITY. ONE JACKSONVILLE.

**WHEREAS:** The economic well-being of our city, state and nation is significantly impacted by sound maritime and transportation systems; and

**WHEREAS:** The maritime and transportation policies set forth by state and federal regulatory bodies help provide our nation with a more efficient transportation network; and

**WHEREAS:** Congress first recognized National Maritime Day in 1933, marking the 114<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first trans-oceanic voyage of the Savannah, an American steamship, which set sail from the United States to England on May 22, 1819; and

**WHEREAS:** In the centuries since, various transportation manufacturers, agencies and authorities have responded to the public's increasing need for customized, flexible, low-cost and efficient transportation services to meet evolving business needs; and

**WHEREAS:** The U.S. military and national security also depend on the capacity of the maritime and transportation industries to move personnel and materials in times of peace and conflict; and

**WHEREAS:** The men and women who constitute the workforce of the maritime transportation industry contribute greatly to the support of citizens in areas throughout our nation, including Jacksonville, a critical port city on the east coast.


